

THE YOUNG TURKS MAY REVOLT

ADRIANOPLE, HOLY CITY, IS THE CONTENTION

Army Officers of the Ottoman Empire Have Organized and Will Resist the Efforts of the Porte to Force Peace Terms—Envoys Will Open Sessions Again in London on Next Monday

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 23.—Shovket Fasha has been appointed grand vizier. The rest of the Kiamil cabinet have resigned and a political revolution in the ottoman empire has started.

Talaat Bey, the new minister of the interior, said today:

"We shall save the national honor of the Turkish empire or die in the attempt. We deprecate the continuation of war, but will hold Adrianople at any cost.

BERLIN, Jan. 23.—A high German officer today declared that the Turkish army will revolt if Adrianople is ceded to the allies. He says that he had received a letter from Enver Bey at Chatalja, stating that the Turkish officers have organized and will never allow the porte to accept the terms offered by the allies.

Cabinet to Resign

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 23.—Kiamil Pasha has resigned the grand viziership. He advised the porte that he could not give the allies Adrianople, the holy city, and retain his portfolio. It is expected that the entire cabinet will resign.

LONDON, Jan. 23.—Lord Grey will reassemble the peace envoys on Monday. The powers will not allow the Balkan states to collect a cash indemnity.

Telegrams from Vienna say that Austria is preparing to demobilize its troops. It is expected that the armies of the allies in the field will quickly be disbanded.

Chairman Danoff announced that an agreement had been reached between Roumania and Bulgaria by the terms of which Roumania will receive the strip of territory of Silistria on the Bulgarian frontier. As the price of neutrality Bulgaria will immediately dismantle the Silistria forts.

Messages from St. Petersburg say that Russia will immediately demobilize the reservists and the Black Sea fleet.

McCarty Is Favorite

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 23.—Committee reports on the sixty resolutions made at the building trades convention elections are expected tomorrow. McCarty will probably be re-elected president. San Jose is leading Alameda for the next convention.

Prince Is Ill

BERLIN, Jan. 23.—Prince Adalbert, the Kaiser's son, is seriously ill of pneumonia, complicated with measles. His recovery is expected.

BERLIN, Jan. 23.—Lieutenant Otto Schlegel, an army aviator, fell in his aeroplane near Neaburg, Prussia, today, and was killed. Lieutenant Von Scheel, who was with him, was fatally injured.

Frenchman Hurt

PARIS, Jan. 23.—Charles Gaulard was fatally injured at Rheims today when his monoplane turned turtle.

Trial Is Halted

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 23.—The Darrow trial has been halted until tomorrow in order to secure a new venire. Six permanent jurors have been obtained so far.

GUARDS PROTECT RICH NEWLYWEDS

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—Finley J. Shepard and his bride, formerly Miss Helen Gould, are spending their honeymoon quietly at Lyndhurst. The gates to the estate are being guarded.

Resignation Accepted

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 23.—Governor Johnson has accepted the resignation of A. H. Ward of the state mining bureau, and has appointed John G. Fletcher of Oakland to succeed him.

BALLOT LIMITED TO CITIZEN, PLAN

SALEM, Jan. 23.—What is regarded by legislators generally as one of the most important measures introduced at the present session is a joint resolution fathered by Day of Multnomah county. Though simple in its provisions, it contemplates all but American citizens from exercising the franchise. The resolution provides that at the next regular general election a proposed amendment to the constitution be submitted to the people. It will, if submitted and adopted by popular vote, cause Section 2 of Article II of the constitution to read as follows:

read as follows:

"In all elections not otherwise provided for by this constitution, every citizen of the United States, of the age of 21 years and upwards, who shall have resided in the state during the six months immediately preceding such election, shall be entitled to vote at all elections authorized by law."

With the completion of the Panama canal it is expected alien hordes will overrun the coast. It is to stop their voting before they have become citizens that the bill contemplates.

SAFES SEIZED

BY AN OFFICIAL

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 23.—State Building and Loan Commissioner Walker hired an expert to open the safes of the Continental Building and Loan Association last night.

Attorney McNab, acting for the association, is suing for \$50,000 damages.

Walker declares that he will hold possession until the court acts.

MEDFORD TO RING

CURFEW NIGHTLY

MEDFORD, Jan. 24.—Curfew will ring again in Medford, according to announcement made by Mayor W. W. Eifert, and hereafter boys and girls under the curfew age will have to be home nights or explain to the police.

This enforcement has been long sought by the women clubs of the city, but no action was ever obtained, and young folks with little parental restraint did about as they pleased.

The police were instructed to enforce the measure, and arrangements will be made to have the fire bell ring as a curfew.

DEBS ARRESTED; IS OUT ON BOND

SOCIALIST LEADER ACCUSED OF CORRUPTING WITNESSES FOR GOVERNMENT IN ACTION AGAINST GIRARD PAPER

TERRE HAUTE, Jan. 24.—Eugene Debs, socialist candidate for president for several campaigns, and one of the leaders of the party, was arrested by federal authorities today.

The accusation against Debs is that he attempted to obstruct justice in the trial of the government's case against the Appeal to Reason, a socialist paper printed at Girard, Kans. He is said to have approached government witnesses in the hope of corrupting the prosecution.

Debs has been released on \$1,000 bonds, which were furnished by relatives. He was ordered to appear at the May term of the federal court.

BRADY LANDS

IN U. S. SENATE

BOISE, IDAHO, Jan. 24.—Ex-Governor Brady was today elected United States senator to fill the unexpired term of Senator Heyburn.

FOUR MILLION

WORK IN FRANCE

PARIS, Jan. 24.—The working population of France includes 4,150,000 women and girls, according to an official statement published here. Of these 1,925,000 are employed in the factories, workshops and transport service, 1,275,000 in stores, business offices, professions and public service, and 949,000 in agriculture. The vast number of working women come under the head of "ouvriere" or workers, which includes factory hands, milliners, etc. Domestic servants total 772,000 and home workers 548,000 more.

SOCIALISTS WILL

USE THE MOVIES

LONDON, Jan. 24.—British socialists have decided to add moving picture shows to their propaganda work throughout the country. It is proposed to exhibit pictures presenting the conditions of modern industry, particularly emphasizing the unequal distribution of wealth. The extravagances of the rich and poverty of the workers will be depicted. Difficulty has been encountered finding a film maker ready to specialize in this class of work.

WILSON EXPECTED

TO MAKE REQUEST

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 25.—Chairman Adamson of the house interstate commerce committee in a formal statement issued here today predicted that one of Wilson's first requests of congress will be the repeal of the part of the Panama canal act granting free tolls to American coastwise vessels.

Jurist Paralyzed

NAPA, Calif., Jan. 24.—Federal Judge De Haven was today stricken with paralysis while visiting his country home at Yountville. His condition is critical.

HAWLEY WORKS FOR COOS BAY SULTAN NOT HELD BY YOUNG TURKS

ASKS FOR TWO MILLION FOR IMPROVEMENT AND RESERVATION OF NORTH HARBOR JETTY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 24.—Congressman Hawley of Oregon appeared before the board of engineers for rivers and harbors, on Monday, on behalf of the proposed \$2,000,000 improvement and restoration of the north harbor jetty at Coos Bay. He was backed by a delegation led by C. A. Smith, the timber king, who has a \$5,000,000 plant at that point, and intends to add a \$1,000,000 paper mill this year. In the delegation were L. J. Simpson, president of the Coos Bay port commission, Col. Wm. Grimes, Dr. J. T. McCormick and D. C. Green of Marshfield, and Capt. T. J. Maegenn. The engineers will report an estimate, which will go into the appropriation bill.

MURDER SUSPECT

IS TAKEN SOUTH

PORTLAND, Jan. 24.—Sheriff Judd of Tehama county, California, left this morning for Red Bluff with John Torgeron in charge, who is accused of the murder of Edward Miller.

Torgeron was arrested at Medford on a charge of robbery. The murder he is charged with committing occurred at Vina early in December.

PARASITES ARE

AIMED AT IN BILL

SALEM, Jan. 24.—The lot of men who live off the earnings of women will be a hard one if a bill introduced by Representative Upton of Portland becomes a law. It provides a penalty of from five to fifteen years in the penitentiary, without alternative of fine.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 24.—Congressman Knowland of California has arrived in Washington after a long illness, and is renewing his campaign against the Sims bill, which would abolish free tolls for American coastwise vessels using the Panama canal. He has discovered in both the democratic and the progressive party platforms a pledge of free tolls, which he is quoting to doubtful members.

"I think nothing will be done on the matter until the secretary of state shall have replied to the British note," he said. "That reply may come within the week. The committee is likely to report out favorably the Sims bill, but it took the same position last session, when only five of the members were for the retention of the free tolls clause. The house upheld us then, and I do not think it will reverse itself now."

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Several hundred have responded to the order for a general strike of hotel and restaurant waiters issued this morning from union headquarters, and the action is accompanied by general disorder.

Parading strikers assembled at the Knickerbocker hotel this morning, and bricks were thrown through the windows of the hostelry.

Demonstrations of this character are also reported by the management of the Hotel Belmont and Hotel Astor. The police have been called out to protect these properties.

The strike was instigated by the Industrial Workers of the World. Members of this organization plan to spread the strike.

KENT LAUGHS AT

ZUMWALT'S CHARGE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—That the contest brought by Judge I. G. Zumwalt against his seat for the Second California district will be thrown out by the house committee on privileges and elections, although Zumwalt is a democrat, is the opinion of Wm. Kent, radical progressive, who laughs at the charge that he used too much money in his campaign. Kent is so busy fighting the free canal tolls proposal that he has not paid much attention to the attack on his position.

SIX JURORS ARE

CHOSEN IN CASE

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 24.—Six permanent jurors have thus far been selected to hear the trial of Clarence Darrow, charged with bribing a jury. The defense is continuing the examination of talesmen.

MAKING PROGRESS

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 25.—With ten permanent jurors secured in the Darrow case, court attaches are today serving a new venire of forty. Court will resume Monday.

MARTIAL LAW IS IN FORCE IN CONSTANTINOPLE

Warships of the Powers Are Expected to Make Naval Demonstration in the Harbor of Constantinople. Resumption of War Is Not Expected—Powers Are Expected to Force Allies to Terms

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 25.—An earthquake occurred this morning. The superstitious Moslems are terrified.

Shelkst has called the new assembly in session to formulate a new reply to the powers. It is regarded as certain that Turkey will refuse the Aegean Islands and Adrianople, but it is not believed that war will be resumed.

The porte thinks that the powers will force the allies to moderate their demands.

Enver is enforcing martial law here. Street fighting has been checked. The report that the young Turks are in possession of the palace and have deposed the sultan is denied.

To Show Power

LONDON, Jan. 25.—Italian and British warships are speeding toward the Bosphorus as a result of the decision of the powers to make a naval demonstration before Constantinople. American, Russian and German warships are already in the harbor.

LONDON, Jan. 25.—Tewfik Pasha, a Turk peace envoy, declared today that it was not likely that negotiations would be terminated. He said that he expected the deliberations to be resumed next week. Reschid said that he had not received notice of recall from Constantinople. He declared that he did not expect to return there until peace had been concluded. These statements have encouraged the optimists.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 25.—

Ambassador Rockhill cabled today from Constantinople that the city is quiet and the indications are that the resumption of hostilities will not necessarily result from Kiamil's overthrow.

HUMAN DYNAMITE

BOMB CONVICTED

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 25.—Carl Reidelbach, alias Wa-r, was found guilty today by a jury on a charge of attempt to dynamite a public building. He will be sentenced Monday. Reidelbach entered the police station here with a large supply of dynamite, and had the entire force terrorized for a couple of hours. His first trial resulted in a disagreement.

LEVEE BREAKS;

LIVES IN DANGER

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 25.—The Boupap Mississippi levee broke this morning, and there is now a thousand foot gap there. Scores of families are fleeing for their lives.

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 25.—Justice Rudd today issued a warrant for the arrest of General Sickels, charging him with the conversion of public funds.

Attorney General Carmody took the warrant to New York at noon today to place it in the hands of officers for service.

General Sickels is accused of converting \$23,476 to his own use while he was chairman of the New York state monument commission in charge of the duty of properly marking the positions held by New York troops during the Civil War.

SALESMAN'S BODY

FOUND IN BAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 25.—The body of Louis Bowman, a salesman who disappeared New Year's day, has been found in the bay. He had been in the water less than a week. Murder is suspected.

MORSE IS READY

TO GAMBLE AGAIN

FLORENCE, Italy, Jan. 25.—Dr. Marchisavva, the pope's physician, has examined Charles W. Morse. He announced today that Morse has entirely recovered and is now able to resume the Wall street game.

LICENSE UP TO

COUNTY COURTS

SALEM, Jan. 25.—Senator Wood of Washington would empower county courts to refuse to issue licenses to liquor dealers outside of incorporated cities and towns. By the provisions of S. B. 94, which he has introduced, any persons desiring to sell spirituous, malt or vinous liquors or hard cider must file a bond, as required by section 4941 of the codes, as well as by a receipt for the license fee issued by the county treasurer for the period

for which the license is required. This petition must be published for four consecutive weeks in a daily paper published in precinct or county. Afterward the license may be granted if a remonstrance, signed by a majority of the voters of the precinct, is not presented. If so, the money paid for a license shall be returned and the license denied.

READY TO BORE HOLE

THROUGH A MOUNTAIN

ELLENBURG, Wash., Jan. 25.—The driving of the Milwaukee's big tunnel through the Cascades will be completed from the east side within a few days. Already the "hard rock" men have penetrated several hundred feet into the hills from the west side. The work is expected to take eighteen months. The disastrous snows and slides of the past two weeks have cost the Milwaukee close to \$1,000,000. With the tunnel completed several miles in distance will be saved, and the trains will be kept 500 feet lower in altitude. Electric power will be used in the tunnel.

TVEITMOE BOOST

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 25.—The building and trades convention today chose San Jose for the next meeting place and elected McCarthy president and Tveitmoe secretary.

BERLIN, Jan. 25.—Dr. Held of Pittsburgh will sail for home tomorrow, carrying with him the first non-virulent bacilli for the cure of tuberculosis to be taken to America.

Dr. Friedmann, the discoverer of the new cure, has not fulfilled his promise to give the German government his secret.

AVIATOR FLIES OVER THE ALPS

More than 20,000 workers will resume work Monday.

DEATH HORRIBLE

PARIS, Jan. 24.—Leaving a note expressing his disappointment at being unable to marry the Virgin Mary, a madman committed suicide in a most determined manner at Eprenay, France. He first placed a dynamite charge on his chest and exploded it, but the charge being too weak, he only inflicted frightful burns on himself. He then tried stabbing himself with a knife, but the weapon proved too blunt. Placing a large dynamite charge in his mouth, he lit the fuse and calmly awaited the explosion, which blew his head to pieces.

PLACE ENVOYS ARE ORDERED HOME

TURKS ARE DETERMINED TO RESUME HOSTILITIES

Intervention by the Powers Now Seems to Be Certain—Sultan's Forces Will Not Give Up the Sacred City of Adrianople, and the Situation Is Reported to Be Most Grave

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 24.—The new cabinet has decided to recall the Turkish peace envoys from London immediately to determine whether or not to prosecute the war.

Continuous rioting occurred in the streets last night and today. Many people were seriously wounded.

LONDON, Jan. 24.—The foreign office has received confirmation of the killing of Nazim Pasha by Enver Bey. The British ambassador telegraphed that Nazim Pasha lived a considerable time after the shooting. Two other Turkish officers were slain with him.

Lord Grey has called for a meeting of the ambassadors of the powers to consider intervention. It is officially admitted that the situation is most grave.

The envoys of the Balkan states were in session all night, but deferred action until after the ambassadors of the powers consult.

BERLIN, Jan. 24.—An unconfirmed dispatch says that the Young Turks are in possession of the palace in Constantinople, and rioting and pillaging threatened. Enver Bey has been made military commander of Constantinople. It is reported that he completely dominates the sultan. It is expected that Turkey will refuse to abandon Adrianople and that the powers will intervene.

A leading newspaper says: "The Turk stands with a torch in a powder magazine. There will be wild work elsewhere than on the Chatalja line unless prompt measures are taken to restrain him."
