AMERICA TAKING THE SOUTH AFRICAN TRADE
What American manufacturers can accomplish in the field of export trade when they seriously set themselves to the task is strikingly indicated in the case of the Union of South Africa.
During the year of 1912 the United States outranked all other foreign countries in the imports into the Union and was second only to Great Britain in supplying the people with their requirements.
For the first time in five years we exceeded Germany in the trade. This was accomplished in spite of the fact that there is a fortnightly service of German passenger and freight steamers between Hamburg and South African ports; that there are large investments of German capital in the mines and other industries of the country, and that German manufacturers sent out numerous travelers every year in an attempt to secure a larger share of the trade.
The value of the imports of merchandise from the United States into the provinces which make up the Union of South Africa has risen from \$9,445,626 in 1907 to \$15,733,321 in 1912, an increase of more than 55 per cent.
We supply more oil, agricultural machinery, timber and lumber, windmills and carriages and carts than any other country, including the United Kingdom, and with the exception of lumber, more than all other countries combined. Mining machinery, motor cars, hardware, boots and shoes, electrical machinery, corrugated iron, furniture, tools, typewriters, cash registers and miscellaneous iron and steel products are other articles which are sold extensively in the country.
The success of the American automobile in South Africa has been phenomenal. According to our own statistics, the exports of automobiles to South Africa have increased in value from \$61,185 in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1910, to \$1,167,371 in the fiscal year 1913.
Today South Africa ranks fifth, following Canada, England, Australia and Argentina, as purchasers of the American motor cars.
The trade with the United States in South Africa is undergoing a rapid and substantial growth, and our success in this market is a strong refutation of the oft-repeated assertion that German competition is driving American manufacturers from the field of foreign trade.

CLUBS STARTED IN JANUARY
FOR SAVING FOR PENSION
YONKERS, N. Y., Dec. 26.—There are mighty few of the New Year and the Older Weds of Yonkers, Vernon and other sections of Westchester county who consider the Christmas they enjoyed joyful and now look forward with gladness to the bills that must be paid when the monthly statements arrive. For the New Year Weds of these localities a year solved the problem of saving with a fair degree of propriety. Their Christmas presents without going into debt or completely depleting the family exchequer to do so.
They formed Christmas Clubs in January, 1913, with headquarters in various banks and financial institutions, and by the time Christmas shopping was necessary had sums ranging from \$30,000 to \$100,000. Members of the club, according to their finances, banked sums ranging from 10 cents to \$2 every week. Two per cent interest was paid on the average weekly balance, except when a member failed to bank for one week. Scores of children's clubs were formed, but very few had a clean record for continuous deposits, and therefore they lost the 2 per cent interest. The club which banked \$175,000 to its credit this year was the plan last year, when it not only drained of Christmas with a \$75,000 fund.
Another club this year deposited \$100,000 to its credit when it came the time to buy Christmas presents. Still another club in a large suburban town of New Jersey had 1,000 members this year. The amount the club saved was not given.

MANILA HERO
IS 76 YEARS OLD
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 26.—Admiral Dewey, hero of Manila Bay, was 76 years young today.
His years did not keep him away from his desk and duties at the navy department, but the continuous stream of callers to offer congratulations did.
Besides "best wishes" personally offered by high officials and friends in Washington, the Spanish-American war naval hero was literally showered with letters and telegrams of congratulations from all over the country.
Last year the forest service distributed 116,000 basket willow cuttings, 15,000 to forest schools, 20,000 to agricultural experiment stations, and 81,000 to individuals.

U. S. NOT TO INVEST
WILSON SAYS IS NOT CONNED WITH STRIKE
Rumor Is Spread That Member of Citizens' Alliance Gave the Alarm That Resulted in Deaths in Crowded Theaters. Officials Will Be Held Sunday, the Auspices of the Federation.
CALUMET, Dec. 26.—Jehude have claimed the bodies of two of the victims of the Christmas Eve horror, when a panic caused the Christmas tree given for the children of the striking miners.
Three unidentified bodies were in the morgue. This makes the list seventy-five.
Most of the victims were children. The funerals will be held Sunday under the direction of the Western Federation of Miners.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 26.—No federal inquiry will be made into the Christmas Eve panic at Calumet, Mich., according to a telegram to Secretary Moyer of the Western Federation of Miners by Secretary Wilson of the department of labor. This message stated that the panic had no connection with the strike.
CALUMET, Mich., Dec. 26.—Although it has been denied, it is a fact that a member of the Citizens' Alliance gave the false alarm of which resulted in a panic and twenty-five deaths. The panic occurred Christmas Eve at a Christmas tree given for the children of the striking miners.
Secretary Moyer of the Western Federation of Miners today says that he can produce five witnesses who will swear the man giving the alarm wore an Alliance badge.
Final preparations are being made for the burial of the victims. Supply of coffins has been secured and more have been ordered by Milwaukee.
Despite the fact that the Western Federation of Miners has been outside aid in caring for the contributions are pouring in. Yesterday Moyer received \$20,000. Today the police admitted that have no hope of finding the man who gave the false alarm and caused the panic.

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
