THREE COUNCILMEN OUT FIVE ARE RE-ELECTED

Following are the members of council chosen at Monday's election: First Ward—Leslie Rogers.

Second Ward—Long term, O. D. Matthews; short term, W. C. Townsend.

Third Ward—John H. Hamilton. Fourth Ward—Ben S. Owens.

Fifth Ward—W. O. Huson.

A very light vote was cast in the city, due largely to the fact that there were no contests in either the First or Fourth wards. Balloting was heaviest in the Second and Third, where there were several seeking office.

In the second both of the present councilmen were defeated. C. B. Crisler lost to W. C. Townsend for the one-year-term by two votes, and Fred Melhase ran second to Matthews.

Frank M. Upp, another candidate in the Second, finished three votes behind Melhase.

In the Third ward Councilman John H. Hamilton won out over his three opponents, Horatio Orem, Dr. W. A. Leonard and William H. Shaw by a big vote, polling 119, while his nearest competitor, Orem, received 78. The field was pretty evenly split between the three also-rans.

In the Fifth Ward only 79 votes were cast. Of these W. O. Huson received 49 and Fred Hyndman 30.

The name of Mrs. Maude Zink was written on 29 ballots in the Fourth, but Owens polled 196 votes.

SAY MODOC NORTHERN RUNNING HERE BY 1915

That the Modoc Northern Railroad company's trains will be running into Klamath Falls by 1915 is the assertion made by construction officials of the company, according to reliable information received here from Susanville.

The railroad, which commences at Fernley, Nevada, has just completed its line to Susanville, and work trains are now running into that city.

With the completion of the line between Fernley and Susanville, according to the officials, work will be rushed forward toward Merrill. The work trains and crews are to be started at once grading and laying track between Susanville and Outlook, in Modoc county.

This piece of work will include the line through the Pitt River canyon. Following its completion, the next to be taken up will be to Merrill.

According to the right of way secured for this railroad, the route will enter Oregon on the east side of Tule Lake. The line will skirt the shores of the lake to Merrill, and from there it will be run to this city.

Outlook, the northern terminus of the work next to be taken up by the construction department of the road, is about 90 miles from here. The closeness of the work outlined indicates that the remark about the railroad entering Klamath Falls in two years was not a boast.

OREGON SAVED TO U. S. 70 YEARS

Saturday was the 17th anniversary of the founding of the first American civil government west of the Rocky Mountains at Champeog, about thirty-two miles south of Portland, on the east bank of the Willamette River.

This was known as the "provisional government," and was formed by the handful of early settlers in order to have social laws to govern affairs until the United States government saw fit to extend its actual political jurisdiction over the "Oregon country."

In a sense Champeog may be justly called the "Plymouth Rock" of the Pacific coast. A celebration is being held today under the auspices of members of the Oregon Pioneer Association, ex-President P. H. D'Arcy presiding.

Short addresses were made by Judge G. B. Dimick, Oregon City; ex-Governor T. T. Greer, Colonel Robert A. Miller, C. B. Moores, all of Portland, and others. Vocal music will be provided by the Veteran quartet. Honorable F. X. Matthieu, the only survivor of the meeting three score and ten years ago, is becoming imbued with the Jacksonian spirit, and declares that "by the eternal" he is going to be there once more in 1914.

RIVER, LAKE CLOSED TO HUNTERS

No more Lower Lake or Klamath River Hunting.

No more going after ducks in the Klamath River marshes.

No more skipping down Lake Ewauna early in the morning to plug a few mallards.

Upper Klamath Lake, hereafter, will be the scene of the greatest shooting activity.

The whole matter is this: Warden J. J. Furber of the Lower Klamath Lake bird preserve has just received a letter from L. Alva Lewis, agent of the U. S. biological survey, in which information is given that there is to be no more hunting within the boundaries of the bird preserve.

The limits of the Lower Klamath Lake bird preserve, as set aside by executive order, begins three miles below this city. In addition to taking in the Lower Lake and Klamath Straits, the territory includes both sides of the Klamath River to a point half a mile this side of Keno.

Following is the letter regarding the order which has been received by Furber.

"Your attention is called to the provisions of Section 26 of the new Oregon Game Code as passed by the last legislature.

"The provisions of this section

make it unlawful to hunt on either public or private lands, on national bird or game reservation or National Parks.

"This section, therefore, will after June 3d, make it unlawful to hunt on private lands within the boundaries of the Klamath Lake reservation as originally set aside by executive order.

"Arrangements will soon be made by which you will receive a supply of posters for posting private lands on the Klamath reservation."

OFFICERS LEAVE FOR ROSE CITY

Indian Agent Edson Watson and Deputy United States Marshal W. B. Griffith left Sunday for Portland, the former to appear before the federal grand jury on matters pertaining to the Klamath reservation, the latter in charge of two prisoners bound over on a charge of taking whiskey on the reservation.

In addition to arresting the pair, Griffith served thirty or more subpoenas on Klamath Indians whose testimony is wanted by the grand jury. Stanley Pedro, who is charged with a statutory offense, and who gave bonds for his appearance, also went to Portland.

SPORTSMEN TO CLOSING WATERS

PROTEST MEETING TO BE HELD HERE SOON

Government Order Closing Lower Lake and Link River to Duck Hunters Is Held to Be Unfair—According to This, Farmers Who Purchase Licenses Will Not Be Allowed to Hunt on Their Own Premises

Following the publication in the Herald of the notice of closing Lower Klamath Lake and the lower river to hunters, through the biological survey of the department of agriculture there is much protest heard among the sportsmen as to the ruling. They declare that this is an injustice, and steps are being taken to hold a protest meeting.

"With the lower river and lake closed to hunters, how will we be able to do any hunting at all?" said Barney Chambers this afternoon. "All this advertisement as to the hunting and fishing here will make the country look ridiculous with the best shooting grounds cut off.

"The Upper Lake was never very popular with the hunters, because it is much colder there than in the vicinity of the Lower Lake, and the birds do not daily long around the Upper Lake after the season opens. They soon leave for the Lower Lake, and according to the ruling just sent by Mr. Lewis, Klamath sportsmen will not be allowed to shoot them."

"Another ridiculous thing about this ruling," continued Chambers, "is that the farmer or other man owning land within the limits set for the bird reserve cannot shoot on even his own property. Most of the men I have talked with believe this ruling is detrimental, and a meeting will soon be held to make a protest against it."

Other sportsmen of the city and county are of the same opinion as Mr. Chambers. They are much incensed at the ruling that would deprive Klamath county hunters of their favorite hunting grounds, and believe the matter should be taken up with the Washington office of the Biological survey.
