

WILSON STUDIES MEXICAN MATTER TAFT IS ANXIOUS

PRESIDENT WILL CONSULT THE
PRESIDENT-ELECT

Wilson Denies Himself to Visitors and
Keeps in His Library—The Situation
in Mexico Is Admitted to Be
the Cause of All the Careful Study.
Taft Stays Up Most of the Night
Wrestling With Problem

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 12.—President Taft worked on the Mexican problem until 4 o'clock this morning. He arose early and resumed his work.
It is presumed that before acting the president will consult President-elect Wilson.
An invasion cannot be made without the consent of congress.

PRINCETON, Feb. 12.—President-elect Wilson denied anyone an audience today. He is considering carefully the Mexican situation. He spent the day in his library.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 12.—The battle between the Diaz and Madero forces was resumed at 7:30 this morning, when the federalists started an assault on the arsenal. A shell cannonading is in progress. A shell struck the Mutual Life Insurance building and exploded. The building caught fire and its destruction is feared.

The federalists increased the artillery and the Diazites improvised trenches. Last night's dead are estimated to be from 200 to 2,000.
Bodies lie in the streets and chaos reigns.
Food is at a premium and a famine is feared.

EL PASO, Tex., Feb. 12.—Salazar is moving from Casas Grandes, devastating and burning towns and destroying property of Mexicans and foreigners as he proceeds.
Colonias Diaz is in ruins. One house is standing.
Other American colonies are in danger.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 13.—The war department has ordered a provisional brigade of 5,000 men to be in readiness for instant service, to be gathered from Niagara to San Francisco in the event of mobilization.

VALLEJO, Feb. 12.—Orders were received at Mare Island navy yard today to rush repairs on the cruisers California and Maryland. They will be needed in Mexico. The Glacier will leave Saturday for Acapulco with stores, machine guns and ammunition for marines of the Colorado and the South Dakota.

At San Diego 500 men are in readiness to leave on a minute's notice.

INFANTRY COMPANY CAN BE
QUICKLY MADE UP HERE

"In the event that there should be a call for militia, I believe a creditable military company could be organized in Klamath Falls in a very short time," said Captain Charles J. Ferguson, of the Third Infantry, in response to a query.

"The majority of the men here are well acquainted with the use of a rifle, and there are quite a number of Spanish-American war veterans, in addition to men who have served in the regular army and the National Guard. With these men as non-commissioned officers, and using the squad unit, the raw material could be transformed into a trained fighting machine in a remarkably short space of time."

Ferguson has been active in military affairs in this state for several years past. Previous to the Philippine insurrection, he was a member of the Second Oregon, and he went to the front with that famous infantry regiment. Afterwards he was connected with the secret service in the islands.

Since returning Ferguson has been connected with the National Guard in different ways, and before coming to Klamath Falls he was commissioned as captain of Company L of the Third Oregon Infantry, stationed at Pendleton. A short time ago that company disbanded, but as yet Ferguson has received no notice of the removal of his name from the roster of officers.

MEDFORD PEOPLE CIRCULATING
A PETITION WHICH WILL BE
FORWARDED TO GOVERNOR
WEST

MEDFORD, Feb. 12.—A petition asking Governor West to pardon T. A. LeMasters, serving a 200 days' sentence in the county jail on a conviction for bigamy, is being circulated by friends in this city, and will be forwarded to Salem this week. Confinement in the county jail is supposed to have aggravated a slight touch of consumption, from which LeMasters is now suffering. Unless freedom comes before the expiration of his sentence his condition is apt to become serious and a speedy release is the only chance he has for life.

Gallagher was arrested at Chilochin and Burnett was arrested at Fort Klamath. The latter has been conducting a livery stable at the Fort, and it is charged that he made a side business of furnishing the redskins with firewater.

Gallagher has been employed by the government on the irrigation project near Chilochin. It is claimed that he has made a lucrative practice of satisfying the thirst of Indians in the vicinity in which he lives.

SCIENTIST CLAIMS "NOD"
THEORY IS CORRECT ONE

UNIVERSITY OF LORELLA, Archaeological Department, February 13.—Editor Herald: Your article relative to Professor Hallock's theory of Cain's location near Klamath Falls was received here with great interest, and we are glad to inform the public that the professor's report is corroborative with extended research work we have been pursuing along this line.

A place has recently been discovered near the University which gives every indication of having been occupied by Cain. Even the chairs at this place have been found to be Cain-seated, and the occupants, on being questioned closely, admitted that they had formerly raised Cain.

Further than this, some copies of the "Daily Stone Tablet," an issue of that period have been unearthed with articles bearing on this subject, one of which we quote herewith:

"One of the most recent arrivals to our community is Mr. Cain, who arrived Wednesday over the Euphrates & Oregon Southern, having had a private compartment on one of the company's palace mules. As Mr. Cain claims to be a member of one of the first families of the East, he was at once interviewed by a representative of this publication.

"He said: 'While the climate of my former location is all that could be desired there are, of course, drawbacks, and while I do not care to go into details, I will state that my family has had some unforgettable experiences with snakes.'

"On being questioned in regard to his position in the Cain-Abel scandal, of which much was published some time since, Mr. Cain was silent, and referred the reporter to his attorney.

"When asked concerning his long trip he said that for some time after starting it was rather cramped traveling, but that his animal en route had an increase of twins, and from that point he had the advantage of a double birth."

Undoubtedly my brother professors will rejoice on hearing of these discoveries, which cannot help but be of coveries, which can not but be of inestimable scientific value. If any other noteworthy excavations are made I will forward the news immediately.

ROARING CANNON SHAKE CENTER OF CAPITOL CITY

MEXICAN GUNNERS SHELL THE
SKY SCRAPERS

Cable Office Is Struck by Cannon Ball and Adjoining Office of the United Press Correspondent Is Wrecked. Impossible to Estimate the Loss of Life—Prisoners Are Released and Roam the City

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 12.—The center of the city is shaking.

The roar of cannon and machine guns in the bombardment of the arsenal in which the Diazites are entrenched continued all morning.

The gunners are shelling the high buildings on which many of the Madero guns are mounted.

A shell struck a wall of the building of the cable office, where the United Press correspondent was writing his dispatches. The room adjoining was wrecked.

Many of the skyscrapers have been damaged, and it is impossible to authentically estimate the losses. It is known that many have been killed.

Three thousand prisoners have been released from Belen prison, and they are scattering over the city.

Anarchy reigns in several sections.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 12.—Firing on both sides was stopped for an hour this afternoon.

It is reported that this was for the leaders on both sides to confer at the British legation.

Two American women, Mrs. Holmes and Mrs. Griffith, were killed this afternoon by shells.

The Zapatistas are arriving to aid Diaz.

INTERVENTION SEEMS TO BE
THE ONLY PLAN CONSIDERED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 12.—The intervention plans contemplate an army from the north entering Mexico City, while an army from the east prevents filibustering expeditions.

It is expected that intervention will mean that the Mexicans will forget their own differences and unitedly oppose the Americans.

From one to four years occupation is predicted.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 12.—Everything is in readiness for the United States intervention in Mexico whenever President Taft feels that such a step is necessary.

Transports in Galveston harbor are prepared to take 6,000 troops to Vera Cruz and other points on the East Mexican coast in case of intervention. This force could go to strategic points ready to seize the railroads and supplies.

In the meantime, troops from the Texas border would march south to Mexico City. In this manner, it is estimated that it would take about two months to reach the capital.
