FINANCIER IS HERE ON A VISIT

A. BURLINGAME JOHNSON WAS LARGELY INSTRUMENTAL IN DEVELOPMENT OF THE PHILIPPINE ISLANDS AFTER THE WAR

Klamath Falls has had the distinction of receiving the attention for a few days of A. Burlingame Johnson, one of the big California financiers.

Mr. Johnson is probably better known in the Far East, where he spent many years. He was at Manila at the time of the starting of the trouble between the United States and Spain, and after the termination he was instrumental in bringing millions of dollars to the islands for investment.

It was through the enterprise of Mr. Johnson that the first electric line was built in Manila, and the interurban line constructed between Manila and the provinces. Mr. Johnson was one of the men appointed by the government that helped to adjust the indemnity paid to the powers as a result of the Boxer trouble.

Mr. Johnson now resides at Pasadena, Calif., where he has a beautiful home. On arriving in the city Wednesday evening he immediately looked up C. F. Stone and Judge Gale, with whom he was well acquainted in the Philippine islands.

Mr. Johnson's visit here was a purely business one, and it may be that his trip will result in his becoming interested in large tracts of timber in the county and the establishing of another sawmill plant. Mr. Johnson is already interested in the lumber business, and with his son owns a sawmill at Mt. Hebron. While he refused to divulge any of his plans, he stated that he was very much impressed with the Klamath country, and expected to return here later.

John G. Swan, formerly county school superintendent, was up Friday from his ranch on the Merrill road. Since leaving the office, Mr. Swan has gone "back to the soil" with a vengeance.

SHOWS DURING THE ELKS RODEO

HORSE MISSING HERE IS SEEN IN CALIFORNIA

Instead of straying, the valuable mare that has been missing from Steve Sabo's ranch in Swan Lake Valley since June 3, has in all probabilities been stolen, according to information brought to this city Friday night by James Curnow, who came overland from Red Bluff, Calif.

Curnow, who came in Friday night, hearing of the loss, reported that shortly after leaving Red Bluff, he passed three men with a camping outfit, driving two horses and leading two more. One of the horses being led tallied exactly with the description of the strangely marked mare lost by Sabo, and the man in the back seat of the conveyance was holding a colt, apparently only a few hours old. The Sabo mare was heavy with foal when she disappeared.

On the night the horse disappeared Sabo was in Lakeview attending to business matters. During the night someone fired a shot near the Sabo house, apparently to frighten Mrs.

Sabo, who was alone in the house. The following morning the horse was missing.

Since that time, the owner has advertised extensively for the animal, but without success. The authorities have also worked to locate the valuable horse, but have been able to find no trace.

Since Curnow's report officers at Red Bluff have been notified. Sabo left on Friday afternoon for Red Bluff to identify the animal in case the men are apprehended.

GREAT SALE OF TIMBER ARRANGED

TRACTS AMOUNT TO OVER HUNDRED MILLION

Erickson and Other Forest Officials Are Here Arranging the Details. Local Sawmills, It Is Understood, Will Be the Bidders—Timber Is Said to Be All Near Klamath Falls and Upper Klamath Lake

One hundred and twenty-five million feet of timber in the Crater Lake National forest is soon to be placed on sale in this county. The timber is all adjacent to Klamath Falls and Upper Klamath Lake, in different tracts.

Forest Supervisor M. L. Erickson, in charge of the work in the Crater Lake National forest, is here from Medford, in charge of the arrangements for the sale. Assisting him are members of the forestry service, and they will remain some time.

The timber is to be sold to local sawmills, it is understood. There are several local concerns that purchase all of their timber from the forestry service, the logging being done under government supervision.

GAME WARDEN FINLEY IS SUED FOR DAMAGES

State Game Warden William L. Finley, Sheriff Charles C. Low and Deputy Game Warden J. J. Furber are defendants in a damage suit commenced in circuit court Saturday by Jack Cockery, who asks \$5,000 for false imprisonment.

Cockery was arrested March 29 by Furber through a case of mistaken identity, the officer taking him for Ned Connolly, whom he sought with a warrant for arrest on charge of having deer meat in his possession out of season. The man was brought to Klamath Falls, and kept in the county jail over night, and the following morning, when he established his identity, he was liberated.

The complaint was filed by Merryman & Duncan and J. H. Carnahan. In this, Cockery alleges that he made every effort to prove his identity before he was locked up, but without avail.
