MILES THE NEXT LYCEUM SPEAKER

Robert Parker Miles, lecturer, traveler, reporter and reformer, will speak before a Klamath Falls audience on the night of January 29th, the lecture being one of the numbers of the Klamath Lyceum course. He is known all over the nation on account of his famous lecture, "Tallow Dips."

Miles attained fame as a newspaper man. He got the "scoop" in the Thorn-Guldensuppe murder, and witnessed the electrocution of Martin Thorn.

He was for a number of years the intimate friend and confidential secretary of the great George Francis Train, the eccentric one-time millionaire, and wrote out for the aged philanthropist and former financial king the sheets and story of Mr. Train's last book. He was one of the fifteen celebrities present at the great dinner given by Mr. Train at the Mills house in New York city, where the entire expense was \$2.25. He knew Mr. Train probably better than any other American.

WOULD PENSION WIDOWS OF WAR SULTAN WILL BE BUT FIGUREHEAD

COMMITTEE OF THE HOUSE URGE THE PASSAGE OF THE CRAIGO BILL — WILL COST GOVERNMENT \$100,000

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 20.—Congressmen Green, Crago, Anderson and Curry appeared before the senate pension commission today to urge the passage of the Crago bill, which provides for pensions of \$12 per month for all widows of soldiers and sailors of the Spanish-American and Philippine wars. It is estimated that the cost to the government will be \$100,000.

TURKEY PROBABLY WILL SUGGEST A COMPROMISE

LONDON, Jan. 20.—An unconfirmed dispatch from Constantinople says that the porte will offer to cede the allies half of Adrianople, Turkey retaining the Moslem section.

Envoy Reschid denied any knowledge of the dispatch.

Chairman Daneff of the peace conference said:

"If any such offer is made the allies will surely accept it."

There is no sign of the resumption of the peace conference.

Official advices from Athens say that neither side suffered in Sunday's naval engagement.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 20.—A council of ministers is in progress today to consider the porte's reply to the note of the powers. It has not yet been decided whether or not to reject the proposal to abandon the Aegean Islands and Adrianople.

The grand council of the empire will meet Tuesday, and will then make final decision.

OCTOGENARIAN IS STILL A "LIVE ONE"

LUCERNE, Jan. 20.—In celebration of his 85th birthday, "Papa" Kalin, after making his will and having a farewell drink with his friends, negotiated with the aviator, Ingold, for a trip in his monoplane over Lake Lucerne. They flew about Mount Pilatus and the Rigi, and no one was more surprised than the old man himself when they landed near his favorite cafe.

"I have lived," said he. "Let's have another."

TO BE BURIED WITH HIS DOG

LONDON, Jan. 20.—James G. Dearden, age 73, of Stanford, who died worth \$2,500,000, left instructions that his body be cremated and the ashes interred with those of his favorite dog "Pompey."

NORWEGIAN STRIKE MAY BE AVERTED

CHRISTIANA, Jan. 20.—A threatened general strike in the tailoring and dressmaking trades of Norway has been averted by an agreement of employers and employees to submit their differences to the decision of a mixed committee. The workers are demanding an increase of the minimum weekly wage from \$6.25 to \$7.50, and a reduction in hours of labor from 10 to 8 1/2 hours a day.

They Don't Like It

BERLIN, Jan. 20.—On the ground that they interfere with the free passage of pedestrians by attracting admiring crowds of loiterers, the police have forbidden the use of illuminated advertisements of marked originality.

HELEN GOULD TO BE BRIDE SOON

TARRYTOWN, N. Y., Jan. 20.—Preparations for the Gould-Shepard wedding are complete. There will be no display.

Rev. Daniel Russell will officiate. Miss Helen Gould's nieces will be the only attendants of the bride. George Gould will lead the bride to the altar. Louis Shepard, a brother of the groom, will be best man.

The wedding party will include only the family and a few intimate friends.

CONDEMNED MAN WANTS TO WED

LONDON, Jan. 21.—Public indignation at the refusal of the home office to permit John Williams, under sentence of death for the murder of Police Inspector Walls, to marry his sweetheart, Florence Seymour, is becoming more acute. After his conviction a girl was born to the young woman, who had been living with Williams. Williams then wrote to Home Secretary McKenna, "I want to marry my girl, Florence. Will you give me permission?" The curt reply came back, "I am unable to accede to your wish."

LONDON, Jan. 21.—A telegram from Constantinople says that the proposed meeting of the national assembly to consider Turkey's reply to the note of the powers has been postponed until tomorrow.

The sultan will preside as a figurehead at the opening, but will retire before the serious business is taken up.

VOLCANO STARTS THROWING LAVA

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 21.—The Colima volcano is in violent eruption and the inhabitants of several villages are fleeing.

The crater is vomiting forth quantities of lava, sand, ashes and poisonous gases.

So far as is known there have been no fatalities, but hundreds of cattle have been killed.

DARROW CASE TO BE LENGTHY

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 21.—The examination of talesmen continued when the Darrow case was re-opened this morning. Only 36 of the 150 talesmen remain.

Both sides expect that it will be weeks before a jury is secured.

Darrow will be more active during this trial than the last in the examination of talesmen. Judge Conley is using every effort to hurry the trial.

WANT RITCHIE TO RUN BOATS

DENVER, Jan. 21.—Willie Ritchie, lightweight champion, can pick up \$15,000 cash money for a bout in New York with Joe Rivers next month. This was the announcement here of Billy Nolan, Ritchie's manager. Nolan declared a New York club wants to stage the bout the latter part of February.

WILSON WILL NOT TAKE SPECIAL CAR TO CAPITAL

TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 21.—Governor Wilson announced today that he would not go to Washington until March 3.

"Of course I won't have a special car for the trip," he said. "There will be no one in the party except Mrs. Wilson, my daughters and myself. I expect to continue to act as governor until I start for Washington."

HELEN'S DRESS TO BE COSTLY

TARRYTOWN, N. Y., Jan. 21.—Helen Gould and George Shepard secured a marriage license this afternoon. They then went to Lyndhurst to rehearse for the wedding.

But seventy-five people will attend the wedding. They will include members of both families.

The itinerary of the wedding trip is not known.

The bride's gown will be ivory white satin, cut princess, with a long train, high neck and long sleeves. The trimmings will be rare old rose point lace, costing about \$1,000.

Scores of gifts are arriving.

King Is Ill

LONDON, Jan. 21.—Semlin dispatches say that the King of Serbia is seriously ill, suffering from nervous exhaustion.

Roumanian Princess Listed

LONDON, Jan. 21.—Princess Elizabeth, daughter of the crown prince of Roumania, is the latest suggestion of royal matchmakers as a possible bride for the Prince of Wales.

METHODICAL WAS THIS SUICIDIST

LONDON, Jan. 21.—A commendable example for future suicides was set by Mrs. Rose Thompson of Cambridge, before asphyxiating herself. Tied to the knob of her bedroom door a servant found a note reading:

"Before you do anything else go down stairs and turn off the gas at the meter. Then get some one to come and open the bedroom window from the outside, as you will find the place full of gas. See that you turn off the gas before you light up, or you will cause an explosion."

The coroner's jury rendered a verdict of suicide during temporary insanity.

TWO MILLION FOR 1915 EXPOSITION

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 21.—The house committee on industrial art exhibitions today unanimously approved the Dredenburg bill appropriating \$2,000,000 for the government exhibit at the Panama-Pacific exposition at San Francisco in 1915.

The bill provides for a commission of seven members appointed by the

president and a government board composed of employees of the various departments, who will collect and install the exhibits.

CANADIAN TOWN SWEEP BY FIRE

WINNIPEG, Jan. 21.—Dispatches received from Fort Saskatchewan, near Edmonton, on the Canadian Northern, state that a fire has been raging for the past twelve hours, and the city seems doomed.

The fire has been sweeping the business district, and late this afternoon it threatened the residence section of the town.

COLD WEATHER FOLLOWS FLOODS

NO RAIN HAS FALLEN RECENTLY IN STRICKEN DISTRICT, AND RIVERS ARE FALLING—FLOOD VICTIMS ARE SUFFERING

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Jan. 21.—The first cold weather came today, and the suffering of the flood victims has increased.

The general situation is improved. There has been no rain, and the river is apparently falling.

MINIMUM WAGE BILL'S SUBJECT

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 21.—Senator Bryant introduced a bill today fixing \$3 as the minimum wage for all employees on state contract work. A fine up to \$1,000 or one year in jail is the penalty for violation of the law.

ASKS UNCLE SAM TO RUN BOATS

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 21.—Caminetti today introduced a joint resolution urging the federal government to operate a line of steamers from New York to San Francisco to prevent trust control of the transportation through the Panama canal.

CLANCY'S BOND IS TURNED DOWN

CHICAGO, Jan. 21.—Judge Baker of the federal circuit court of appeals rejected Clancy's bond today, so his release will be delayed at least a fortnight.

The surety offered for Clancy will be returned to the coast and changed to conform to the court's demand.

TALKING FELINE INTEREST FLAGS

HAMBURG, Jan. 21.—German scientists have a new problem in Peter, the talking and singing tomcat. A number of witnesses confirm the statement of its owner, Dr. Suteris, a woman dentist, that Peter distinctly utters the words "more," "hurrah," "no," "enough," "Anna" and "Helena." Furthermore it is asserted that the animal, employing the syllable "lah," sings in perfect tune the melodies of three popular German songs. Peter has no pedigree. He was picked up when a kitten, straying on one of the docks.

Argue Demurrer

A demurrer to the amended answer in the action of Stiles vs. Evans was argued before Judge Benson this forenoon. Keese & Groesbeck representing Stiles, and Elliott & Elliott the defendant. The judge will give his ruling tomorrow.

ENGLISH WOMEN EXPECT TO VOTE

THERE ARE 150 MEMBERS WHOSE VOTE IS DOUBTFUL

Passage of the Measure Means the Enfranchisement of Fifteen Million Women in British Isles—The Cabinet Is Reported to Be Divided, With Lord Grey Favorable to the Cause of Women

LONDON, Jan. 20.—An equal suffrage franchise measure, carrying the suffrage cause up to the house of commons Friday for division is reported to stand 295 for suffrage and 220 against, while 150 votes are doubtful.

Two days' debate precedes the vote. If the measure passes it means the enfranchisement of 15,000,000 women.

The cabinet is reported to be equally divided. Lord Grey leads those favoring the enfranchisement of the women, while Premier Asquith leads the opposition.

CLARENCE DARROW IS ON TRIAL ONCE MORE

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 20.—The trial of Clarence Darrow for the alleged bribery of Robert F. Bain was opened in department four of the superior court before Judge Conley of Madera today.

Earl Rogers of Los Angeles and Judge Powers of Salt Lake City are acting for Darrow. District Attorney Fredericks is acting for the state.

The present indictment against charges the bribery of Robert F. Bain, the first juror accepted in the trial of James Barnabas McNamara, alias James Bryce, for the dynamiting of the Los Angeles Times building on October 1, 1910. James B. McNamara pleaded guilty, with his brother John J. McNamara, and was given a life sentence in San Quentin for this crime. The state alleges that the McNamara's plea of guilty was brought about by the defense attorneys because of the alleged bribes becoming known.

There have been many delays in the second trial of Darrow, and, for a long time it was believed by many that on account of his acquittal on a similar charge—the bribery of Geo. H. Lockwood, a prospective juror in the McNamara trial—the second indictment would never be pressed.

It is admitted by the state that most of the evidence in the Bain case was presented at Darrow's first trial, which resulted in his acquittal on August 17, 1912.

District Attorney John D. Fredericks has consented to postponements for one cause or another, but has always adhered to his original statement that he would prosecute Darrow on the second charge.

A brief resume of the Bain case follows:

Robert F. Bain, an aged carpenter and Grand Army veteran, alleged that on October 6, 1911, the day after he, Bain, had been drawn as a juror in the McNamara trial, Bert H. Franklin, a detective in the employ of Clarence Darrow, came to his cottage in his absence, and gave Mrs. Bain \$450 with the understanding that \$3,500 more was forthcoming if the old soldier was accepted as a juror and held out for the acquittal of James B. McNamara. Mrs. Bain admits that she accepted the money, and persuaded her husband to agree to the proposal.

Mrs. Bain testified at Darrow's first trial that Franklin used every persuasion at his command to gain his ends, telling the aged woman that the McNamara brothers were being persecuted and that a frame-up was being worked to "railroad them to the penitentiary."

Franklin was the state's star witness in the Lockwood case, and corroborated Mrs. Bain's testimony in detail.

Darrow's closest friends say that the noted attorney is practically a pauper as a result of expenses incurred in his first trial. On account of this, it is said, he has signified his intention of doing most of the work in his own defense in this trial.

Darrow has held many positions of honor during his career. At one time he was a member of the Illinois legislature and in 1902 was appointed a commissioner to arbitrate the strike of the anthracite coal miners.

The later years of Darrow's life have been given to the defense of labor.

ODDIE WOULD REFORM STATE

CARSON CITY, Nev., Jan. 20.—Governor Oddie in a message to the legislature, which convened today, recommended the abolition of the Reno divorce colony by changing the required period of residence from six months to one year. He also recommends the abolition of the prize fight law which allows finish contests.
