SAN FRANCISCO WINS IN THE HETCH HETCHY FIGHT

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 8.—The house committee on public lands went on record as being heartily in favor of the bill allowing the city of San Francisco to secure a filing on the Hetch Hetchy Valley as a reservoir site.

In executive session, the committee considered the bill thoroughly. It was taken up section by section, and amended as it was read.

The principal amendments made were to expedite the acquisition of the water supply by San Francisco. All tended to broaden the authority of Secretary Lane of the department of the interior in handling the matter.

The committee also provided regulations for the right of way for the city's water pipe line through the Hetch Hetchy Valley, etc.

The committee ordered today all the hearings in the matter closed. It is expected that the committee will complete its favorable report in time for presentation in the house of representatives tomorrow.

The San Francisco delegation, which has been here in the interests of securing this filing as a source of supply for a municipal water system, are jubilant over the victory, and they are celebrating in big style.

It developed during the hearings that the opposition to the filing was altogether on the part of corporations now furnishing water to the city. The advent of the city water supply would necessarily mean the death of these companies.

SOLDIERS AND MINERS IN BATTLE

SOUTH AFRICA SCENE OF LABOR TROUBLES

Famous Johannesburg Is in Hands of Gold Miners, Who Are Looting Gun Stores, Holding Up and Wrecking Trains and Fighting English Troopers—Six Killed and Seventy-Five Wounded in Bloody Battle

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa, July 5.—Rioting gold miners are causing a reign of terror in this city.

This morning, in addition to looting stores and committing other depredations, the miners robbed the gun shops. As a result, all are armed for further disturbances.

Several buildings have been burned. A number of railroad trains have been held up and some wrecked.

Six men were killed and seventy-five wounded in a pitched battle on the streets this morning.

The police were completely routed and the authorities called for cavalrymen. The troops repeatedly charged the rioters during the fight.

Reaches St. Paul

ST PAUL, July 5.—A. J. Koehn, the United States naval officer who is making a trip from the source of the Mississippi River to its mouth, arrived here today. The last half dozen miles to this city he had an escort of a score or more of small boats. Major Keller and Governor Eberhart welcomed Koehn, and each gave him a message to the mayors and governors of cities and states where he will make stops along the route.

Koehn is making the journey in a sixteen-foot rowboat, provided with cooking and sleeping accommodations. He has so far been able to keep his schedule for the trip, and plans to make the entire distance in ninety days.

Fourth Gets Sixteen in Chicago

CHICAGO, July 5.—The records show a total of sixteen deaths in this city as results of Fourth of July celebrations. It is estimated that nearly 800 were more or less injured.

McLEMORE'S NAGS ARE SURE SPEEDY

Following the victory of his four white horses in the chariot race at the Rodeo Friday afternoon, D. M. McLemore received a telegram from Calgary, Alberta, stating that his race horse, Hal Gray, had won second money in a \$5,000 purse there yesterday.

George C. Pendleton, who is in charge of McLemore's horses in Canada, is confident that Hal Gray will be even more successful in Winnipeg and Regina than in Calgary.

Will Discuss Caminetti Case, Or—

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 5.—Asserting that the democrats are trying their utmost to prevent any discussion of the Caminetti incident in the house, Representative Mann has threatened that when the house convenes, that with the aid of other republicans, he will prevent any business coming before the house. He threatens filibustering tactics until the republicans are permitted to discuss the case.

A. A. U. CONTESTS TO CLOSE TODAY

CHICAGO, July 5.—The last competitive events of the big athletic carnival at Grant Park stadium, the National Amateur Athletic Union championships, started this afternoon before the largest crowd that has attended the games during the week. In several events two or more Olympic stars were matched, and some sensational performances were looked for.

The final heat of the 110 meter high hurdles at Stockholm, Sweden, was to be re-enacted this afternoon. Fred Kelly, star of the University of Southern California, was the favorite. Three other American hurdlers who pushed him to his remarkable performance at Stockholm, were his competitors again this afternoon.

J. P. Nicholson, captain of the University of Missouri track team; John R. Case, University of Illinois, and E. J. Wendell, Wesleyan University, were the three who were expected to make Kelly extend himself to the very limit to capture the event.

The Olympic games last year so overshadowed the National A. A. U. championships in this country that the lists were not well filled. This year, however, there were entered practically every athlete of renown and near-renown in America. It was confidently expected that with weather conditions favorable, there would be some new records hung up. The nine days' meet comes to an end tomorrow, when German turners stage competitive drills.
