### JAPS PRAY FOR MIKADO'S HEALTH

WILSON WIRE INQUIRY AS TO HIS HEALTH

Bulletins Reliterate Statement That Mikado Is in No Immediate Danger, but Announcement That His Fever Is at 103 Causes Much Apprehension Among His Subjects—Sends Thanks to Wilson

TOKIO, May 23.—Although the hourly bulletins reiterate the statement that the health of Mikado Yoshihito is no cause for alarm, the people are much worried.

All day and all night scores of people have knelt in the streets and in the temples, praying for the speedy recovery of the emperor. Many question whether the bulletins give the real danger to the public.

Today, the mikado's fever reached 103. The pulse action registered 90 beats to the minute, and respiration 30.

WASHINGTON, May 23.—President Wilson today received the following personal cablegram from Emperor Yoshihito of Japan:

"I am deeply touched by your kind message inquiring as to the extent of my indisposition. Permit me to express my sincerest thanks to yourself, the American government and the American people."

BOSTON, May 23.—That he will directly connect William M. Wood, president of the woolen trust with the planting of dynamite at Lawrence, Mass., to arouse prejudice against the strikers last year, was the announcement made today by District Attorney Pelletier.

Through woolen mill employees, office attaches of the textile company, telephone operators and other witnesses, he stated that he could build a chain of circumstantial evidence connecting all the defendants with the plot.

The paying teller of a bank today identified several large checks, made payable to Wells Attiaux, signed by the American Woolen company, and approved by Wood.

It is expected that the state will stand or fall on these checks. Pelletier made it clear that he believes they were given to reimburse Attiaux for the \$500, which Breen alleges Attiaux gave him the day the dynamite hiding plot was hatched.

NEW YORK, May 23.—Bud Anderson, the Vancouver, Wash., lightweight, may appear in the squared circle in this city. The St. Nicholas Athletic club, one of the most exclusive organizations in Gotham for the promotion of sport, is anxious to have Anderson appear, and toward this end they have taken the matter up with Dick Arnold, Anderson's manager.

According to officials of the club, Donald has been offered a match between Anderson and Leach Cross, who, like the westerner, is a strong rival for Ritchie's title. A good-sized cut of the money, with a copulent guarantee, is also offered for a bout between the two in July.

Boxing in New York, under the direction of a boxing commission, is a contest that is decided along the point system. It amounts to but little more than sparring, but in the 10-round mixes the topnotchers occasionally show flashes of their real ability.

Anderson has become quite a favorite with the New York fans, following his rise from obscurity within a few months. It has long been in the minds of Gotham fans that K. O. Brown was practically invincible, and his defeat by Anderson, also the succumbing of Mandot, has boosted the westerner's stock considerably.

CONSTANTINE TO LEAD HIS ARMY

ATHENS, May 23.—King Constantine and his staff and the "King's Own" brigade, left this afternoon for Salonica, where the Grecian troops are mobilizing for an attack on Bulgaria.

It is Constantine's intention to personally command the army engaging the Bulgarians.

### "BATTLE BOB" IS AT IT AGAIN

CURRENT ISSUE ROASTS DEMOCRATS

Wisconsin Senator, in Today's Issue of LaFollette's Magazine, Says Tariff Control by the Democrats Is to Proceed as Before, and Will Not Be Treated as an Economic Problem

MADISON, May 23.—In an editorial headed "Tariff Making in the Dark," LaFollette's Magazine today discusses the defeat of LaFollette's proposal in the senate to have the senate committee on finance question the manufacturers of a number of staple articles before proceeding further with the tariff measure.

"Tariff legislation under Democratic control is to proceed exactly as it did under Republican control," says the article in part. "The subject is not to be treated as an economic problem. Instead, it is to be the stake in a partisan game, and the American people are to suffer the consequences."

W. C. A. MEETING ON AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Or., May 23.—With the blue sky the only canopy, the Second World's Christian Association Conference will be held in Portland June 29 to July 6 in the natural amphitheater, which comprises the field of the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club, according to announcement made today by a local committee in charge of the program.

The speakers will deliver their addresses from a stand which has been erected in the middle of the field. The stands about the speaker's platform will accommodate 10,000 persons. The natural acoustic properties of the place make it possible for persons in the seats farthest away from the speaker to plainly hear what is said on the central platform in a conversational tone.

More than 12,000 delegates and 25,000 visitors of every nationality are expected to attend the conference, according to reports received today from chairmen of delegations from all parts of the world. Among the important subjects which will be discussed will be "The Family: Marriage and Divorce," and topics relating to social purity, intemperance, prison reform, capital and its relation to labor, immigration, emigration, international peace, Christianity and public education.

STRIKERS AND SCABS BATTLE

SAN FRANCISCO, May 23.—Striking union employees of the Pacific Gas & Electric company and strikebreakers employed by the company fought this afternoon near one of the plants here.

Edward Brogan and George Curtis, two unionists, were seriously stabbed during the melee before the arrival of the police. J. W. Krompton, one of the strikebreakers, was arrested.

### GOT EDUCATION; NOW GETS GIRL

SEATTLE, Wash., May 23.—That little naked fellow, who began his troublesome operations way back in Garden of Eden days, can sure work wonders sometimes. One of his worthiest works had its next-to-last chapter ending today, when Paul Patkotak, an 18-year-old Esquimaux, sailed for Point Barrow, the Arctic extremity of Alaska, to marry Miss Alice Ahlook, a native teacher in the government school there.

Three years ago Paul peeked through his body and head-encircling fur garments at Alice, and asked her to marry him. "Go get an education," answered the haughty Esquimaux enchantress. On the next boat the 15-year-old boy left for Seattle. He came here wearing native furs and unable to speak English. In the three years he's been here he learned the language, got a pretty fair start in bookkeeping, and picked up enough shorthand to hold him a job most anywhere.

### FICKERT ACCUSES FRISCO POLICE

FICKERT MAKES SENSATIONAL CHARGE

District Attorney Who Is Conducting Bribery and Graft Investigation Says Tenderloin and Officials of the Police Department Have Massed \$50,000 to Be Used for the Defense of Indicted Officers

SAN FRANCISCO, May 23.—"Fifty thousand dollars has been raised by members of the police department for the defense of the eight policemen and detectives now under indictment," said District Attorney Charles E. Fickert, this afternoon.

Fickert says he has been greatly hampered in his work of collecting evidence against the eight men who are accused of working with bunco steers and confidence men. This, he says, convinced him that the graft ring might possibly affect higher ups.

According to Fickert, by the time the investigation of the case is well under way, it will be shown that Detective Frank Esola and other officers under indictment are only small portions of a "system" that rivals the notorious underhand work of the New York police.

"I have made a pretty careful investigation," said Fickert, "and I am convinced that the enormous fund which appeared so suddenly for the defense of eight plain roundsmen and detectives was subscribed by police officers, and by parties conducting resorts on the Barbary coast, and in other parts of the tenderloin."

### CALLS COOLIES CAPITALIST TOOLS

SISSON'S SPEECH CROWDS THE GALLERIES

Keeping His Promise to President Wilson That He Would Not Make a "War Speech," or Inflammable Hatred Against Japanese, Mississippian Continues Defense of California's Anti-Alien Land Bill

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 23.—A further speech upholding the state right as supreme, and defending the California anti-alien land bill, was given on the floor of congress this afternoon by Thomas Upton Sisson, congressman from Mississippi.

Believing that Sisson's address today would contain some of the explosive statements he made a short time ago against the Japanese, the visitors' gallery of the House was crowded. Those who were expecting a fiery speech, characteristic of Sisson, were disappointed, as he kept his promise to Wilson.

In opening his address, Sisson stated that it had not been his intention to make what might be termed a "war speech." On this, he stated, the president was misinformed, as he merely wished to defend the Webb bill.

Sisson made no direct reference to the Japanese in his talk. He declared that the unrestricted admission of aliens meant the ruin of the American farmer.

This influx, he said, threw the bulk of the land into the hands of great corporations. In order to increase their wealth, these syndicates, the speaker alleged, would people the tracts with cheap laborers.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 23.—Six Chinese girls, held as slaves in this city's Chinatown, were released from bondage this morning by a corps of detectives connected with the bureau of immigration.

Among the girls rescued was Ah Bow, a pretty Chinese girl, born and educated in California. She tells a pitiful tale of the treatment accorded the slave girls.

The fact that girls were held in bondage was discovered by Miss Donaldina Cameron. She has long been connected with missionary work in the Chinese quarter, and the disappearance of Ah Bow caused her to make an investigation which revealed the slavery conditions.

Miss Cameron directed the rescue work of the detectives. The officers chopped their way through barricaded doors for three hours before they reached the room where the girls were held prisoners.

The immigration commission has commenced an investigation as a result of the discovery. It is believed that they will soon arrest the enslavers.

A. G. Lewis, formerly of the Monarch grocery, returned Thursday from Portland, where he selected a new 1913 Cadillac touring car. The machine was shipped to The Dalles, and was driven from there to Klamath Falls by way of Bend.

## Recall Ballot is Arranged by De Lap; Rival Statements

### CHARGES BROUGHT AGAINST WORDEN BY RECALL PETITIONERS

Unlawful, unwise and inefficient management of county finances; the incurring of a large amount of unlawful indebtedness; unnecessarily increased taxation; waste of money in county expenses; favoritism in contracting with and employing relatives of members of the county court and certain firms and corporations at a financial loss to the county; unlawful issuing and selling warrants of the county at a discount; carelessness and inefficiency in auditing bills against the county; accepting employment from corporations whose interests are opposed to the public interests and at far greater salaries than that paid by the county; inefficient and unsatisfactory service as a county judge; failure to get value received for money spent for roads, though petitioners are not opposed to good roads; lack of ability, as shown in the past to expend future levies for roads; inability to construct a new courthouse with economy and a due regard for cost, though petitioners are not opposed to the new courthouse and are indifferent as to its location, but only insist that it shall be built economically, and that the cost shall not be excessive, which the past actions of said officer indicate that he will not be able to do.

### COUNTY CLERK DELAP IN A QUANDARY FOR SOME TIME

The ballot form for the special recall election, to be held June 2, was arranged and given to the printer by County Clerk DeLap Friday afternoon. The form of the ballot follows:

This is followed by the statements for and against the recall.

The style of the ballot has been the cause of much discussion around the courthouse for the past two days. The failure of the legislature to complete the initiative measure creating the recall has left a number of matters unsettled.

This is especially true regarding the form of the ballot. It was first thought that, in addition to the candidates, there would be submitted to the voters on the same ballot the question of voting either for or against the recall. This was finally believed to be confusing, and upon the advice of District Attorney Irwin, DeLap left this question off the ballot.

### WORDEN'S JUSTIFICATION OF HIS COURSE AS AN OFFICIAL

This is not a regular election. It is an attempt to remove me from office in the middle of my term.

Two years ago you elected me on a basis of Good Roads and the building of a new courthouse on the Hot Springs site. I have kept my promises. The work has been done well, and as cheaply as consistent with permanency. What has been done will not have to be done over again.

The new courthouse has been built economically and well. We have saved money for you in our plan.

I deny the accusations of the opposition on the ground that they are gross misrepresentations, and intended to cloud the issue and fool the voter. No other county in the state has accomplished so much in the way of good roads. The men who are behind this recall have threatened me ever since my term of office began unless I would submit to their dictation.

The grand jury report was not correct, and has been so proven relative to culvert, harness and other matters. If wrong in some, wrong in others. All I want is a square deal. The opposition will not give it.
