

GOOD ROADS TO DRAW TOURISTS

PLAN IS TO PREPARE FOR THE 1915 TRAFFIC

On a Trip in Which he Bought 117 Mules, Stockman Travels over Most of the Roads in the County and is Well Pleased with the Results that Have been Secured by the County Court.

"For every dollar the county court has spent in road building the taxpayers of the county have been benefitted at least \$10."

This was the declaration of E. M. McEmore, after a 20 day trip through the county on a mule buying expedition. During this trip he passed over practically every road on which work had been carried on, and brought to this city 117 mules, which he will soon ship to the southern markets.

"If there has been any money squandered in road building it is not noticeable and I for one do not believe that there has been," said Mr. McEmore. "The benefit to the taxpayers from the improvement of the roads comes from the increase in valuation of the land, and the increase in tourist travel."

"Many thousands of dollars were spent last summer by tourists traveling through this section in automobiles, and the amount will be increased this year. The great benefit will be attained in 1915, when the travel of the world will be toward the Pacific slope."

"There is still work to be done, and the county court should proceed with the road building plan adopted some time ago. Instead of reaping a harvest of a ratio of about 10 to one it appears to me to be the case roads plan is carried along until 1915 this county will benefit as great as 20 to one."

AFTER A CHANGE IN THE LAW

A set of recommendations regarding the reclamation legislation, which in the minds of the directors of the Klamath Water Users Association, would tend to better conditions for the water users on the various irrigation projects was passed at yesterday's meeting of the directors of the association. These will be introduced at the Oregon Irrigation Congress to be held in this week, and through that body will be presented to the Oregon Legislature, with a petition that the legislature memorialize Congress to amend the Reclamation Act in order to conform with the recommended changes.

The resolutions drafted at Monday's meeting follow:

We believe that the Secretary of the Interior should be required to submit to the owners of irrigable private lands within any irrigation project proposed under Act of June 17, 1902, all maps, plans, specifications and estimate of probable cost of construction, and that the necessary money for the completion of the proposed work should be available in the Reclamation Fund prior to the approval of construction of such project.

We believe that itemized accounts of expenditures and all recommended change in plans, specifications and estimated changes of cost made during the construction of any Government irrigation project should be monthly transmitted to the project water users Association.

We believe that the project Water Users Association should be permitted to undertake the construction of a project under Act of June 17, 1902, at the estimated cost when bids are not obtained for such construction at less than the estimated cost.

We believe that homestead settlers on public lands within any Government irrigation project should receive irrigation water on a maintenance base for a period of three years before commencement of payment of construction charges.

We believe that the project Water Users Association should be permitted to take complete control of the maintenance and use of a project or feasible unit immediately upon completion of same.

We believe that none of the resources acquired in conjunction with any project should be sold, leased or otherwise disposed of, except by approval of the project Water Users Association.

We believe that provision should be made for extension of time for payment of construction charges during exceptionally needy conditions of individual water users.

PETITION FOR LIQUOR LICENSE

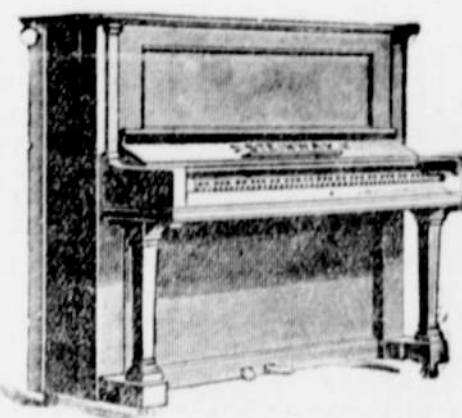

To the Honorable W. S. Worden, Judge of the County Court of the State of Oregon, for Klamath County, and to John Hagelstein and C. G. Merrill, Commissioners for the county and state aforesaid:

We, the undersigned, legal voters and residents of Wood River Precinct, Klamath County and State of Oregon, would respectfully petition that a liquor license be granted to J. E. Vose to sell, exchange or otherwise dispose of spirituous, malt or vinous liquors or fermented cider, commonly known as "hard cider," in quantities less than one gallon, at Fort Klamath, in Wood River Precinct, County of Klamath and State of Oregon. That said license be granted to the party aforesaid for a period of six months from and after the date of granting said license, and each for himself says: That I have personally signed this petition and that my residence, postoffice address and voting precinct is correctly written after my name, and that I am and have been an actual resident of Wood River Precinct in Klamath County and State of Oregon for a period of more than thirty days last past.
