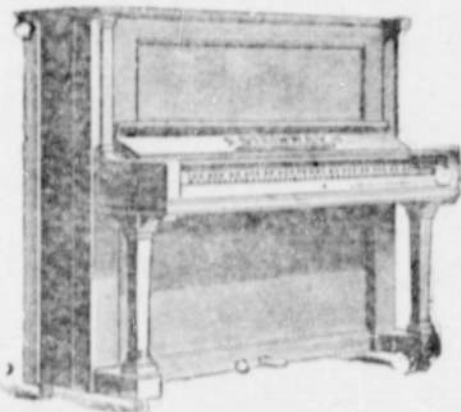
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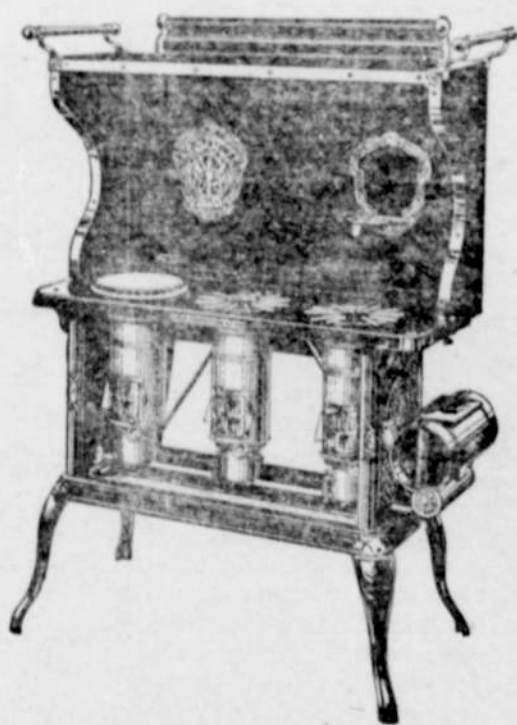

FLOOD OF IMMIGRATION VIA CANAL

Resolution Introduced in Parliament Asking That the Consular Service on the Pacific Coasts of Both North and South America Be Increased. Opening of Canal Is Believed Will Be an Impetus to Shipping

ROME, June 9.—That Italy expects to become a factor in the world's shipping when the Panama canal is opened was indicated in Parliament today, when Deputy Millana presented a resolution asking the increase of the Italian consular service on the Pacific coast.

Italian ship owners are said to be preparing for a big increase in trade when the canal opens.

As a result of the opening of the great waterway, much immigration is expected.

It is understood that the accused police officers are weakening. It is believed that Detective Frank Esola will make a full confession of the operations of the graft system before he is sentenced tomorrow.

WILSON SAYS HE

HAS 'EM GOING

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 9.—In his semi-weekly conference with the newspaper men today, President Wilson stated that his "insidious lobby" charge has already been effective.

He believes that many lobbyists have already been run out of Washington in fear of the white light of publicity. "I think the breed will be scarce during the remainder of the tariff season," he said, smiling.

SWEPT BY BLAZE

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., June 9.—Fire today is sweeping the entire north-eastern section of the city.

The loss is estimated from \$700,000 to \$1,000,000.

A high wind is spreading the blaze, and the entire district is doomed.

MUNCIE, June 9.—Messages of congratulation from Presbyterians all over the country were received here today when the seventy-fifth anniversary of the establishment of the First Presbyterian church of Muncie. The celebration will continue through the week.

BANK EMPLOYEES' WAGE ABOUT 8900 A YEAR

Heads of Large Financial Institutions, Department Stores and Other Concerns Subpoenaed by Committee. Marshall Field Pays Men Employees From Twelve to Nineteen Dollars Weekly

CHICAGO, June 6.—The state legislature's committee probing the vice conditions in Illinois resumed its investigations here today, when subpoenas were served on forty witnesses. These include the heads of the largest banks, department stores and other business houses.

Several students of economics have been summoned to appear and offer testimony.

It is the endeavor of the commission, in this manner to ascertain whether low wages paid to male employees here is any factor contributing to the ruin of young girls. The witnesses are to be asked regarding the wages paid to men employees.

The average wage of a man working in a Chicago banking house is \$900 a year, according to George M. Reynolds, the first witness examined. Reynolds is the president of numerous banks in the Middle West.

The average wage paid men and boys employed by Marshall Field & Co. is \$19 a week, according to Jas. Simpson, manager of that concern. Simpson stated that the minimum wage paid to men over 21 years of age is \$12 a week.

Police Make Ludicrous Blunder

STOCKHOLM, June 6.—High officials of the Swedish police bureau are still suffering from near-nervous prostration on account of a ludicrous blunder in connection with the guarding of the two eldest sons of the crown prince, Prince Gustaf, aged 6, and Prince Sigvard, aged 5, during their recent visit in the country.

On learning that the little princes were to occupy a lonely cottage at Lilla Skuggan, with only a maid to look after them, the bureau, fearing they might be kidnapped, sent two policemen to keep watch.

A week later the authorities received the following telegram from the policemen:

"Princes left for home this morning. Just learned that we have been guarding the wrong cottage."

WIRELESS MEN

BACK AT WORK

SAN FRANCISCO, June 5.—The strike of the wireless operators against the Marconi company has been settled by a compromise, and the men have reported for work. The company refuses to recognize the union, but the strikers have been reinstated, conditions were bettered and hours shortened, but the wages were not increased.

PITTSBURG, June 6.—Discontented with his wages, and failure to gain promotion when shifts were made in the office, William Sage, a clerk in the Pennsylvania Railroad ticket office, shot and killed James McNair, chief ticket agent, and fatally wounded Ralph Pauley, the chief clerk, and then escaped. He has not yet been apprehended.

WILL COMPLETE

CRATER LODGE

MEDFORD, June 6.—When Alfred L. Parkhurst, president of the Crater Lake company, leaves for the lake two weeks from now, he will have with him several automobile loads of carpenters and brick masons for the immediate completion of Crater Lake Lodge. Parkhurst wishes to have the fifty rooms of the hotel ready for occupancy by the latter part of the summer.

The lodge will be modern in every respect, and will have fifty regular bedrooms, a billiard room, dining rooms and every convenience that goes to make up a first class hotel. Cottages will be provided for those who cannot find rooms in the hotel.

LONDON, June 7.—A jury today awarded damages against Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst and her daughters and Mrs. Tuke, all prominent suffragettes, for smashing the windows of business houses.

Each merchant suing was awarded \$1,800.

BERLIN, June 7.—More than \$15,000,000 premiums for the government "sick insurance" system were paid in Berlin last year, according to a report just issued. One million men and women in Berlin are insured against sickness. Approximately \$14,750,000 was paid out, including cost of administration. For physicians and medicine a little more than \$2,500,000 was paid out; \$4,000,000 insurance for time lost through illness or accident, and \$1,500,000 for treatment at hospitals, sanitariums and private homes.

BUT THREE MEN WILL BE LOST BY GRADUATION—MUCH NEW MATERIAL IS IN SIGHT FOR TRYOUTS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 7.—Prospects are as good as they possibly could be at the end of the second semester," said Captain Bob Bradshaw in speaking of the football situation for the coming year. "We lose only three men by graduation, Bailey, Walker and Briedwell. It looks like all the old men will be back, and from present indications there will be a fine bunch of new material. Coach Bezdek will be on hand the early part of September, and will probably have all his plans arranged by the time school opens.

"When Bezdek coached here in 1906 he turned out a championship team. The situation now appears as if he will be able to duplicate the same next year. Three good men are coming down from Eastern Oregon, while several good prep stars will come from the high schools of Portland. Another thing which makes the prospects bright is the fact that several men now in college, who probably would have won their 'O' had they gone out, will go out next year.

"The schedule for next year," said Captain Bradshaw, "is the most favorable one we have had in years. All the games, with but one exception, will be played on neutral grounds. There will be no long trips. Five games will be played, and Manager Geary is planning to have some good second strings played on Kincaid field during the season."

The season should prove profitable from a financial standpoint, since the schedule is a favorable one. The new system of student body tickets, according to Manager Geary, will help greatly in the season's financing. At least this system will bring out much larger crowds than have heretofore attended the Varsity football games.

SAY PROOF IS NOW UP

TO THE REPUBLICANS

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 7.—The fact that Senator Charles E. Townsend of Michigan has stated that President Wilson is the biggest tariff lobbyist, making a charge by hearsay against the president, puts the burden of proof on the republican party, according to democratic members of the senate.

"This is a serious charge to be made from hearsay," said Chairman Reed of the sub-committee conducting the investigation. "The committee did not intend to summon President Wilson."

"We are seeking to find a lobby," said Senator Overman. "I believe, too, that we have succeeded. It represents mighty interests arrayed against the passage of the Underwood tariff bill."

"If any republican believes the democrats are forced to vote on the tariff question against their conscience," added Reed, "or through the exertion of party power, they are at liberty to name a committee and examine the members of the party. If they don't do this, they can't complain."

TAFT TRIES IN VAIN

TO USE WILSON'S SEAT

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 7.—Former President William Howard Taft spent an hour visiting the Capitol today. While there he exchanged reminiscences with members of congress, viewed the new seating arrangement in the house of representatives, and wandered idly about the corridors.

Entering the executive offices during the absence of President Wilson, Taft surveyed for some time the new presidential chair. He tried vainly to sit in it, but could not do so.

The former president was the luncheon guest at the White House. While there he told the reporters that he had lost thirty pounds since leaving office.

This afternoon Taft played golf at the Chevy Chase links.

ANAPOLIS, Md., June 6.—Under the present presidential administration, the man who enlists in the United States navy is to be given exactly the same chance for advancement as is given the graduates of the United States naval academy.

Announcement to this effect was made today by Josephus Daniels, secretary of the navy, who is here attending the midshipmen's commencement exercises.

Daniels' talk as to equal opportunities for all men who serve on Uncle Sam's floating fortresses came during the speech he made just before presenting the graduating midshipmen with diplomas.

"The time is not far off," said Daniels, "when every ship in the navy of this country will be a school ship. You gentlemen must remember that the enlisted man is just as ambitious and as patriotic as you, and it is up

to you to assist them in every way possible.

"In its advertisements for recruits the navy department has been promising the young men of the nation that it will teach them trades. This has caused a great enlistment from country towns in the interior, and this is composed largely of young men who are ambitious to gain promotion. We intend to see that this promise to the enlisted men is kept to the very letter."

MAXIMUM PROFIT LAW

IS SUGGESTED AS A CURE

CHICAGO, June 7.—The enactment of legislation providing for a maximum profit for merchants and other employers of labor has been suggested by Lieutenant Governor James O'Hara, who is in charge of the social evil investigation being conducted by a committee from the Illinois legislature.

According to O'Hara, this law would be in the form of a measure limiting the legal profit of any concern to a certain percentage of the actual investment.

"If such a measure as this is passed," said O'Hara today, "it will curb the plans of the large employers who are fighting the minimum wage bill. These people have threatened to throw the addition burden of expense caused by such a measure on the consumers, but the passage of this measure would prevent such an action."

TRAIN DITCHED; TWO WILL DIE

SPLIT SWITCH THROWS TWO ENGINES AND SANTA FE LIMITED TRAIN FROM THE TRACKS

NEAR POMONA

POMONA, Calif., June 7.—As a result of a split switch, two engines pulling the Santa Fe's double header overland limited, were thrown from the track this afternoon. Two coaches followed the locomotives.

Two members of the train crew will die from the injuries received. None of the passengers were injured seriously.

MINE ON FIRE;

THIRTEEN LOST

POTTSVILLE, Pa., June 7.—With thirteen miners entombed, the coal mines of the Scott Colliery company near Mount Carmel, caught fire at noon.

Twenty-five miners, unconscious from black damp, were rescued and two corpses have been recovered.

The rescue of the other thirteen men is impossible.

YOUNG GIRL IS

LEADING WORKERS

NEW YORK, June 7.—Hannah Silverman, aged 17, and known as the "Joan of Arc of the Strikers," marched to this city today at the head of thousands of workers from Paterson, New Jersey, to participate in tonight's procession.

This will include delegations from I. W. O. organizations all over the United States.

McLOUGHLIN WINS

IN FIRST MATCH

NEW YORK, June 6.—Maurice McLoughlin won the first set from Australia in the Davis Cup match. He defeated Rice 6-1, 6-3, 6-3.

The lightning drives of the American champion were a complete puzzle to the Australian, and he was easily eliminated from the contest.

State Forest Reserve Bill Reported

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 6.—The public lands committee has voted to report Senator Chamberlain's bill creating a state forest reserve 50,000 acres out of the Santiam national forest, giving in exchange state lands in the forest reserve. State students in forestry will receive instructions in forestry on this reserve.

"Leave Off the Last Car."

HAMBURG, June 6.—Railway employees are a bit puzzled over the latest official notice, reading: "The last car shall not be attached to the two trains as it is always subject to unpleasant oscillation."

MILLIONAIRE VINDICATED BY JURY

WOODS IS ACQUITTED ON EVERY CHARGE

Atteaux Acquitted on Four Counts, and Collins Guilty on Two, and Is Found Not Guilty on Three—Attorney for the Defense Wants a Charge of Attempted Jury Bribery Investigated in Full.

BOSTON, June 7.—William W. Wood was acquitted on all counts. In the case of Frederick Atteaux, the jury disagreed on four counts, and he was acquitted on the fifth, while Dennis Collins was found guilty on the first two counts and not guilty on the other three.

Woods was immediately discharged from custody.

Collins and Atteaux remained in their seats while Attorney Hurlburt for the defense reviewed briefly the charge of an attempt to bribe Juror Shuman. He said:

"The charge that an officer of this court tried to bribe a juror strikes at the very heart of our system of justice. I demand an investigation. If any attorney has been guilty of an attempt at bribery, I believe that he should be immediately publicly disbarred. In my own behalf, and in justice to myself, my client and associates, I ask the court to put witnesses up before it and get at the truth right here and now."

Judge Pelletier said that the grand jury would investigate the charge on Monday.

Pasteur Is Favorite
