These wired Medici ruffs are gradually slipping away from the necks and off of the shoulders in the form of quaint little wired shoulder caps of lace or tulle, although you still see them galore in their original form. In gold lace, or white or black tulle, they certainly make a becoming finish to the prevalent V-shaped neck openings. Some of the new spring models are also showing wired ruffs of moire or taffeta.

Taffeta happens to be the favorite material of the moment, by the way. This crisp and rustly silk has a revival almost every season. It is particularly attractive this year as it lends itself so admirably to the quaint drapings along pannier and bustle effects.

tory, federal building, drainage of irrigated lands, reclamation of tule marsh lands, opening of the Klamath Indian reservation to settlement, securing the extension of payments for the water users, more farmers and dairymen, creameries and cheese factories, lower freight rates, better market conditions."

TO INCORPORATE BASEBALL CLUB
