

## SCORES METHOD OF GOVERNING

### JONES CHARGES GROSS EXTRAVAGANCE BY OFFICIALS

Congressman, in Defending Democratic Policy of Philippine Independence Declares That Cost to the Government to Maintain Possession of the Islands Is Enormous, and Should be Abandoned

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 28.—A bitter attack on the present method of governing the Philippines was made in the house today by Congressman Jones of Virginia, in the course of a speech answering President Taft's criticism of the democratic plan for Philippine independence.

"The Philippines are being governed in a manner that defies oligarchy, which has plunged the Filipino into debt, has defeated the ends of justice and has violated the act of congress under which it was formed," thundered Jones.

The congressman also charged Governor General Forbes with extravagance, and that part of the \$3,000,000 congress appropriated for alleviating the suffering of the starving natives had been used to build the Benguet railroad to the official summer homes.

He also asserted that it has cost America \$600,000,000 to maintain the army of the Philippines since the occupancy of the archipelago.

### PROMINENT TURKS ARE CHARGED WITH PLOTTING

CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 27.—Over 200 prominent men have been arrested by order of Enver Bey on charges of fomenting a counter revolution. Most of the prisoners are Kiamil Pasha's adherents.

Three regiments are reported to be en route to Stamboul from Chatalja to support Kiamil's followers.

The ambassadors of the powers do not recognize Enver Bey, and refuse to discuss the situation in the Balkans with him. They demand that the porte immediately answer the note of the powers.

LONDON, Jan. 27.—Chairman Duff notified the ambassadors of the powers that the allies will wait three days before ending the armistice. This means that there will be no fighting this week, as the protocol provides for four days' notice.

An ultimatum will be drafted tomorrow. It will be presented to the Turkish envoys and will become effective at once.

### HOME RULE TO BE REJECTED

LONDON, Jan. 27.—The home rule bill passed its second reading in the house of lords this afternoon. The house was packed. The final vote will occur Thursday. The rejection of the measure is certain.

### PULL HIS TEETH; TAKE HIS MONEY

CALCUTTA, Jan. 24.—Armed with axes, a dozen brigands broke into the house of a wealthy bengali named Pandey, at Iberia, Bengal, and after pulling out all the owner's teeth, decamped with several thousand dollars worth of jewels.

### SUPERSTITION IS CAUSE OF ATROCITY

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 24.—A horrible story of superstition and crime is reported from the village of Bichia, province of Nivgard. The mutilated bodies of two boys, aged 4 and 6 years, were found in a forest, and police inquiries showed that the crime had been committed by thieves, who utilized the flesh of their victims to make the candles which local superstition credits with the power of rendering criminals invisible and of aiding them to escape justice. Several arrests have been made.

### SAN JOSE AFTER NEXT CONVENTION

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 24.—The state building trades council, in session here, will hold its election this evening. It is probable that McCarthy will be chosen as president.

San Jose is leading in the race for the next convention. The delegates from that city are making a strenuous bid for the meeting.

### CALKINS AGAIN INTRODUCES BILL

SALEM, Jan. 24.—Senator Calkins has re-introduced his bill introduced at the last session of the legislature, making saloon keepers liable for damages on the complaint of wife, mother or child of a habitual drunkard or an intoxicated person. The act of a bartender is made the act of his principal. The bill was passed by the senate at the last session, but it failed in the house.

## TRUST OFFICIAL TO BE PUNISHED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 27.—The United States supreme court today affirmed the conviction of Charles S. Heike, former secretary of the sugar trust, for implication in the sugar weighing frauds. In 1907 Heike was sentenced to 18 months imprisonment and fined \$5,000.

### BOLO MEN ATTACK CAVALRY TROOPS

MANILA, Jan. 28.—A large force of Jolo bolo men attacked two troops of the Fourteenth cavalry and a detachment of native constabulary today. One American was killed and several wounded.

The tribesmen were completely routed by the troops after the first skirmish.

## "HUMAN BOMB" GETS 20 YEARS

### REIDELBACH NOT CONCERNED IN THE LEAST AT SENTENCE, AND HE GRINS AND INTERRUPTS THE JUDGE

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 28.—Carl Reidelbach, found guilty of attempting to dynamite public buildings, was today sentenced to twenty years' imprisonment. A motion for a new trial was denied.

The gravity of the affair did not seem to impress Reidelbach, and he grinned continually, and facetiously interrupted Judge Willis while the jurist was pronouncing sentence.

### MCCARTHY STARTS RAISING MONEY

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 27.—McCarthy, president of the Building and Trades Council, today started the raising of additional securities for the bonds of Vietnam and Clancy.

"We will raise such an amount this time," said McCarthy, "that it will be impossible for the government to reject."

### WILSON VETOES RECEPTION PLAN

TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 27.—Asked regarding the suggestion that a reception be held in the White House on the evening of March 4, President-elect Wilson said today:

"There will be 100,000 visitors in Washington on that day, and it will be impossible to have a reception in the White House. There should not be a reception unless it is held on a democratic basis."

### DARROW MAKES POINT IN COURT

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 7.—Two of the three required jurors were secured in the Darrow case this morning. A verbal sparring match between Clarence Darrow and Deputy District Attorney Ford marked the session. Darrow was triumphant, and every one of his objections was sustained.

### Schedule "K" Is Attacked

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 27.—The ways and means committee is today considering schedule "K," the famous wool tariff part of the Payne-Aldrich measure. It is believed that sweeping cuts will surely be made.

Joseph Holmes testified before the committee today against the reduction in the tariff on wool. He admitted that the average woolen suit sold at from \$12 to \$18 cost about \$3, and is sold to the wholesaler at from \$8 to \$10.

There is considerable opposition, especially from the West, to any cut in schedule "K," but the pressure from the other side is the strongest.

### MOTHER OF MRS. YOUNG IS DEAD

Dr. Ellis Young, who owns a ranch near Wilson Bridge, has just received tidings of the death of his wife's mother, Mrs. Doud, at Woodburn, last week. Owing to the storms his relatives were unable to communicate with him sooner.

Mrs. Doud has visited here several times. Mrs. Young was at Woodburn at the time of the death, and she will remain for some time. The following is taken from the Woodburn Independent:

"Another of the old residents of Woodburn passed away last Sunday in the person of Mrs. Mary V. Doud. She had been an invalid for the past three years and barely able to get about. Mrs. Doud was born in Goshen, Elkhart county, Indiana, February 25, 1841, and was almost 72 years of age at the time of her death. In 1855 she removed to Oceana county, Michigan, with her parents. There she was married on April 15, 1855, to Jason F. Doud, who died here five years ago, on March 8, 1908. Of this union four children were born, one of whom died in infancy, and two of whom survive, Nelson B. Doud of this city, and Mrs. D. Ellis Young of Klamath Falls. She has two grandchildren also. Mr. and Mrs. Doud came to Oregon in 1889, and settled in Woodburn, where they spent the remainder of their lives."

### NEW COMPANY GET CHARTER

A charter has just been received from Secretary of State Ben Olcott for the Klamath Fuel company, a local organization, which has just filed articles of incorporation. Oscar Peyton, Charles J. Ferguson and John Durst are the incorporators.

The company's stock is placed at \$10,000. The new concern intends to deal in wood, coal and fuel oil on a large scale.

## FIREMEN TALK OF BIG STRIKE

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Jan. 28.—Officials of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen declare that it appears certain that the firemen attending the convention here are in favor of striking if necessary to adjust their difficulties.

A vote is being taken on the question, and the progress it has made shows that employees of eastern railroads are almost unanimously in favor of striking.

### PASS RIVERS AND HARBORS MEASURE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 28.—The house today passed the annual rivers and harbors improvement appropriation bill.

The bill this year carries an appropriation of \$40,800,000. Provision is made for work in all parts of the country.

### TYPHOID EVER RAVAGES ARMY

VIENNA, Jan. 29.—Typhoid is raging in the Serbian army with increasing virulence. According to reports brought across the river from Belgrade to Semlin the disease has reached the proportions of an epidemic. A special commission of 80 doctors, nurses and hospital stewards have been brought from Italy to assist in the work of checking the disease.

### SCHOONER HITS IN FOG; SINKS

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 28.—The steam schooner Samoa, en route from Caspar, Calif., to San Francisco, struck on Point Reyes in the fog early this morning.

The vessel is a total loss. The crew of twenty-one came ashore in their own boats.

C. L. Mosley, a San Francisco traveling man, is calling upon the electrical supply houses.

In order to assist the development of the Klamath project by the introduction of the proper kind of livestock, Project Engineer W. W. Patch is preparing to discuss with farmers owning land under the ditch the advisability of forming a co-operative syndicate for the purchase of the proper kind of cattle and sheep.

The stocking of the project of the reclamation service with farm animals is one of the most important problems presented in connection with the successful development projects. This is especially true with the Klamath project, which produces large quantities of hay and other animal food, while there is but little local demand for it.

The shipping of the hay to distant points is made necessary for this reason, and this takes the profits that properly belong to the projects. It is largely to form a local demand for this product that Mr. Patch is considering the introduction of more cattle on the Klamath project.

The Klamath country is making rapid strides as a dairying section, and the introduction of better dairy herds would give a great impetus to that industry as well as provide for the home consumption of hay and other products of the farms. The advisability of securing good mutton sheep is also being considered by Mr. Patch.

A plan used with success in other projects has been suggested by Mr. Patch as practicable here, and it is outlined as follows:

A syndicate of ten or more men is formed, and money for financing the matter is secured by a joint note. Upon the delivery of the cows to the water users they execute a promissory note, the note being secured by the cows and a bill of sale for the animals.

Payment is arranged by the delivering of all the cream from the cows purchased to a certain creamery, and a percentage of the money from the sale of the cream is deducted at the creamery and sent to the syndicate.

The department of agriculture has co-operated with the syndicate in the purchase of the proper cattle, and in every instance where the plan has been used the attaches of the state agricultural college have always been willing to assist.

To avoid favoritism in the distribution of the cattle among the water users, each cow is numbered, and the water users draw a number from a box, taking the cow corresponding. The price paid for each cow is the first cost and price of shipping and feeding the animal until the distribution.

During the course of his prayer he beseeched the "God of War" to favor the Balkan countries.

### CANINES SUFFER BY THE "H. C. L."

BERLIN, Jan. 29.—Owing to the high cost of living Germany broke all records last year in the eating of dogs and horses. According to statistics there were 7,573 dogs slaughtered in 1912 as against 6,550 the year previous, and 175,000 horses as against 146,000 in 1911. While Prussia consumed more horseflesh, being at the head of the list of German states with 120,000, Saxony ate more dogs, 4,023 being butchered in the kingdom.

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## DEMURRER SUSTAINED ONCE MORE

### COURT HOLDS THAT COMPLAINT IN ACTION FACULTY

Question of Whether Children of Indian Lineage Have Right to Attend School With Whites Has Not Yet Been Able to Squeeze Into Court—Decision Rendered This Afternoon

A second victory was scored for the school board of Fort Klamath today when Judge Benson rendered a decision sustaining the demurrer to the amended alternative writ of mandamus requiring the board of directors of school district No. 7 of Klamath county to admit William Crawford's children to the public schools of the district.

The case has aroused great interest in the northern part of the county. The Crawford children are of Indian lineage, and have been refused admission to the school in Fort Klamath, which white children attend.

The school board of Fort Klamath a town adjoining the Klamath Indian reservation, some time ago caused a separate school to be opened for pure blood and mixed blood Indian children. The Crawford children, quarter breeds, applied for admission to the general school, and were denied admission. Thereupon their father started suit.

Judge Benson sustained the original demurrer filed by Judge Thomas Drake and Kuykendall & Ferguson, and an amended complaint was filed. To this another demurrer was filed, and today Judge Benson sustained this.

The decision of the court follows: "This cause is presented to the court upon an amended alternative writ of mandamus, requiring the board of directors of School District No. 7 of Klamath county, to admit plaintiff's children to the public school of said district.

"It appears to the court that the amended writ does not obviate the objections of the original writ, to which a demurrer was sustained by the court.

"It therefore follows that the court should sustain the demurrer.

"Let an order be entered in accordance herewith, and dismissing the petition and writ herein."

The first interstate forest rangers' convention held in the West will meet at Medford, February 18 to 21, and in addition to the officials and rangers of the Crater national forest, there will be large delegations of attaches from the Shasta national forest, headquarters at Sisson; Klamath National forest, headquarters at Yreka, and Siskiyou national forest, headquarters at Grants Pass.

The arrangements for the convention are in charge of Supervisor M. L. Erickson of the Crater national forest. He is at work preparing a program that will cover every question with which the forestry service men have to contend with.

"The question of forest fires will be one of the main topics," said Mr. Erickson at the White Pelican hotel Sunday, "and speeches by men of experience will tend greatly to assist in eliminating as far as possible the causes of forest fires, as well as bring out the best methods of fighting and controlling the fires, once they start."

Since the disastrous fires of 1910, which devastated large stretches of timber in all parts of the Northwest and caused great loss of life and property, the forestry service has made great strides in the work of preventing fires. This is especially true in the Crater national forest, and every summer men under the direction of Mr. Erickson have been building miles of trails and stringing telephone lines to all parts of the forest, which greatly expedites the work of battling the flames and results in the extinguishing of chance blazes before the flames gain headway.

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—Woodrow Wilson with his wife and others went to Ellis Island today and inspected every branch there.

### SUFFRAGETTES LOSE IN BRITISH PARLIAMENT

LONDON, Jan. 27.—The cabinet this afternoon decided to withdraw the franchise reform bill, thus putting an end to the hopes of the suffragettes for favorable action by the present parliament.

Following the announcement that the bill had been withdrawn the parliament building was searched for bombs.

Thousands of suffragettes are in parliament square. Hundreds of police are patrolling the streets around the house of parliament. The homes of the members of the cabinet are being guarded.

It is expected that grave suffragette outbreaks will occur.
