

LOS ANGELES HAS A HEAVY RAIN

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA IS NOW REJOICING

Snow Carried From Mountains to Denver for Street Battle—Four Deaths From Heat in Chicago, and Weather Forecaster Says Temperature May Reach 100-Mark Before Day is Over—Cincinnati Suffering

LOS ANGELES, June 27.—Fifteen hours of continuous downpour of rain breaks all records for the last thirty-five years. There is general rejoicing all over Southern California.

The rain is still falling, and in some cases the fruit crop has been damaged. This is offset, though, by the enormous benefit to the crops.

DENVER, June 27.—The temperature today reached 87. There are no prostrations.

For the benefit of the members of the turnverein who are here from all parts of the nation for an athletic meet, two carloads of snow were brought from the mountains and deposited in the streets. The visiting Turners held a merry snowball fight as long as the snow lasted.

CHICAGO, June 27.—The temperature this morning registered 90 degrees, and was mounting steadily. On this, the third day of the hot spell, there are many prostrations, and no sign of relief.

CINCINNATI, June 27.—At noon the thermometer reached 93, and the prospects are that the afternoon will be warmer. There have been numerous prostrations, and the lack of ice is causing much distress.

CHICAGO, June 27.—At noon the temperature was 93, and Forecaster Cox issued a special bulletin, warning the people that the thermometer may register 100 before night.

Four deaths and scores of prostrations have been reported.

Lajoie Is to Be "Bench"

CLEVELAND, June 27.—It was officially stated at the headquarters of the Cleveland baseball team that Napoleon Lajoie, one of the best known players in organized baseball, is to retire soon as a regular player.

Lajoie will be kept as pinch hitter. He has slowed considerably in his fielding work.

Lajoie started playing big league baseball in 1897. He signed up with the Philadelphia Americans, and since then has been continuously in the game.

Lajoie was for years the manager of the Cleveland team, and its nickname in fandom is an abbreviation of the name bestowed on him by his parents. He has always finished high in the hit column of the American League, and last year finished fifth with an average of .368 for the season.

JAP OUSTING TO BE INVESTIGATED

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 27.—Secretary of State Bryan, in conference with President Wilson today stated that the state department intends to investigate the incident at Hemet, Calif., yesterday, where Japanese laborers and farmers were driven out of the community by ranchers.

"The Japanese embassy has made no representations at all regarding this," said Bryan. "The state department is taking the initiative."

NOLAN MAY BE RIVERS' SECOND

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—Trainer Nolan, former manager of Willie Ritchie, the world's champion lightweight, came in from his ranch today after receiving a big offer from Joe Rivers to appear in the Mexican's corner to advise him in his fight with Ritchie on the Fourth of July.

It is believed that Nolan will accept this offer, as he and Ritchie have much bitterness between them.

TARIFF BILL REPORT ON 4TH

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 27.—There is no prospect that the senate caucus will make a report on the Underwood tariff revision bill before July 4th.

This information was given President Wilson today by leaders in the senate house.

AGAIN KAHN IS STAVED OFF DAY

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 27.—The lack of a quorum again prevented the members of the house judiciary committee from taking any action on the resolution of Congressman Julius Kahn of California, asking for the inspection of all correspondence between Attorney General McReynolds and Attorney J. L. McNab of California.

Chairman Clayton assured Kahn that he would make a special effort to have all the members present tomorrow.

ASKS FOR STILL ANOTHER SESSION

SACRAMENTO, June 27.—Superior Judge Curtis Wilbur today issued a statement demanding an extra session of the California legislature.

This, he says, is needed to rectify Governor Johnson's mistake in signing the wrong juvenile court act.

Wilbur is a leader in white slave prosecution in this state.

HAYDEN PICKED FOR ATTORNEY

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 27.—It is generally believed here that President Wilson will nominate Thos. Hayden of San Francisco as federal district attorney for California.

Hayden and Matt Sullivan, who were last night named as special prosecutors, will push the Caminetti-Diggs and Western Fuel cases at once.

It is understood that Hayden accepted the position of special prosecutor only after assurance that he would be made permanent district attorney.

MIDDLE WEST DAMAGES BY HEAT

MANY KILLED AND HUNDREDS PROSTRATED

As Usual, With the Grain Dying in the Fields, Stock Market Wolves Are "Bulling" All Futures—Blistering Wind Sweeps From Chicago Westward to the Rocky Mountains, Thermometers Register 100

CHICAGO, June 28.—Excluding the fatalities in Ohio and Indiana, more than sixteen people have been killed and 200 prostrated by the extreme hot weather affecting all the territory from Chicago to the Rocky Mountains.

The weather bulletin this morning predicted that the thermometer would rise to over 100 degrees, and this has been confirmed. There is no relief promised for forty-eight hours.

The minimum last night was 86. Hundreds spent the night in the parks while the Loop district was a veritable furnace.

There were six deaths this morning. Forty hospital internes have been started on the principal corners to attend to the prostrated. The crop damage all over the Middle West is tremendous. Already the grain speculators are "bulling" in futures.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 28.—Two died and nine were prostrated this morning.

ST. PAUL, June 28.—Seven were prostrated and two dead at noon.

DETROIT, June 28.—Street thermometers register 105. There have been several deaths in the state.

LINCOLN, Neb., Yesterday the thermometer registered 98. It is much cooler today.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 28.—The following temperatures were reported at noon: City 60, clear; Seattle 65, cloudy; Portland, showers; Los Angeles 64, clear.

TEAMSTERS MAY DECLARE STRIKE

CINCINNATI, June 27.—Eight thousand teamsters and omnibus drivers today sent notice to their employers that they will strike tomorrow unless the employers agree to confer with union's committee.

They demand a new scale of wages, saying it is impossible for them to support their families with the wages they now receive.

HAINES FALLS, N. Y., June 25.—After being in session six days, the American Library Association today closed its thirty-fifth annual convention with a discussion of "The Law That Stands the Test." Matthew S. Dudgeon, secretary of the Wisconsin Library Association, began the discussion with an address on that subject. Mrs. Mary Antin Grabau, author of "The Promised Land," discussed "The Benefit to Foreigners of Public Libraries." Other subjects discussed today were "The Relation of Libraries to Educational Methods," and "More General Use of Public Libraries by the Public."

JOHNSON JUMPS BAIL; IN CANADA

IS CONSIDERED AN UNDESIRABLE IMMIGRANT

If Barly Black Attempts to Stay in the Dominion, He Will Be Arrested and Deported—Made His Way Into Canada Wearing a Black Moustache—Chicago Blacks Hold Jubilee—On the Way to Paris to Fight

MONTREAL, June 27.—At the request of Secretary of State Bryan of the United States, the Canadian government today ordered the arrest of Jack Johnson, the negro heavyweight champion, who is trying to escape from the United States, where he has a prison sentence to serve for white slavery.

The negro will be held pending his deportation to the United States as an undesirable immigrant, should he attempt to remain in the Dominion.

Officers state that if Johnson attempts to stay in Canada, he can be arrested and deported. If he proceeds to France at once he will not be molested.

It was learned today that Johnson was wearing a false moustache when he crossed the border.

CHICAGO, June 27.—Charles DeWoody, special agent for the department of justice, has asked Attorney General McReynolds to request the Canadian government to detain Jack Johnson and return him to America.

The saloons in darktown last night noisily celebrated the flight of Johnson. "brought home the bacon" at his Reno battle.

DeWoody stated that Johnson is in desperate financial straits. He believes the big black saw a chance to reach Paris or Australia to make some money.
