

BOB HETTUS IS IN THE PRISON

IS ARRESTED WHERE HE STOLE THE HORSE

Youthful Half Breed Was Indicted as John Doe Tuesday—Is Charged With Assault With Intent to Commit Statutory Crime—Believed to Have Been After Another Horse When Taken Last Evening

Bob Hettus, the youthful desperado who has been sought since the 7th of July, when after an attempted assault upon Miss Mary Inman in Barnes Valley, he stole two horses, a saddle, chaps, bridle, pack saddle and provisions from the Charles Walker ranch, and decamped, was arrested Thursday night.

The arrest of Hettus was made at the Walker ranch, where it is believed that Hettus was returning to get another horse. Deputy Sheriff Lon Burt of Bonanza arrested Hettus, and started toward Klamath Falls with him. He was met on the road by Sheriff Low and Deputy Sheriff Brewbaker, and they brought the prisoner to Klamath Falls and lodged him in the county jail.

Hettus is under indictment for assault with intent to commit rape. A John Doe bill was returned in his case Tuesday by the grand jury.

A portion of the Walker ranch is in Lake county, and as it is thought that the horses were taken from that part of the ranch, Hettus was not indicted on the horse stealing charge. He may be indicted for this later.

Hettus appears to be under the impression that he was arrested for horse stealing, seemingly not knowing that the statutory charge will be pressed. He stated that he intends to plead guilty to the horse stealing charge, and it is possible that he will be a much surprised half-blood Indian when he is arraigned on the indictment returned by the grand jury.

Hettus, after drawing a pistol and threatening to kill Miss Inman on July 4th, returned to the Walker ranch, where he was working, and which he was occupying alone while the Walkers were here attending the Rodeo. He did not leave until the night of the 7th.

It was several days later before the theft was reported to the authorities, but since then men have been constantly on the trail of the youth. The looting of the home of William Duvall in Langell Valley, where Hettus was employed last winter, was charged against him, but he denies this.

When Hettus approached the Walker ranch Thursday there were several men in wait for him. He gave up without a struggle, stating that he had run out of food, and that he knew the posse would get him sooner or later.

Some are inclined to believe that instead of coming in to give himself to the authorities, Hettus visited the vicinity of the Walker ranch with the intention of taking another horse. The horse he was riding went lame, and Hettus, after hanging the saddle, bridle and chaps on a tree, walked the remainder of the time. Hettus stated Thursday that since leaving the Walker ranch he has been to Alturas, Calif. He appears to be sadly mixed on his geography, though, when closely questioned on this point.

INDIVIDUAL ELKS WILL OWN RODEO STOCK

By almost a unanimous vote the members of Klamath Falls Lodge, B. P. O. E. on last Friday night to accept the proposition offered by the directors of the Rodeo Amusement Association and surrender all of its stock in the Association for which the Lodge is to receive \$1142.86.

The lodge had subscribed for 51 per cent or 251 shares, but only had paid for 40 shares. After a thorough discussion of the matter it was decided that while the Rodeo was a big money maker, it was best for the lodge to dispose of its interest and let the stock be taken up by individual members of the Elks organization.

A resolution was passed requesting the directors of the Rodeo Association to pass a By-law limiting the sale of stock to five shares by any one Elk until all the members had been given an opportunity to purchase, and limiting the total ownership of stock in the association by any one person to ten shares. This was for the purpose of preventing a few persons from gaining control of the stock. It is believed that there will be no difficulty in disposing of all of the stock in small lots to members of the Elks.

The report of the Directors of the Association showed a wonderful bit of financing in the recent Rodeo. With only \$90 in the treasury the management succeeded in putting on a show, whose total receipts amounted to over \$6000.00, and after paying off some old debts, building bleachers, improving grounds, purchasing two chariots and the bucking horse, Pin Ears, a profit remained of over \$1400 cash.

WANT PAY FOR OLD WARRANTS

School warrants having a combined value of \$98, but with six per cent interest bringing them up to \$160.20, figure in two suits commenced in the Circuit Court by Alex Martin, Sr. and E. R. Reames, who were interested in the Klamath County Bank before its consolidation with the First National Bank. J. C. Rutenic is their attorney.

Martin is plaintiff in an action against the Bly School. He seeks to collect on a school warrant for \$65 issued June 14, 1903.

The Dairy school district is the defendant in the action started by Reames. He holds a warrant for \$12 made May 30, 1899, and one for \$21, bearing the date of June 14, 1903.

BRANDENBERG DENIES TROUBLE STORY

POSTMASTER SAYS THERE HAS BEEN NO TROUBLE BETWEEN HIMSELF AND THE POSTAL CLERKS

"There has never been any trouble between myself and clerks," said Postmaster Brandenburg, when asked in regard to the charges which appeared in Sunday morning's paper. "I presume that the story was instigated by J. B. McAllister, formerly head clerk, who is now under suspension. I have had some complaint relative to mistakes in the distribution of mail, and after a careful investigation I felt that the head clerk was unloyal to the office. For this, and other reasons charges were filed, and Mr. McAllister was suspended pending an investigation. This action was necessary, as I am personally responsible to the department for the service rendered the patrons of the office."

"It is very easy for a clerk in the office, if he is so disposed, to cause a great deal of trouble. I have known that things were not right for some time, but in the civil service a man cannot act as he would in conducting a private business, so it was necessary for me to secure absolute proof before I could act."

"I now have a most efficient and loyal corps of assistants and clerks, and they are doing excellent work."

MEN RAPIDLY DESERTING HUERTA'S FEDERAL ARMY

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 21.—It was learned authoritatively today that confidential advices received by the state department indicates that the Huerta administration in Mexico is tottering. Its complete downfall is speedily approaching.

The states of Carranza, Coahuila, Pasquira and Sonora have agreed to unite with Chihuahua, the home of the Maderos, in overthrowing Huerta. It is reported that troops from these states are all advancing on the capital.

Huerta's supporters, it is said, are rapidly deserting the administration. Each day sees a number of desertions from the federal army to the ranks of the constitutionalists.

SAN FRANCISCO STRONG FOR TOWN

Dr. Edwin H. Mauk of San Francisco, who has toured Northern California and Southern Oregon since June 22, in his automobile, spent a couple of days in Klamath, leaving for San Francisco Sunday morning.

The doctor was most emphatic in stating that Klamath was the coming city.

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THE LONGEST TRAIN ARRIVES

CALIFORNIANS ARE HERE FOR OUTING

Knights of Columbus and Their Wives to the Number of 160, Come in on a Special Train for a Vacation at Harriman Lodge—Will Remain at Upper Lake Resort Until Wednesday, When They Return Southward

Carrying 160 people on pleasure bent, a twelve-coach passenger train pulledarrived here Friday afternoon, the longest special train that has ever been operated on the Klamath Falls line.

The party is composed of members of the Knights of Columbus, a Catholic fraternal society, and their wives. They are from San Francisco, San Jose and Sacramento, and are here to enjoy a few days of rest and recreation at Harriman Lodge, the beautiful natural summer resort at the northern end of Upper Klamath Lake.

The excursionists were transferred from their special train to a train of day coaches, in which they were taken to Hanks Spur. There they went on board the steamer Winema, which is taking them to Harriman Lodge.

At the Lodge the party will spend their time boating, fishing and in enjoying the other pleasures the Lodge affords. A large number will go to Crater Lake, and several automobiles have been detailed to carry them to and from Klamath's greatest wonder.

CITY IS LEASED BY THE MOVIES

VERONA, ITALY, July 21.—Contracts were formally closed today for what is believed to be the largest and most expensive motion picture productions ever undertaken. The city of Verona itself has leased to the Cinematograph Company the ancient arena which compares almost in size, picturesqueness and antiquity, with the coliseum at Rome.

For the score or more of productions that are to be staged in the arena, the Cinematograph Company has already engaged 1,000 performers including nearly all of the best moving picture artists in Italy. City lions also have been secured for the productions together with an assortment of tigers, leopards and other wild animals that would shame many of the American municipal zoological parks.

The first production to be staged will be "The Last Days of Pompeii." For a portion of the scenes the entire company will be transported to Naples in order that some of the scenes may be taken on the actual site of Pompei, at the foot of Mount Vesuvius. The company will later produce a number of other historical films of a similar nature.

HETTUS TO BE TRIED MONDAY

"Not Guilty" was the plea of Robert Pettus, Klamath county's twenty-year old desperado, when arraigned before Circuit Judge Benson Monday morning. Pettus was indicted by the grand jury, charged with assault with intent to commit a statutory crime.

The lad will be tried Monday. E. L. Elliott was named as his attorney and the prosecution will be conducted by Horace M. Manning, in the absence of District Attorney John Irwin.

Pettus, in addition to the crime for which he was indicted, took two horses from the Charles Walker ranch in Barnes Valley. He eluded the officers for several days.

SHEEP REMAINS DULL ALL WEEK

PORTLAND, July 21.—Cattle market last week steady to strong. Improved beef outlet had bullish effect on prices. Prime steer top 8.00 to 8.25 with bulk of steer sales at 7.75 and 8.10. Eastern Oregon steers at 8.60 and cows 7.75 featured.

There has been a keen demand for choice butcher cattle especially cows and heifers. Sales were made in small quantities as the supply was comparatively short.

Best cows 7.75 to 7.25, heifers 7.25 to 7.50, choice bulls 5.50 to 6.00 and choice light calves at 9.00.

The hog market was steady to higher. One load of extra fine hogs sold at 9.40 Friday morning, bulk of light swine sales 9.15 to 9.30. Sound packers have been liberal buyers on the market and the light run was quickly absorbed.

Swine prices are apparently on a heavy basis at least for the present.

Sheep house business has been slow all week. Demand for both mutton and lambs has been light and the trade has shown no sign of improvement whatever over previous week's market.

A liberal top is 6c as some very good stock sold at that price. Prime killing ewes at 4.00, wethers at 4.25 and yearlings at 4.50 are extreme quotations in the mutton division.

TURKS TAKE A HAND IN THE GAME

PORTE WANTS EQUAL TERMS FOR ALL

Greek and Bulgarian Troops Engage in Battle at Petzovo, in Which the Bulgarians Are Routed—Both the Armies Suffer Fearful Losses—Bulgarian Atrocities and Destruction Is Protested by Ottomans.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 21.—The war office has received information that the Turks are occupying again the city of Lule Burgas.

The city was retaken after a desperate resistance by the Bulgarian troops garrisoned there. More than 135 Bulgarian soldiers were captured.

LONDON, July 21.—Following the rumored re-occupation of Adrianople, which has not been confirmed, the porte sent a formal note to the powers, demanding that Turkey participate in the next peace negotiations on equal terms with the Balkan nations.

A protest is made against the Bulgarian atrocities. The Turks allege that they needlessly massacred people and burned villages around the Black Sea.

ATHENS, July 21.—It was officially reported today that the Greeks now occupy Petzovo, after routing the entire Bulgarian front.

Both sides lost heavily during the engagement.

DIAS'S VISIT TO JAPAN CAUSES SPECULATION

TOKIO, July 21.—The announcement that Porfirio Diaz, the overthrown dictator of Mexico, is coming to Tokio is causing much speculation in official circles. Diplomats agree that the former president has some ulterior motive.

There are different ideas, however, regarding the motive. Some are of the opinion that Diaz is being politically exiled in this manner by President Huerta. It is contended that Huerta, in his present weakened condition, feels safer with Diaz across the ocean.

Other diplomats scout this theory. They contend that his mission is the negotiation of a Mexican-Japanese alliance.

LOS ANGELES, July 21.—General Geronimo Trevino of the federalist army is expected here to confer with Felix Diaz when he arrives tonight. It is reported that Trevino seeks the support of Diaz for a presidential aspiration.
