states in the order of their granting
suffrage, as follows: Wyoming, Colorado, Washingtow, Utah, Idaho, Cal-
ifornia, Washtngton, Utah, Idaho, California, Arizona, Kansas and Ore-
gon. Michigan was not represented.
There the suffrage there the suffrage law is under at-
tack in the courts. The suffrage
leaders said they wish to take no chances today of disappointment later
by including Michigan in the pro-suf-
frage line-up. A big battalion of men marchers representing the "National
Men's League for Equal Suffrage"
marched before a banner entitled "No Country Can Exist Half Slave and
Half Free- Abraham Lincoln," these
words being purported " the martyred president.
A float bearing nine women in
white flowing tunics, representing the nine suffrage states, and thirty-nine
in black gowns, typifying the "no-suf-
frage" states, followed.
The procession closed with state delegations arranged alphabetically,
marching in order. Along the line of
march, white uniformed "petticoat" cavalry vied with police in keeping
back the crowds behind the ropes.
Soldiers, marines and sailors also
