MEAT SITUATION WILL BE GIVEN ATTENTION

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 12.—The secretary of agriculture has announced the appointment of the following committee "to conduct a general inquiry into the various factors which have brought about the unsatisfactory conditions with respect to meat production in the United States, especially in reference to beef, with a view to suggesting possible methods for improvement."

Dr. B. T. Galloway, assistant secretary of agriculture, chairman; Dr. H. J. Rogers, president Kansas State Agricultural college; Professor C. F. Curtis, dean and director Iowa State college; Professor H. W. Mumford, professor of animal husbandry, University of Illinois; Dr. A. D. Melvin, chief of bureau of animal industry; Dr. T. N. Carver, director rural organization service.

The work of the committee will be centered largely on the study of economic questions involved in the production, transportation, slaughter and marketing of meat. As the first step the committee will investigate carefully the changes within the last two decades, which have increased the cost of production, and the centralizing of the meat industry.

The committee will not deal specifically with questions of animal husbandry, which has to do with the actual breeding of cattle, as this work will be left to the specialists in the department and state agricultural colleges in this field. The appointment of a committee will not interfere in any way with investigations now under way in any of the state agricultural colleges or experiment stations. The letter of appointment announces that the chairman within a short time will supply details regarding the scope of the investigation, and the lines of work which the committee might take up.

COUNTY IS WORTH TWO HUNDRED FIFTY-FIVE THOUSAND

Klamath county's property is worth a little over a quarter of a million. This is the way it is estimated by County Clerk C. R. DeLap, in a report to the state officials. The total value is set at \$255,200.

Of this amount the old court house represents a value of \$48,000. The land and improvements are placed at \$29,000. The value of the buildings, fixtures and furniture is set at \$9,000.

The new court house site, land and improvements, is worth \$10,000. The value of the building, fixtures, etc., is set at \$70,200.

In the county farm, according to DeLap, the county has \$42,000. The 76.89 acres is valued at \$7,000, and the buildings, etc., at \$35,000.

There are 675 miles of improved roads in the county, and 1,225 miles of highway unimproved. The road machinery, etc., has a value of \$15,000. Bridges represent a total valuation of \$70,000.

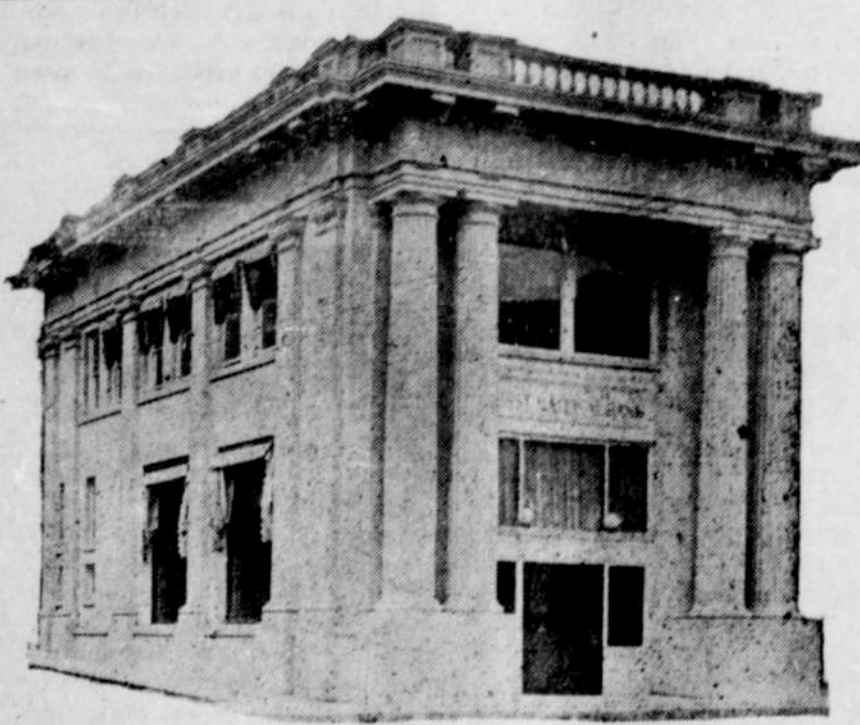

CRAWFORD SEEKS TO BE GOVERNOR

PORTLAND, Jan. 12.—A. M. Crawford, attorney general, is a candidate for the republican nomination for governor. Mr. Crawford arrived in Portland to confer with friends as to platform pledges, and to outline a plan of action for the coming campaign. He expects soon to have his platform completed and ready for the voters to consider.

For the past twelve years Mr. Crawford has held the position of attorney general of Oregon. His present term expires next year, and instead of announcing himself to succeed himself, he has decided to try for governor.

Frank S. Grant, former city attorney for Portland, has announced himself as a candidate for the republican nomination for attorney general on learning of Crawford's decision.

Prior to being elected, Crawford practiced law in Roseburg. He has been a resident of this state for approximately thirty years.

As soon as his platform is completed Crawford will engage in an active and aggressive campaign, which will be carried on to the eve of the primaries. Repeatedly during the past year it has been rumored that Crawford wanted to be governor, but until he arrived in Portland he had declined to discuss the report.
