AN UNEMPLOYED ARMY IN SEATTLE

WILL TRY TO STOP PANHANDLING WORK

Thirty Thousand Jobless in Los Angeles, According to Report of Chief of Police, and Included in This Number is 10,000 Women and Girls—City Council Makes an Appropriation to Feed Them.

SEATTLE, Dec. 19.—The itinerant army of unemployed men who are wintering here today held a mass meeting for the organization of a hobo police force.

This corps will strive to suppress "mooching" and "yegging." These practices are not favored by the workmen out of jobs.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 19.—Chief of Police Sebastian today estimates that there are 30,000 people here who are out of jobs. A third of this number are women.

The Associated Charities has exhausted all of its money in helping these people.

Today the city council appropriated \$1,500 a month for three months to be used on providing the unemployed with food and shelter.

X-MAS PACKAGES TO BE DELAYED

POSTMASTER GENERAL ADMITS THAT EMPLOYEES ARE SWAMPED BY FLOOD OF MAIL—MAY SEND POSTAL CARDS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 19.—Postmaster General Burleson today intimates that the government may not be able to deliver over a third of the Christmas parcel post packages next week. The department is more than swamped everywhere.

Burleson is considering sending post cards to the package addresses, notifying them that parcels await them at the postoffice.

Demands for additional clerks come in from all over the nation.

RUMORS OF TRAIN BEING TAKEN OFF ARE UNCONFIRMED
