

STAR SESSION IS NOT THEIR PLAN

CALIFORNIA SOLONS WOULD HOLD TOGETHER

No Formal Entertainment Arranged for the President's Embassy by California Democrats—Visit of the Secretary of State Will Be Brief, According to Announcement Made in Washington Today

SACRAMENTO, April 25.—It is the general belief around the assembly today, that the conferences between Secretary Bryan and the California legislators will be taken up with Governor Hiram Johnson present, and both houses sitting in joint session.

The leaders of the fight for the passage of the anti-alien land bill say that they will strenuously object to any attempt to secure a star chamber session. The matter, they say, is of vital interest to California people, and they should know the full details.

For fear politics might jeopardize legislation, the democrat leaders have decided to hold no formal entertainment for Secretary Bryan.

WASHINGTON, April 25.—President Wilson does not believe that it will be necessary for Bryan to remain in California over three days. The secretary will explain to Johnson and the legislators just how far they can go, and if the suggestion is accepted, that ends the matter.

LONDON PAPER RAPS AT GRAP JUICE FEED

LONDON, April 25.—The following comment regarding the grape juice dinner given by Secretary of State Bryan to Ambassador Bryce, the British ambassador, appears today in the Pall Mall Gazette:

"Official life in Washington under the Wilson-Bryan regime holds but little prospect of gaiety. We greatly fear that the American capital will become known, during the next four years as 'Wishy Washington.'"

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 25.—"Grape juice gaiety is at least safe and sane," said Mrs. Belva Woodward, society leader, discussing the London dispatch.

"We should not worry about the London criticism of 'grape juice diplomacy.' It is much more preferable than dollar diplomacy."

SAY THEY SAW THE VIRGIN MARY

TWELVE OAKLAND PEOPLE ATTEST TO SEEING VISION IN THE HOME OF DECEASED FRIEND. STORIES ALL AGREE

OAKLAND, April 25.—Twelve local people declare that they saw a vision of the Virgin Mary in the home of the late Robert Lavery, while his body was awaiting burial. The apparition, they say, endured from 2 until 6 this morning.

"The room was dark at the time," said Thomas McGinnis, a deputy in the supervisors' office. "We opened the doors and shifted the window shades to throw light into the room, but nothing affected it."

"I went and stood before it, but it made no difference. I saw it, but I can't explain."

The statement is corroborated by the others who were in the house at the time.

INFORMER SOON TO BE RELEASED

LOS ANGELES, April 25.—Ortle McManigal, the self confessed dynamiter, is to be released from prison, according to a statement made by Assistant District Attorney Ford this morning.

"McManigal, I believe, is entitled to his liberty," said Ford. "Undoubtedly he will be liberated within a short time."

Ford refused to name an exact date.

Without a care and assured of three hearty meals a day and a suite of six carpeted, communicating cells, life has become a succession of comfortable rest days to McManigal, who was to have been the state's star witness in the trial of the McNamara brothers.

Meanwhile the McNamaras are laboring eight hours a day in prison stripes at San Quentin penitentiary. While the McNamaras are ceaselessly laboring in the dusty prison tile mill, McManigal spends his few waking hours fashioning flimsy paper doilies, which he slips into fantastic designs with his well kept hands.

McManigal has been Los Angeles county's star boarder for two years. From a drawn-faced man of 150 pounds he has developed into the aldermanic size of 230 pounds. His pale, round face is complacent and satisfied.

Occasionally McManigal is given a day's outing. Recently he was absent from jail all day. The records indicated that he had been taken to the district attorney's office—but at night he returned with three tiny mackerel and a smelt. He had been fishing.

McManigal is charged with dynamiting the Llewellyn Iron Works. He has never been brought to trial. After he testifies at the third trial of Clarence Darrow it is believed he will be quietly released. In the meantime, Ortle McManigal doesn't worry.

WEST PREPARES FINE PROGRAM

THE WESTERN GOVERNORS WILL EACH SPEAK ON SOME QUESTION VITAL TO HIS STATE AT COMING CONFERENCE

SALEM, April 25.—The tentative program of addresses for the conference of the Association of Western Governors, which meets in Salt Lake June 5, 6 and 7, has been prepared by Governor West, president of the association. To each governor in the association a topic is given. However, each man is left free to choose his subject, providing the one allotted to him does not meet with his approval. The subjects apportioned among the various executives are as follows:

Arizona, Governor George W. P. Hunt—"Federal Control of Our Mineral Resources."

California, Governor Hiram W. Johnson—"State or National Control of Our Oil and Potash Deposits."

Colorado, Governor Elias M. Ammons—"Our National Conservation Policy."

Idaho, Governor John M. Haines—"How Idaho Views Federal Control of Our Unappropriated Forest Areas."

Kansas, Governor Geo. M. Hodges—"Control of Our Flood Waters."

Minnesota, Governor Adolph O. Eberhard—"What Minnesota Is Doing With Her Logged-Off Lands."

Montana, Governor S. V. Stewart—"Our National Policy as to the Use of the Public Range."

Nebraska, Governor John N. Morehead—"What Improved Methods of Dry Farming Have Done for Nebraska."

Nevada, Governor Tasker L. Oddie—"What the Reclamation Service has Done for Nevada."

New Mexico, Governor William C. McDonald—"Control of Interstate Waters."

North Dakota, Governor L. B. Hanna—"Timber Culture and the Prairie States."

Oklahoma, Governor Lee Cruce—"Our National Policy as to the Indian Tribes."

Oregon, Governor Oswald West—"The Reforestation of the Interior Department."

South Dakota, Governor F. M. Byrne—"The Control of Our Fuel Supply."

She drove her friend, Mrs. Pussy, from her new home and immediately took possession of the nest and adopted the two kits, hovering them at night to keep them warm, and allowed only Mr. Thompson to come near the nest, which he did very often to feed the young kits while Mrs. Biddy was not capable of the feat. The hen now defies all intruders, and guards her adopted children as if they were her own by birth.

SHERIFF'S WIFE TO GET PENSION

There are said to be practically no debts. This, with the aid promised by the brother, William Singler, will relieve the family of danger of destitution.
