

MINERS AND NON-UNIONISTS FIGHT

TROOPS ARE CALLED TO QUELL DISTURBANCE

Operators Making an Effort to Open the Mines, But Are Handicapped Because Strikebreakers Are Going Over to the Ranks of the Strikers. More Troops Are Called to Guard Mines, and Disorders Are Expected.

CALUMET, Mich., July 28.—The striking copper miners, while parading the streets today, attacked a party of non-unionists, and several men were seriously hurt.

Troops were rushed to the scene to disperse the belligerents. The strike district is strongly guarded. The miners maintain a sul-

len attitude, and further disorders are expected.

The operators made a desperate effort to open the mines today, but were handicapped on account of the strikebreakers who were persuaded to join the strikers, or remain away from the mines.

The leaders of the Union are determined to have peace, but it is feared that many of the men are uncontrollable.

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WHITE SLAVERY WITNESSES GONE

THREE GIRLS HAVE STRANGELY DISAPPEARED

Federal Authorities Fear a Plot to Destroy Their Chances for Convicting Wealthy Residents of Los Angeles—Detectives Assigned to Case, and Severe Punishment in Store for Those Responsible.

LOS ANGELES, July 25.—The third witness in the white slavery cases to disappear in a week is Miss Evelyn Neabyth, one of the principal witnesses for the state. This morning she could not be located.

Christine Neal, one of the girls making charges against Los Angeles millionaires, escaped from the Whittier reform school last week.

Cleo Helen Barker, the principal witness against George Bixby, vanished yesterday.

So far no trace has been found of the girls. Detectives have been assigned to the case.

The federal authorities believe there is a general plot to get rid of all of the implicated girls, so the conviction of the accused men of wealth will be impossible.

STATE SUPREME COURT UPHOLDS THE DAY BILL

SALEM, July 24.—A. C. Libbey, respondent, versus Ben W. Olcott, secretary of state, appellant. This is the title of the case in which the constitutionality of the Day bill is tested, and which the supreme court has just held constitutional, reversing the decision of Judge Galloway.

The opinion is written by Justice Burnett, who holds that the legislature can do anything which the constitution does not prohibit. The opinion is based upon the principle laid down in the opinion, that "the legislature itself, acting directly, could have referred to the people any or all the laws enacted, and it is not perceived why it could not with equal propriety annex a lawful condition to a referendum of the same bills ordered by petition."

It is held that the act sufficiently states the measures upon which a vote will be so taken, that there was then actual material in existence subject to the referendum, and that it was competent for the legislature to provide for the referendum of its own measures only.

It is also competent for the legislature to anticipate a condition likely to arise in the future and consequently to provide legal rules applicable to such a contingency.

The opinion disposes of the contention that the law takes effect upon the happening of a contingency briefly, holding the law does not so depend, its going into effect at once, but the election may depend upon a contingency. The opinion is exhaustive, covering all points of the case, and sustains the constitutionality of the law throughout. The result of which is that there will be an election held next November.

Petitions for referendum have been filed in the office of the secretary of state, asking that the following measures, passed by the recent session of the legislature, be referred to the people for approval or rejection at the November election:

Sterilization of habitual criminals, degenerates and pervers.

Creating of the State Industrial Accident commission, and the Workmen's Compensation act.

University of Oregon appropriation (\$100,000 for additional building).

Provision for county attorneys in each county, and eliminating the office of district attorney.

LUNCH COSTS A CENT AT BARS

ST. LOUIS, July 25.—It has been just one month today since the anti-free lunch law went into effect here, and every one is agreed that there might as well not be any law.

Practically every saloon in the city sells a pretty fair lunch for one cent. Others have placed slot machines near the eats with placards calling attention to the law, and asking beer buyers to drop pennies in the slot if they get away with any of the food.

In one downtown saloon, one of the biggest in town, an inquisitive patron counted four cents in one of the pay-as-you-eat money boxes just after several hundred hungry and thirsty baseball fans, returning from a ball game, had eaten everything on the lunch counter. During the time the crowd was in the saloon, the attendant behind the lunch counter was busy elsewhere.

In some of the saloons the proprietors insist on the payment of the penny, but the customer gets a ticket which he doesn't have to turn in at the lunch counter, and which can be carried about and used as a sort of "rain check" ticket.

Nobody has been arrested yet for swiping a few hot dogs and cheese.

CHINESE REVOLT; NANKING IS TAKEN

SEVEN SOUTHERN PROVINCES OPPOSED

Shanghai Is Being Attacked, and Arsenal There Is in Danger of Capture—Ten Thousand Men Left to Defend Canton Against the Northern Revolutionists—Situation in New Republic Becoming Serious

PTKING, July 25.—Seven of the principal southern provinces are now opposing Yuan Shi Kai, in addition to the northern dissension.

The rebellion throughout the republic is becoming more serious. Dispatches from Canton state that 10,000 men have been left there to fight the northerners.

Dispatches for aid are coming in from Shanghai. That city is attacked by the rebels, and it is believed that they will capture the arsenal, which will replenish their equipment for carrying on the fight.

It is believed here than Nanking is in the hands of the revolutionists.

FARMERS MAY DISTIL FUEL

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—Removal of the restrictions which prevent the farmer from utilizing his waste fruits and vegetables to manufacture denatured alcohol on his property may soon be accomplished. Several congressmen today informally discussed plans for changing government rules which now prohibit the manufacture of this fuel.

The secretary of the treasury has been approached on the subject, and it is his opinion that no new law is required to permit the farmers to operate a distillery for the production of alcohol to be used as a fuel. He said today that merely abrogation of a present rule is all that is needed.

"All the many wormy potatoes, apples and other farm products that are unfit for sale can be turned into alcohol, which is more economical fuel than gasoline," said Senator Lane of Oregon today. Senator Lane is heading the movement to have the rule abrogated.

"In Germany," he continued, "they raise potatoes for the special purpose of distilling them. To be permitted to do this would mean not only much cheaper fuel for the American farmer, but also a new source of revenue, for he could readily find a market for the alcohol he did not use."

MULHALL GOES UNDER STRAIN

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—The Overman committee's investigation of lobbyists charges was suddenly halted this afternoon by the collapse of Col. M. M. Mulhall, after three weeks' occupation of the witness stand.

"For God's sake, have mercy," he cried brokenly. "I'm broken down." Mulhall was removed to his hotel, and the hearings were adjourned until Monday.

CHILD LABOR IS NEXT BILL—LANE

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—National child labor legislation to protect American labor from competition with the labor of children in factories, both at home and abroad, will be passed at the next session of congress, according to Senator Lane of Oregon.

"The reason the democratic caucus refused to put into the tariff bill the clause prohibiting the importation of goods manufactured by children into the states where child labor is forbidden," said Senator Lane today, "was that we did not want to weight the bill down with any more subjects that might endanger it. It was pointed out in the caucus that the cheap jute bags used for grain throughout the West are made by children in India, and that there is no economical substitute for them. A good many other similar problems were involved. At the regular session the majority will deal with this child labor problem as well as with a good many other matters of humane legislation, but we propose to do it systematically, and not in a haphazard fashion."

TEN DOLLAR HOG PRICE REACHED

PORTLAND, July 28.—Last week's cattle market was one of the most active ones of the year. Monday had one of the largest single day runs, containing considerable good quality of beef. Prime steer top is steady to strong at \$8 to \$8.25; cows and heifers \$7 at \$7.25 with occasional sales 15c to 20c higher. Outlet is broad and buyers keen for prime stuff.

The hog market run wild for six days, jumping in price from 9.35 to 10.00. Receipts have been unusually light and the trade has been unable to fill orders for pork supply.

The 10.00 price equals that of 1910 which was the highest hog market in the history of the Union Stock Yards.

Liquidation will probably be light for the next few weeks, or until the annual fall run of pigs commences.

Bulk of sales averaged 9.50 to 9.90. Smooth heavy swine are steady to strong.

The local mutton market has been slow and unsteady. Very light demand for either sheep or lambs and receipts have been comparatively small, mostly valley stuff.

Top quotations on valley lambs 5.25 to 5.50. Best Mt. Adams stock worth 5.50 to 6.00. Ewe tops at 3.75 and yearlings at 4.25 are extreme prices.
