SUGGESTS RACE AROUND THE LAKE
IDEAL LOCATION FOR BIG AUTO-MOBILE RACE
Reno Man Says Klamath Falls Could Pull Off Biggest Event in the History of Motor Races for Stock Cars—Would Have Plenty of Entries, and Value of Publicity Could Not Be Estimated
 "Klamath Falls should get busy and pull off the biggest racing event in the history of motor races," said P. H. Wilson of Reno, Nev.
 Mr. and Mrs. Wilson are here in Mr. Wilson's big Buick racer, the car that took second money in the Los Angeles to Sacramento road race on July 4th. Mr. Wilson said that nowhere in the world is there a course so well adapted for an endurance contest for stock cars as the ninety mile run around Upper Lake.
 "The course is an ideal one," said he, "and every car maker in the United States would make an entry."
 When it was suggested that the course would be rather rough going in places, he replied that the reason fifty-two cars were entered in the Los Angeles to Sacramento race was for the advertising value to the makers of cars that would stand the terrific strain of the Tehachapi mountains.
 "The value of the publicity gained for your community cannot be estimated," he continued. "Many car owners would make entry here when they would not on other courses for the reason they could combine racing and a general outing at the same time. The spectators could watch the races from different points along the route, or from launches on the lake."
 Mr. Wilson declared that he would be the first one to fill an entry blank if the race is secured.

OPEN AIR HELPS THE LITTLE ONES OF CHICAGO

 CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—When Freckled-Face Johnny, leader of the West End gang, goes marching regrettably back to school in a few days, he will have the backing of the Chicago department of health if he tells "dud" that his chances of living are a lot better out of doors than if cooped up in school houses.
 The health department, in a special bulletin issued today, explains that there has been a marked decrease in the number of contagious diseases common to youngsters since the closing of school in June.
 Cases of scarlet fever, diphtheria, measles, chickenpox and mumps have decreased on an average of 60 per cent since Johnny and Jimmy and Susie and Sallie put their books away last June for their summer vacation.

PORTER CHARLEON IS NOW LODGED IN ITALIAN JAIL
GENOA, Aug. 26.—Accompanied by the two carabinieri who have not left his side since he was taken from the New Jersey prison on August 14, Porter Charlton arrived here today on board Re d' Italia, to stand trial for the murder of his wife. Fears that he might attempt suicide during the voyage, rather than face the Italian courts, were entirely ungrounded, according to the carabinieri.
 The sea voyage had evidently benefited Charlton very much. He appeared in much better physical trim than when taken away from New Jersey. He declined positively to discuss the case, saying that it was a matter solely for his attorneys.
 As yet practically nothing has been done by the Italian government towards trying the case. The department of justice preferred that Charlton should be actually in its jurisdiction before it should begin its work. It has not even been decided whether he shall be kept at Rome or Milan, which is nearer to Como, where the case will probably be heard, pending the preliminary preparations.
 In general, it is not expected that Charlton will be convicted, although very likely he will be judged insane and disposed of accordingly. Owing to the profound influence which Lombroso, the famous criminologist, who died a few years ago at Milan, had upon Italian judicial life, conditions are most favorable in Italy for escaping criminal convictions on pleas of mental irresponsibility.

Mrs. Sharp Ill.—Mr. and Mrs. Sharp returned last night from a six weeks' trip to the Lake of the Woods, Rogue River Valley and the Big Hatch. They had intended to remain in the woods till the 1st of November, but the illness of Mrs. Sharp necessitated an immediate home-coming. Mr. and Mrs. Bancero, who were in the party, remained in the hills. Mr. Sharp looks a whole heap like a billy-goat, sporting a six weeks old bunch of spinach on the point of his chin.

SAXTON SAYS HE WAS MISLED BY MORLEY ON WAY TO JAIL
Editor Herald:
 Is it not strange that in our beautiful country, in this land of the pure and the free, under our glorious flag of shining stars and waving stripes—I say, is it not strange that an innocent man can be twice arrested on the same charge, then be bound in iron chains and taken 1,000 miles from home, thrown in jail with condemned convicts, who have been by law proven to have broken the laws of our country, and there placed in an iron cell and held on prison fare for eight long weeks, until the court shall say "this man is innocent and not the man who committed the crime?"
 This is exactly the case in the forgery trial of Eugene Saxton, the man who was taken from Idaho to your lovely city.
 I read the warrant at the time I was arrested. It said that the man who was charged with the forgery weighed 155 pounds; he had brown curly hair; he had a wife who has red hair. "They are traveling across country with pack horses." These were the words in the warrant.
 I weigh about 110 pounds; have not curly hair; never had any claim on any man's wife; was never married, and was not traveling with either a woman or pack horses.
 I saw that warrant did not in any way fit my description. Mr. Morley went to Idaho to get a man supposed to have committed the forgery, and after he got there he was afraid to return to Klamath Falls without some one, as the city might give him the "horse laugh." So he brought me here, even if I did not in any way fill the description.
 After we left Weed, Mr. Morley came into my seat in the car for a few minutes. He took a sheet of paper from his pocket and a pencil. He said to me: Saxton, I shackled you because the law says that I am required to do so, but Saxton, I am still your friend, and if you will tell me I will go or send to the farmers who live along Tule Lake and ask them when you were at their homes on your trip through that country last summer." Morley said to me: "There are a few people who live at the Lake who know these forgers, and in the morning I will go or send an automobile to the lake and bring them into Klamath Falls to see you, and if they say you are not the forger then we will turn you loose."
 I believed every word Mr. Morley said to me. I had nothing to hide, and I told Mr. Morley I stayed one night at Spaulding's goat ranch, 18 miles south of Dry Lake. I stayed one night at Straw postoffice at Dry Lake, at the time the man who lives at Drk Lake was after his wife, who was sick in some hospital. I stayed with young Mr. Harter on a sheep ranch on the bank of Tule Lake; one night in Poe Valley; then went north on foot by Obenchain ranch on some creek to the ZX cattle ranch, then on to Mineral Idaho, where I was twice arrested for this crime.
 Mr. Morley wrote down the names of the ranches where I stayed on Dry Lake, and next morning I expected him to show up at the jail and take me over to court, where I could meet these Tule Lake men, who said they knew the forger by sight. Mr. Morley did not keep his word with me, for he did not call for me, neither did he send or go to Tule Lake and set the people who were to identify me, as he said he would.
 Now, dear reader, I never had even one crooked hair in my head. I always play a fair, honest game as I journey down life's dark valley, and I do not like to see any man lie to convict anyone. If all who care to try me on this charge of forgery will treat me as fairly and honestly as Eugene Saxton will treat them, then I say the court will very soon turn me loose, a free man.
 I wish that a very large board, like a billboard, would be posted up at your postoffice and everything in my life could be printed upon that board, and at the same time everything in the lives of a few men who are persecuting me might be printed on the same large billboard by the side of my life's history. Then, I say, the good people of Klamath Falls would see which of us were weighed in the balance and were found wanting.
 I know there are a few men in this city who are trying hard to railroad me, and I do not believe they think me guilty, either. I say there are a few people in this city of churches who are fond of money, and they are willing to railroad any innocent man to get that cash.
 I shall meet you at my trial, and God knowing me to be innocent, will be forever on my side, and they will go some when they beat the pair of us. If there is any man in Klamath county who cares to meet me and ask me questions in regard to this forgery trial, I kindly invite you to call on me at the jail. I assure you, you will leave me convinced of my innocence. If there is any man at Tule Lake or any other place who knew Mr. and Mrs. Hanthone, who forged the note, I ask each and every one to call on Eugene Saxton an ytime you may come to this city.

"NATIVE SONS MAY BE BARRED"
CAMINETTI IS REFUSED CHANGE OF VENUE
Motion of Attorney Harris for Trial at Sacramento Is Also Denied by Judge Van Fleet—Trend of Questioning Indicates That Californians Will Not Be Accepted, So Selecting of Jury May Be a Slow Matter.

 SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 26.—The whole trend of the questioning of the government toward the jurors drawn for the trial of Drew Caminetti on a Mann act violation indicates that the prosecution would bar "native sons" from sitting in the case.
 This is on account of the fact that Mrs. Caminetti was once president of the Native Daughters.
 The procedure is different than at the Diggs trial. Peremptories are being exercised without waiting for the jury box to be filled.
 A renewed application by Caminetti for a change of venue to Sacramento was denied by Judge Van Fleet at the opening of court this morning.
 Attorney Harris, who, with Diggs, faces a charge of subornation of perjury, also asked a change of venue. This was taken under advisement.
 On account of the tactics of the government, it is believed that the work of selecting a jury will be slow.

LOCAL DENTIST FURNISHES PAPER
GREAT BENEFITS ANTICIPATED FROM NEW STUDY OF SCHOOL HYGIENE — INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS MEETS TODAY
 The Fourth International Congress on School Hygiene convened Monday at Buffalo, N. Y., and will continue in Buffalo, N. Y., and will continue in session till the 1st of September.
 Those in charge are particularly anxious to have reports of the results secured through the practical application of scientific facts and procedures of school hygiene. The benefits of school hygiene has been largely confined to city schools, the rural and village schools having so far received very scant attention in this respect. One of the main objects of this congress is to create united interest in the schools in rural communities, from a standpoint of health and comfort.
 The delegates to this congress are selected from the different associations throughout the country, and an additional number appointed by the governors of the states.
 In Oregon Governor West appointed four, and the National Mouth Hygiene Association appointed five. Of the last mentioned, Dr. Fred Westerfeld of this city was appointed to represent Southern Oregon, but at the last moment found it impossible to attend. He has prepared a paper, however, on local conditions, that will be read at the congress.

NEARLY THREE MILLION ACRES UNDER PROJECTS
 On June 30, 1913, the area of all projects under construction by the reclamation service was estimated at 2,383,440 acres. Irrigation works had been completed for 1,299,956 acres, and the area irrigated was estimated at 721,410 acres, in 18,472 farms.
 In the line of construction work, there had been completed reservoirs of 5,051,210 acre feet aggregate capacity; 7,961 miles of irrigation and drainage canals; 2 1/2 miles of tunnels; storage and diversion dams having a total volume of 9,523,652 cubic yards; 82 miles of levees; 12,487 concrete canal structures; 37,746 wooden canal structures; 3,339 bridges; 3,851 culverts; 157 miles of pipe lines; 1,433 flumes having a total length of 74 1/2 miles; 898 buildings; 348 wells; 697 miles of roads; 51 miles of railroads; 2,331 miles of telephone line; 351 miles of transmission line, and 12 power plants, having a total capacity of 30,785 horsepower.
 The service had also mined 30,693 tons of coal and manufactured 335,452 barrels of Portland cement and 95,435 barrels of sand cement.
 In accomplishing the foregoing work there have been excavated 99,245,768 cubic yards of earth, indurated material and rock, and there have been placed 419,790 cubic yards of rip-rap, 511,322 square yards of paving and 1,344,908 cubic yards of concrete.
