

TRIAL OF LABOR LAWYER STARTS

JUROR LOCKWOOD TO BE FIRST WITNESS CALLED

Storm of Objections Is Raised by the Defense in the Trial of Clarence Darrow, When an Announcement to This Effect Is Made by Special Prosecutor Ford in His Address to the Court

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 31.—Special Prosecutor Ford opened the argument for the state in the second trial of Clarence Darrow, the Chicago labor attorney, who is accused of bribing prospective jurors for the McNamara trial.

During his address, Ford announced that he would call Juror Lockwood to testify that he had been bribed by Darrow. This brought forth a shower of objections from the defense.

Ford contended that he depended on Lockwood to prove that there was a general criminal conspiracy on the part of labor leaders to secure the acquittal of the McNamara brothers, who entered pleas of guilty to charges of dynamiting the Los Angeles Times building in 1909.

Further hint of crookedness on the part of Darrow was brought out when the state's attorney announced that he would prove that Darrow bribed Mrs. Ortie McNamara and George Bohn to use their influence to cause Ortie McNamara to retract his confession, through which the McNamaras were convicted.

ENGLISH LABORERS ARE FAVORING SUFFRAGETTES

LONDON, Jan. 30.—The national convention of labor organizations in session here today went on record as strongly supporting the fight for woman's suffrage.

A resolution was passed by the assembly opposing any franchise reform bill that does not include votes for women.

Asquith Called Traitor

DUNDEE, Jan. 30.—Suffragettes last night attempted to break up a meeting being addressed by Premier Asquith, who is being strongly criticized by the militants on account of his open opposition to their fight for enfranchisement. Asquith had just been introduced by the lord mayor when the suffragettes appeared and charged up the aisle, crying "traitor." They were forcibly ejected by the police.

JIM THORPE SIGNS UP WITH NEW YORK GIANTS

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Jan. 31.—Jim Thorpe, the world-famed Sac and Fox Indian athlete, will play with the New York Giants next season.

President Garry Hermann of the National League today received a message to this effect from a representative of McGraw's at the Carlisle Indian school. Thorpe will be one of the Giant's pitchers, says the telegram.

The decision of Thorpe to enter the big league comes as a direct result of the action of Secretary Sullivan and the special committee of the Amateur Athletic Union in declaring Thorpe a professional, following his sensational work at the Olympic games.

In 1909 Thorpe pitched with a minor league baseball team, and when he returned to the Carlisle Indian school in 1911, he applied for reinstatement as an amateur, and this was granted by the A. A. U.

Despite the fact that Thorpe was largely responsible for the American victory at the Stockholm Olympic meet, that he won the all-around championship there, that he established several world's records on the track, and that he has been chosen as a member of the All-American football team, and excels in other sports, the committee saw fit to declare him a professional last week, and expunged his records from the amateur slate.

MAYOR OF BERKELEY ATTACKS CHARITY BOARD

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 30.—"There is something vulgar and ostentatiously pagan-like in citizens of this nation of ours sitting around a banquet table while pictures, showing the pitiable conditions in the homes of the poor are being shown. In the name of Christ and the hungry millions, I protest against such procedure."

The above message was sent to the banquet committee of the Board of Associated Charities by J. Stitt Wilson, the socialist mayor of Berkeley. Wilson sent this reply after receiving an invitation to attend the banquet, for which a \$3-a-plate fee will be charged.

FEDERALS AND REBELS MAY CLASH AT JAUREZ

EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 30.—Two troop trains bearing 500 Federal infantrymen, reached Jaurez this afternoon. It is believed that this will

cause the postponement of the attack until the rebels are reinforced.

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The federal troops are occupying the entrenchments on the outskirts of the city. Colonel Rebago, with 1,000 federal cavalrymen, is hurrying here from Chihuahua.

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JEFFRIES SIGNS FOR LONG CRUISE

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 31.—Jim Jeffries is mounted high on the water wagon, while Barney Oldfield is keeping pace with that vehicle, to be present at any fatal loss of equilibrium by its once pugilistic passenger. Upon Jeffries' ability to cling to the seat for one year, during which time he must also forego cigars, tea, depends the ownership of a \$2,000 pot which reached its size in small pieces, Jeffries and Oldfield raising each other, but while a party of friends applauded. The former champion denied his abstinence decision was made with a view to another "come-back" attempt.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 31.—The resignation of George McCabe as solicitor general of that branch of the government, was announced today by secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture. The resignation becomes effective March 4.

McCabe was the bitter foe of Dr. Harvey Wiley, formerly chief of the bureau of chemistry of the department, and foremost in the fight against adulterated foodstuffs. It is McCabe's intention to practice law in Portland.

BALKAN WAR AGAIN IN PROGRESS

UNKNOWN TO OFFICERS, MEN START SKIRMISHING

Authorities at Washington Are Informed of the Intention of the of Allies—Time for Formal Opening of Hostilities Is Fixed at 7 o'Clock Monday Evening—Both Sides Are Prepared.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 1.—Messages from Chaltalja say that skirmishes are already in progress between the Turks and Bulgarians who are encamped there.

It is stated that several sharp clashes have occurred, the soldiers acting without the knowledge of their commanders.

The Turks are most eager to fight. WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 1.—The Bulgarian commander in chief expects to resume hostilities at 7 o'clock Monday evening, according to information to Ambassador Rockhill at Constantinople. A cable message was received here to this effect this afternoon.
