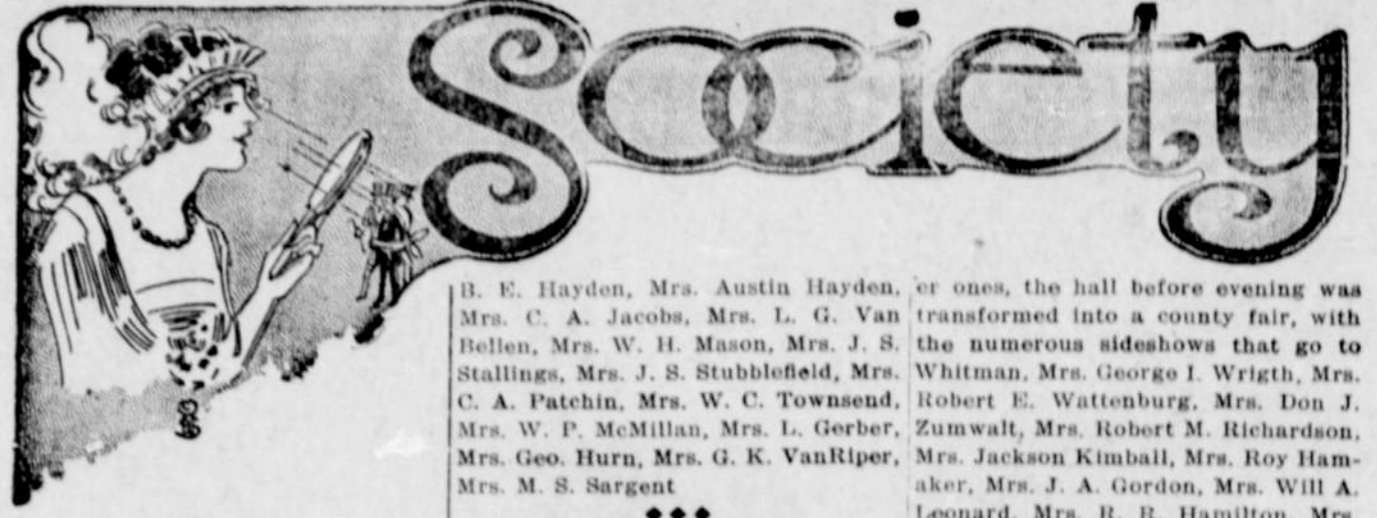
Moleskin is a becoming fur for all ages and silver tipped fox as attractive for fifty as fifteen. Let her pay attention to her figure and always be well corseted.
