

SERVICE IS VERY IMPRESSIVE

With Houston's opera house well filled, Klamath Falls Lodge No. 1247 Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, held services Sunday evening, commemorating the departed members of the order. In escaping the sadness of losing members, Klamath Falls Lodge was especially fortunate this year. In the two preceding years one member in each year answered the summons of the Great Ruler.

Members of the lodge marched in a body from their hall to the opera house. In addition to the ritualistic program, other interesting numbers were given.

"The Heart Bow'd Down" was beautifully rendered by Mrs. Don J. Zumwalt, and a quartet, composed of Mrs. Zumwalt, Mrs. R.R. Hamilton, Lawrence Mehaffey and Harold Kinneer, sang "Just a Song at Twilight" in an expressive manner. The eulogy, a beautiful word picture, was given by Herbert S. Gale.

The principal address, given by Hon. B. F. Mulkey of Medford, proved to be a most beautiful tribute to the departed. As an eloquent speaker, Mr. Mulkey has few equals in Southern Oregon, and the address he gave Sunday will long be remembered.

"As the role of the departed dead was called, we peered into the unfathomable darkness and saw nothing," said the speaker.

"We harkened into the interminable silence, and there came no voice, but across the chasm from shore to shore there swings the cable of hope, and along it we send our whispered messages of love, and do await an answer to our prayer.

"The permanency of that fraternity upon which Ekidom is founded is best shown in this beautiful custom and ceremony of commemoration. While bronze and marble may give way under the effacing fingers of time, the memory of the departed is kept forever preserved upon the fleshy tablets of love and memory by the greatest self-perpetuating body of Elks so well begun on a love mission that shall not end.

"It is a sad reflection that the life of the average man is not sung in poetry nor recorded in history. That the work of the average life soon loses semblance. That usually the memory of the departed does not outlive the last faint tones of the bell that knells his departure. It is true that loved ones surviving may cherish the figure and voice of the departed, but they, too, must go to join the 'mysterious caravan.' A marble slab may retain into the next generation the name, birth and death of the departed, and a slight inscription. But the traveler of a future generation may stand by a tottering, faded tombstone, half hidden by the wild briar, without a single call upon his sympathy. But, my brothers, as the years come and go

With its ebb and flow,"
loving hearts recall at each recurring memorial day the sweet memory of our departed brothers, on, on, 'till the last syllable of recorded time."

AUTO ROBBERS ARE ARRESTED AT TULE LAKE

OSCAR LYONS CATCHES ONE RED-HANDED

Depredations Committed While Automobile Parties Were Duck Hunting Arouses the Owners of Cars, and Trap Is Set for Guilty Ones—A Search Warrant Results in Finding Much of the Missing Property.

Charged with looting automobiles, Frank and Adolf Cacka, who are operating the Hartery ranch, seven miles from Merrill, were arrested on Sunday. The arrest was the result of a trap set.

For several weeks automobile parties of duck hunters going to shoot on Tule Lake have returned to Klamath Falls with complaints that while they were out in the tules after birds, their autos were pillaged. Dry clothing, food, thermos bottles, repair tools, in fact, nearly everything of value has been taken from different cars.

Last Sunday a car from the White Pelican garage was robbed. On the Sabbath just passed a trap for the robbers was arranged.

Oscar Lyons, one of the chauffeurs of the company, was deputized, and the party went again to hunt ducks, leaving the car near where it stood before. Lyons remained hidden near by.

One of the two men under arrest put in an appearance, and after looking at the car and its number, he began to help himself to the contents. It was when he was right in this act that Lyons arrested him.

The prisoner was brought to Klamath Falls, and on his way here he implicated his brother in the series of thefts. Armed with a search warrant Deputy Sheriff Brewbaker, Lyons and the others returned to the Hartery place, and after arresting the brother there they searched the house.

Practically everything that has been reported stolen was found, and many of these are so marked that they can be positively identified.

The Cacka brothers today retained Attorney Shaw to represent them.

AH WONG FREED OF THE CHARGE

Because the alleged sale of intoxicants without license by Ah Wong took place within the city limits, and therefore the case should be tried in the police court of Klamath Falls, Circuit Judge Benson on Monday dismissed the charge against the Chinese.

Ah Wong was arrested several days ago, and was indicted by the grand jury. This morning George Noland, who represented him, moved for a dismissal on the above grounds.

MORLEY WARRANTS ATTACKED IN NEW INJUNCTION SUIT

Action Filed This Afternoon by Kuykendall & Ferguson for Lumberman Seeks to Invalidate Warrants Issued to Pay for Suppression of Crime, and Money Loaned Prosecuting Attorney on a Note.

Law and order, and the suppression of crime received an awful jolt in the circuit court Monday, when a suit was filed to enjoin the payment of a warrant issued to John Irvin, Fred Morley, the Thiel Detective Office and the First Trust and Savings bank. R. N. Day is the plaintiff, through Kuykendall & Ferguson.

The sum of the warrants affected is \$971.07. The major portion of these were made out to Fred Morley, who, formerly known as "county detective," is styled in this as "assistant prosecuting attorney." A total of \$216.56 was issued Morley in warrants as his salary for this office. Besides these there is one for \$50, for "salary, July."

Besides these, there is a warrant for \$277.77, circuit court expenses, drawn in Morley's favor. Other warrants issued Morley that are under fire is one for \$8, advanced a cripple.

A warrant in favor of the Thiel Detective service for \$299.75 for securing evidence is also attacked.

Among others attacked are two for the First Trust and Savings bank for \$56.90. These represent the money and interest due on a loan made the office of the prosecuting attorney.

Warrants totaling \$116, issued to Prosecuting Attorney John Irwin are on the list. These are for securing evidence and office expense.

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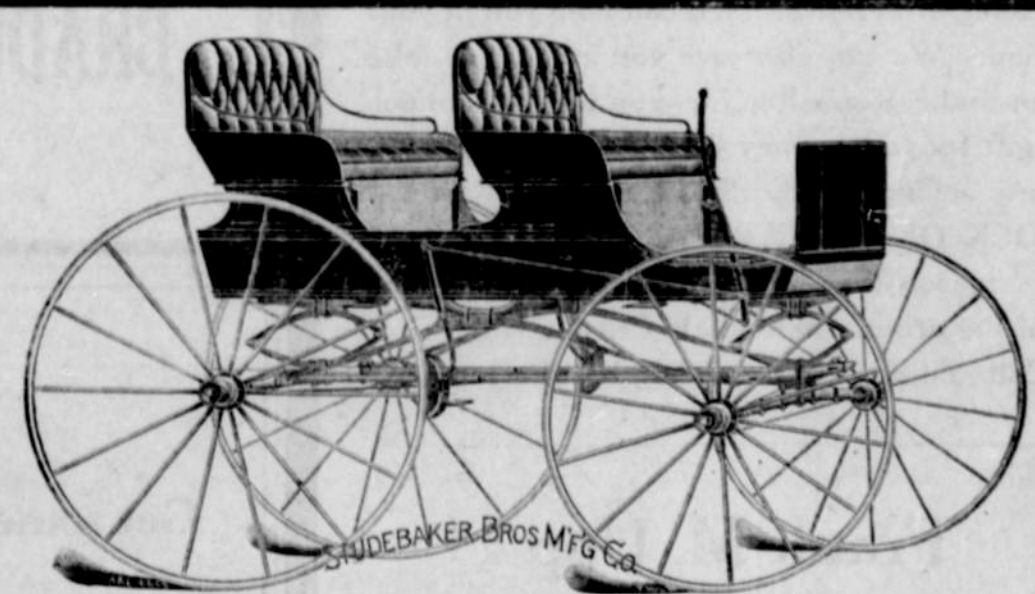
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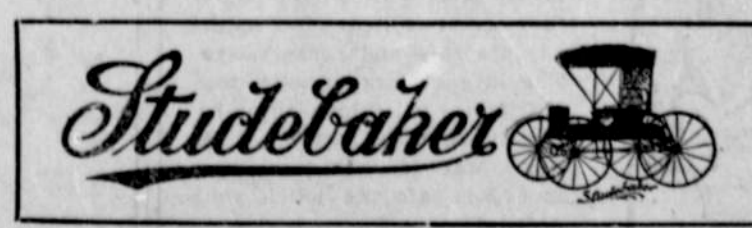
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
