EXPRESS RATES TO BE LOWERED

COMMERCE COMMISSION ORDERS "BIG CHANGES"

Rates on Practically Every Class of Parcel Under Fifty Pounds Lowered—Zone Systems Are Arranged for, and a Permanent Committee Composed of Members of Commission and Companies Will Be Named

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 4.—The Interstate Commerce Commission today ordered sweeping reductions in the express rates on parcels everywhere in the country. These range from 10 to 60 per cent. The order becomes effective October 15th.

The commissioners declare that for two years the rates will be experimental. Practically all the rates on parcels under fifty pounds are radically lowered. In the case of small packages carried more than 200 and less than 3,000 miles, the rates are nearly all lowered to the parcel post rate. Over 3,000 miles the express and parcel post rates are identical.

The order of the commission simplifies the tariffs. It establishes the block or zone system of tariffs.

A committee, composed of members of the commission and representatives of the express companies is organized by the order to devise the best avenues of transportation, and eliminate circuitous routes.

The commissioners assert that the express companies give away \$2,000,000 in free service each year through franks.

BULL MOOSE IS YEAR OLD TODAY

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Aug. 5.—St. Louis Bull Moosers will tonight celebrate the first anniversary of the birth of the new Progressive party with a banquet at Suburban Garden. William E. Cadmus, national organizer of the party, is expected to be the principal speaker.

Several who took a prominent part in the formation of the new party at its first convention in Chicago last summer, are expected to attend and make addresses.

Hundreds of messages from all over the country poured into local headquarters today, offering congratulations and prophesying victory for the party four years hence.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—National headquarters of the progressive party today was swamped with messages from all over the country, which predicted "long life and prosperity" for the baby party which was born just one year ago today in Chicago, when the organizers met in their first convention at Chicago, which resulted in the nomination of Theodore Roosevelt and Governor Hiram Johnson of California for president and vice president.

PHOENIX'S CITY

WATER CHARGED

PHOENIX, Ore., Aug. 5.—Highballs made of plain water are today a thing of the past in Phoenix. Even the home-made variety can be made just as "phizzy" and sparkling as the regular highball by turning on the kitchen spigot, for today the city water department turned on the water supply drawn from a new well which contains highly carbonated mineral water.

Experts who superintended the drilling for the new well say the supply will last the city for years.

INSTITUTE IS TO BE HELD AGAIN

STATE SUPERINTENDENT ADVISES AN EXPERIMENT ONLY THIS YEAR WITH SUMMER TRAINING SCHOOL

The annual county school teachers' institute will be held again this year, according to the school superintendent's office. This fall it will be held at the high school October 16, 17, 18. A number of instructors of state and national note will be here at that time to assist in the work. Special departments will also be a part of the program.

It was thought for a time that the institute would be superseded by the teachers' summer training school, as provided by the last session of the legislature. State School Superintendent Alderman, however, has advised the majority of the counties to continue the institutes, so the work of a few training schools can be watched for an experiment.

BRADNACK NOW

HAS ITS P. O.

Bradnack, the new town in California on the peninsula between Tule and Lower Klamath lakes, now has its postoffice. G. E. Bradnack, formerly of this city, is the postmaster.

Mail is sent to the new postoffice three times a week from Merrill. In addition, a school is being built in that community.

DAUGHTER'S HOME

Suffering from a paralytic stroke, Mrs. Clara Moore, mother of Mrs. G. W. White of this city, passed away Tuesday morning at the home of her daughter. She has been here but a short time from her former home in Oklahoma.

JINGO GETS LOOSE IN LOWER HOUSE

WANTS A FLEET AS BIG AS JAPAN OR BIGGER

Illinois Senator Interprets Recent Speech of Nipponese Admiral to Be a Threat Against the United States. Texan Wants Neutrality Law Repealed, So Powder Can Be Shipped to Mexican Revolutionists.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 5.—

A resolution proposing an emergency appropriation for three dreadnaughts to cope with Japan's warship building plan was introduced in the house today by Congressman Charles A. Britten of Illinois.

"Recently Admiral Takarade said that Japan intended to build a fleet strong enough to defeat the fleet of a 'certain nation,'" said Britten in explanation.

Congressman Stephens of Texas introduced a resolution proposing the repealing of the neutrality laws in order to permit the Mexican rebels to secure arms. He branded Huerta as an usurper.

CORONER'S JURY

FIXES NO BLAME

That the automobile accident near Merrill Sunday morning, resulting in the death of Gertrude Steeman was purely accidental, and that no blame can be attached to anybody, was the finding of the coroner's jury at the inquest held there late Monday afternoon by Coroner Earl Whitlock.

The funeral of the young woman was held on Tuesday at Merrill. The remains were interred in the Mt. Laki cemetery.

GET VACATIONS

Employees of the city who have been in service for more than a year are entitled to an annual vacation, according to a motion Monday night in council by Herbert Savidge, which was adopted.

By this they will be granted two weeks' leave of absence, and will receive full pay. Police Judge Leavitt, Mayor Nicholas, Chief of Police Smith and Poundmaster Hall are all entitled to vacations this summer.

NEW GLOBE TROT

RECORD IS MADE

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—John Henry Mears, a reporter connected with the New York Sun, is due to arrive here tomorrow night, after a record trip around the globe.

Mears, upon his arrival, will conclude circling the globe in thirty-five days. This is four days less than any previous record.

He left St. Paul this morning.

NEARLY 40,000 NEW DAIRY COWS

OREGON LEADS PACIFIC NORTHWEST IN IMPORTATION—THE GROWTH OF THIS INDUSTRY HAS BEEN ENORMOUS

PORTLAND, Aug. 5.—The growth of the dairy industry in the Pacific Northwest during the last few years has been extraordinary. According to George Mokel, considered one of the greatest authorities on cows in this section 38,855 cows were brought into the states of Oregon, Idaho and Washington during the last year. Of this amount importations into Oregon during the year were 17,050 head, Washington 10,780, and Idaho 11,025. Of the total amount in the three states, Mr. Mokel alone brought forward 7,605 head, which he distributed among the various interests.

The market for dairy cows is strong. Considering the extreme tightness of the money market the situation is unusually favorable. There is a great demand for cows, but on account of the money situation producers are unable to secure the funds.

There has been an appreciable improvement in the quality of the arrivals. Holsteins have been in greatest demand, and it is safe to say that 90 per cent of the arrivals were of this variety. The reason for this is apparent when it is shown that the average milking of a Holstein is six gallons, compared with 3½ gallons for a Jersey.

There is a wide difference in cows, just as in other lines. Some complaint is made by producers of the price they are asked for first class dairy stuff. Generally speaking they compare beef cows with dairy cows, and this is scarcely fair. The average beef cow gives from 1½ to three gallons of milk each day, while good dairy cows milk from five to eight gallons each. Cows for beef have recently sold at the market from \$65 to \$80 each, therefore the difference in price is somewhat less than many had believed.

The last year has amply demonstrated that dairying is the industry that will bring Klamath to the front. Only a few years ago there was not a single creamery in operation in entire Klamath county. At present three of these institutions are being operated, and they are exporting butter to the amount of approximately \$7,000 every month.

ENGLAND SAYS

REPORT WRONG

LONDON, Aug. 5.—It was authoritatively stated by the foreign office today that the intentions of the Brit-

ish government regarding Bermuda have been grossly misconstrued by the newspapers.

Instead of menacing the Monroe doctrine, as some reports say, England proposes to repair and modernize its defenses of Bermuda, and detach five cruisers from the home fleet, making it an independent command.

The club women of New Orleans want a model market for that city, and are working to secure it. A Housewives' League has been formed, and it has begun to keep tab on the dishonest grocers and other persons who give light weight and inferior goods.

BIG WORK LAID OUT FOR LIND

PRESIDENT WILSON HOPES FOR PEACE

Legal Adviser of the State Department and President Are Said to Be Unable to Agree on the Question of Recognizing Huerta—Lind, New Mexican Ambassador, Left Today to Assume His New Duties

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 5.—The administration is today hopeful of immediate peace in Mexico. The appointment of former Governor Lind of Minnesota, it is believed, will do much toward reconciling the warring factions.

Lind has been authorized to represent the president in endeavoring to get influential Mexicans to force President Huerta to restore order.

He will also ascertain whether the raising of the embargo on arms and ammunition will help the situation.

Lind left today for Mexico City. Prior to his departure he conferred at great length with Wilson and Bryan, and he carries almost plenary powers.

It is rumored that President Wilson and John Bassett Moore, international law expert of the state department, have disagreed. Moore favors the recognition of Huerta as president of Mexico, and Wilson opposes this plan.

The estimated value of the property and money is \$2,000, and the city of Medford made the location of the place of business.
