

SUNDAY AUTO RIDE ENDS IN DEATH

THREE ESCAPE WITHOUT AN INJURY

Party in Car Piloted by Robert Adams, Were Riding After the Dance at Merrill, When the Too-Quick Twisting of Steering Gear Turned Car Completely Over—The Weight of Car Crushes Girl

Eighteen-year-old Gertrude Steeman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Steeman of Merrill, is dead as a result of an automobile mishap half a mile east of that town early Sunday morning, in which Robert Adams, son of J. Frank Adams, Rosa Zlabek, Miss Steeman and Ben Pickett figured. None of the others was hurt.

From what details can be gathered, the party had attended the dance at the Merrill opera house Saturday night, after which they went riding in the Adams car, which young Adams was driving.

At 1:20, as the car was speeding at a fast rate toward Malin, the car swerved slightly from the road. Apparently frightened, Adams gave the steering gear a big twist to throw the car into the road, but this locked the front wheels enough to turn the car completely over and twist its front end around in the road.

None of the occupants were thrown out of the car. Miss Steeman, who was riding in the front seat with Adams, fell on top of the latter, and the steering gear and back of the front seat struck her head and chest, injuring her.

Pickett managed to get out of the car through one of the rear doors, and rescued Miss Zlabek, who was not injured. The two of them got out Adams, who was pinned under the injured girl, and while the men held up the side of the car Miss Zlabek dragged out Miss Steeman.

The Steeman girl was rushed to medical aid. Her skull injury resulted in concussion of the brain, and she died Sunday night as a result.

The funeral services were held on Tuesday morning at Merrill. The remains will be interred at Mt. Laki.

CHARLES WALKER FOUND GUILTY BY JURY OF PEERS

"Guilty as charged," was the verdict of the jury in the Walker case, returned Saturday afternoon, convicting Charles Walker, a Barnes Valley rancher of an assault upon his

slater-in-law, Oská Coburn, a 15-year-old girl, who became a mother a short time ago.

The jury retired about 10 o'clock this morning. At 2 o'clock they returned into the court room with their verdict. The members are E. Zachariah, P. E. Hannon, Charles Bartlett, Joe Moore, Dan Ryan, G. F. Sevits, Lindsay Sizemore, A. E. Bensinger, George E. Gillett, Clarence Mitchell, C. J. Anderson and William Green.

Walker will be sentenced at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning. The penalty is from three to twenty years' imprisonment.

At the December term of the circuit court, the grand jury indicted Walker on a charge of stealing a horse. On account of the more serious charge which was pending, the trial on the horse stealing charge was postponed until the grand jury could indict him for rape.

MAXIMUM FOR JULY WAS 90

THE AVERAGE TEMPERATURE WAS 64.3

Lowest Registered by the Thermometer Was 36, on July 2, 13 and 15. Precipitation Amounted to One and One-Third Inches—Past Records Show This Is Average Mid-Summer Weather in Klamath Country

While people are dying by scores in the East, and crops are burning up in all parts of the Middle West under the burning rays of the sun, Klamath Falls and vicinity note an entire absence of any kind of discomfort from the heat. Many leave for the mountains during the summer months, but this is to camp, hunt and fish, not to escape the heat.

The meteorological records of the reclamation service show that the mean temperature here during the month of July was 64.3. Last year the mean temperature for the same month was 63.9.

The warmest recorded here during the past month was 90 degrees, on July 8, 18 and 31. The coolest nights were July 2, 13 and 15, when the mercury stood at 36. The extremes in July, 1912, were 93 and 33.

This year there was more precipitation than usual during July. In the thirty-one days just ended, the rainfall amounted to 1.37 inches.

A summary of the record for July follows:

Temperature—Mean maximum, 78.4; mean minimum, 50.1; mean 64.3; maximum, 90, on 8, 18 and 31; minimum, 36, on 2, 13 and 15.

Precipitation—1.37 inches; greatest in 24 hours, .99 of an inch, on 24; clear days, 16; partly cloudy, 11; cloudy, 4; with .01 inch or more precipitation, 4.

CHICAGO FIRM IS CHARGED WITH SELLING PUTRID MEAT

SEATTLE, Aug. 1.—Following the rest of three local commission merchants on a charge of selling impure foodstuffs, a charge that a Chicago firm deliberately misbranded rotten meat in order to unload it, was preferred.

The local merchants who were arrested were found to have in their possession more than 3,000 cans of rotten meat. This was all from the same Chicago concern.

A criminal complaint was started in the federal courts against Sulzberger & Son, of Chicago, the packing plant supplying the tainted canned goods.

Pure food inspectors allege that the concern deliberately misbranded the cans in order to unload a lot of unsold goods left in their warehouse.

It is claimed that some of the canned meat shipped to Seattle for local consumption was packed seven years ago.

BARBERS TRIM THE BARNSTORMERS

The Barbers skinned the Actors Sunday afternoon, but it was a close shave at that. In a hair-raising affair that went into an extra session, the razor swingers made the actors forget their lines for a moment. The affair was a pitching duel between Dale and Seimens, in which Dale was handicapped with a catcher out of practice. On the other side was Motschenbacher, as crafty an old head as ever spit on a mitt, in mid-season form, pegging 'em out at every station on the circuit.

The barbers broke into the run column in the first frame. Vincent lined one into the left meadow for a single; Seimens drew a pass; Shelton and Bean fell victims of Dale's benders; Vincent stole third and scored when Borel let one get by him; Motschenbacher grounded out, Dale to Garrett. One run.

In the third period the barbers added three more tallies. Vincent again led off with a clean single to left; Seimens smashed a hot one through the infield, sending Vincent to third, from which position he scored when Borel misjudged one of Dale's twist-ers; Shelton went out to Garrett; Bean was called out on strikes; Motschenbacher leaned on a swift one and lifted it to center field for what should have been an out, but Houston came too far up-stage and missed it, letting it count for a homer. Motschenbacher trotted around the sacks just behind Seimens; Walters lammed one to left, but was left on the path when Haynes fanned. Three runs.

The actors came across with a couple in the fourth session. After C. Arnold had grounded out to Thrasher, Garret waited for four wide ones, and took possession of bag number one; Dale was hit by a pitched ball, and Garrett went to second while Don limped to first; that method of getting started looked good to Mitchell, so he waited for four bad ones, thus sousing the bags; right here Terwilliger made a hero of himself by singling safely through the infield, allowing Garrett and Dale to romp home. P. Arnold ended the session by whiffing. Two runs.

In the sixth inning the actors annexed one on Arnold's two-sacker and an error by Vincent. In the seventh they evened the score on Houston's single and two errors by Walters.

The winning tally for the barbers was the result of Thrasher's clout for two bases, Burton's sacrifice and Borel's error.

Two pretty double plays kept the actors from scoring in the third and fifth.

Tappan was arrested here, but it was found that the crime had been committed in Siskiyou county. He was then taken to Yreka, where he awaits trial.

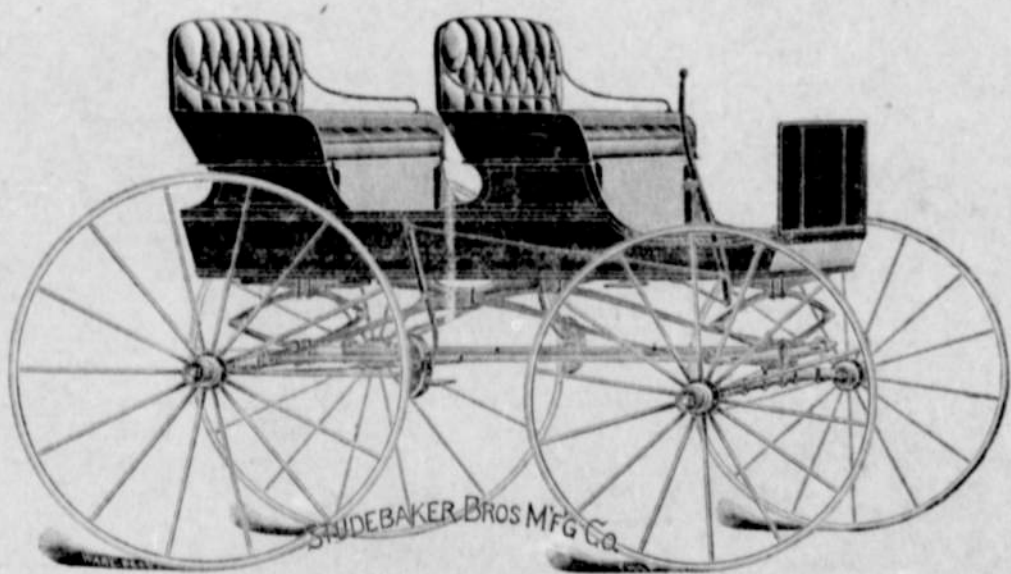
