MULTI-MURDERER'S TRIAL ATTRACTS MANY PEOPLE

Drug Fiend, During Incarceration,
Has Confessed to the Killing of
Many Young Girls

WHEATON, Ill., Nov. 11.—Henry Spencer, opium dreamer, whose drug-crazed mind led him to "confess" to nearly thirty murders, a score of diamond robberies and a variety of other crimes, was taken to the little brick court house here today and faced trial on the charge of killing Mrs. Allison-Rexroat, Chicago tango teacher, protesting that he would accept no verdict but acquittal or death on the gallows.

"I don't want 'em to send me back to that hell-hole at Joliet or to any bughouse," was Spencer's final word to Sheriff Kuhn. "It's got to be either the fresh air or the noose for mine."

Farmers from all over the Dupage county hitched their horses in the village street today, and posted themselves in the court room, where they could get a glimpse at the most famous prisoner the Dupage county jail ever held. Reporters from Chicago newspapers, sociologists and criminologists, who regard the opium fiend as a peculiarly interesting study, occupied all the available space inside the court room rail.

Insanity will be the defense offered by Spencer's attorney, Anton Zeman, in his opening statement, when the jury is completed, probably late today, but he may have a hard time convincing the jury if his client insists upon acquittal or death.

"The man is crazy, without a doubt," said Zeman, before the court opened. "He is the logical product of the slums and the underworld, and what the ordinary vice of the slum dweller has not done to him the use of opium has. He made this astounding confession because his brain was clouded by drugs, but if the jury rejects the insanity plea, then I will plead that he either be freed or sentenced to death."

Alienists who spent several days in examining Spencer, while he held public receptions for visitors to the jail, will testify for the defense, and against these will be pitted alienists employed by the state, according to State Attorney Hadley.

"Spencer probably faked most of his confession," said Hadley, "but we will prove that he killed Mrs. Allison-Rexroat. We will show that he met her at the Chicago dancing school, and pretended to be a 'tango fiend' in order to gain her acquaintance. Then he made love to her, induced her to accompany him to Wayne on the night of September 27, under the pretext that he had obtained new tango pupils for her, and killed her in cold blood and robbed her of her diamonds. We will show that he did just what he confessed—

shot her and threw her body on the railroad track just as coolly as he would swat a fly."

Among some of the criminologists gathered here for the trial there exists a real doubt as to whether Spencer actually killed Mrs. Allison-Rexroat, or any other victims listed by the police. Spencer's entire physical make-up—his head, his face, the shifty eyes, the weak chin and flabby mouth—all these betray the type of

slum-habitue whose mind might be swayed by suggestion. The criminologists believe the police furnished the suggestion.

Their theory is that Spencer was deliberately "hypnotized" into confessing a list of killings that has been disproved almost in its entirety. The police, they say, were anxious to wipe the slate of a number of recent crimes in Chicago and vicinity, and Spencer was a willing sponge. He

confessed so readily and so rapidly that reporters who took down his confessions complained of the writer's cramp.

Spencer's only worry, he said today, was that his "chicken dinner days" are drawing to a close. Since his arrest in Chicago, seven weeks ago, he has demanded and received fried chicken almost daily.
