### ANTI-JEWISH PLOT IS DEFEATED

#### NATIONS OF THE WORLD RISE IN PROTEST OF THE HATED SHOWN

For More Than Two Years, Russian Government Has Been Trying to Prove That Bielis Killed Youth in Accordance With Ancient Jewish Rite, Making Forty-Seven Wounds and Draining the Blood

KIEFF, Russia, Nov. 11.—Mendel Bielis, whom the Russian govern-  
ment for two years has tried to con-  
vict of killing a young Christian in  
accordance with a Jewish religious  
rite, was acquitted late last night.

Hardly was he out of prison be-  
fore threats were made against his  
life.

His home is being guarded by sol-  
diers and police. He will leave with  
his family as soon as he secures the  
funds.

The jury verdict did not mention  
the ritual murder. Jews say this sus-  
tains their theory, as the body of the  
young man when found had forty-  
seven wounds, from which five  
glasses of blood had been drawn.

This, they say, disproves the blood  
ritual charge, as the murderers  
would not have drawn so much  
blood.

Ever since the morning of April  
1, 1911, when the mutilated body of  
Andrei Muschinsky, a 12-year-old  
Christian boy, was found in an aban-  
doned brick yard just outside Kieff,  
the prosecution has been endeavoring  
to establish the theory that he was  
slain in accordance with an alleged  
Jewish rite prescribed by the Tal-  
mud, so that his blood might be used  
in making passover bread. The gov-  
ernment has apparently done all it  
could to foster this idea.

M. Krassovsky, chief of the Kieff  
detective department, was actually  
instructed to proceed on the theory  
that the crime was the work of Jews,  
although the only possible pretext for  
the "ritual" charge was that the  
boy's body bore 47 stab wounds. Ac-  
cording to current superstition the  
"ritual murder" is accomplished by  
45 wounds. He could obtain abso-  
lutely no evidence along the required  
lines, but on the contrary believed  
he had traced the murder to a gang  
of thieves.

When Krassovsky made his first  
report to his superiors he was sternly  
reprimanded. Later he was prac-  
tically forced by them to arrest Men-  
del Bielis, a Jew, 40 years of age,  
foreman of the brick yard. On pro-  
ducing further evidence indicating  
the guilt of the thieves and the inno-  
cence of Bielis, Krassovsky was dis-  
missed from office.

In the meantime the case had at-  
tracted world-wide attention. Many  
prominent men in England, including  
the archbishops of Canterbury and  
York, Lord Rosebery, Austen Cham-  
berlain, A. J. Balfour and scores of  
university professors, scientists and  
ministers of the gospel, signed and  
sent out to Russia a strongly worded  
protest against the "blood accusa-  
tion."
