

WHITE SLAVERS HUNTED IN N. Y.

(Written for the United Press)
NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—Facing the startling fact that no less than 961 New Yorkers have disappeared from the face of the earth in three months, 397 of them being girls and women, and that only 194 of them have been found by the police, the head of the police department has ordered the guardians of the greater city to divert their attention for a time from the gangsters and gunmen to the cadets and white slavers.

With eight girls of good family on the missing list at one time, the police awoke to the undeniable fact that white slavery with all its almost unbelievable horrors, is a real institution in New York. Discoveries made recently in the finding of several lost girls have shown that a state of affairs exists in the heart of New York whereby young girls can be snatched bodily from their homes, almost under the eyes of their families, and sold into bondage that is worse than death.

The police, therefore, have undertaken a campaign of vigorous rough handling against the white slavers, similar to the war they recently waged against the gangsters of the East Side. The gunman crusade was in a measure successful. It is believed a similar move against the enemies of women will have equal success. Instead of arresting gunmen in a dignified manner, and giving them the benefit of long drawn out arraignments and trials, allowing them to swagger in court and receive the homage of their satellites while in the Tombs, the police were ordered to use their clubs on gangsters wherever found. The uniformed men and detectives were authorized to beat the gunmen on the slightest provocation.

In a short time several of the worst of the East Side rowdies were sent to hospitals instead of police stations, and one policeman was highly commended for killing a thug who tried to escape. The fellow had struck down an old junk dealer who refused to give him money for whiskey, and when he attempted to escape in the maze of East Side tenements, as was always permissible in "the good old days," the policeman shot him dead.

That sort of thing had a wholesome effect on the gangsters. Police Commissioner McKay hopes it will work out in similar fashion in the case of the white slavers. The notorious gunmen of New York's East Side are not bad men at all in the true sense of the word. They are physical cowards. They cannot stand plain punishment. They are anaemic, shallow chested, drug exhausted youths who can ride around in high powered automobiles and shoot their rivals in the back with automatic pistols. But they cannot fight. Physical violence makes them cry like babies. The cadets are of the same calibre. That is why the police heads think that a mailed fist crusade will eliminate them from New York.

Recently a passer-by on one of the apparently respectable streets on the upper West Side saw a piece of folded paper flutter down at his feet. It was a note from a 16-year-old girl who wrote that she was being held as a white slave. The man called a policeman and invaded the flat from which the note was thrown. They found there two men and a woman. In a rear room, locked up without clothing, was the girl. She said she had been seized on the street near her home, thrust into an automobile and brought to the flat, where she was held a prisoner, without clothing, and compelled by beatings to receive men visitors. Police investigation verified the story.

Many similar stories have been told to the police in the last three months, and the authorities now know that the white slave traffic, with all its insidious ramifications is no myth in New York.

KENO BRIDGE TO BE STARTED SOON

KENO, Feb. 27.—Work of erecting the steel bridge across the Klamath River near here will soon start. The contractors are now at Keno with their men and equipment, and they have their blacksmith shop and tents erected on the north side of the river. This bridge will afford a better crossing on the Ashland road. It is believed that about three months will be needed to erect the structure.

JOBLESS MEN

THE SUBJECT

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—That there is no greater percentage of unemployed men in the United States today than the percentage according to population four years ago, but that the federal government and state governments should combine to alleviate present conditions, were the themes of speeches made here today at the opening sessions of the national conference of unemployment and the American association for labor legislation.

Today's big feature will be a joint

meeting in Cooper Union with the People's Institute. Mayor John Purroy Mitchell opened the conference this morning in the city hall. Scores of delegates appointed by governors included mayors of big industrial cities and state and municipal officials.

Reports regarding the number of persons out of employment in hundreds of towns and cities throughout the United States were to be read today. The sessions will continue tomorrow.

HUERTA SEIZES YOUNG FARMER BOYS

CALIFORNIA CONGRESSMAN SAYS MONEK IS SEEKING THE INTERVENTION

Villa Gives His Consent to Allow an American Surgeon to Make an Investigation of Benton's Body—Secretary Bryan Denies the Report That Huerta Seeks to Have the Embargo Shut Down Again.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 27.—A federal detachment today surrounded the market place and drafted about 200 farmer boys who were attending the provision carts with their mothers. The boys were mostly 10 to 14 years of age.

The youngsters, many of them weeping, were dragged to places of confinement, and were there guarded until they were loaded in box cars, preparatory to shipping them to the front.

The mothers became hysterical, and great confusion resulted, which amounted to almost a riot when the soldiers began beating the boys who resisted.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 27.—"I feel that the desire of many for intervention springs not from the heart, but the pocketbook," said Congressman Kent today. "I believe it is no more than right to expect those making the clamor for somebody to intervene and get killed, to volunteer to act as the entering wedge."

"Intervention single handed would be interpreted in the minds of the Mexicans as selfish. In one sense, it would be good for Mexico, for it would unite the factions, but intervention for the protection of those expatriating themselves for profit, I cannot justify it under the doctrine of altruism, or as being part of the white man's burden."

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 27.—Secretary Bryan denies that America has communicated with Huerta regarding any plan for ending the revolution. He denies any proposal regarding another arms embargo.

Consul Letcher today wired that Villa has consented to allow an American surgeon to accompany Benton's widow and view the corpse. He still refuses to allow an autopsy.

DR. WITHYCOMBE QUILTS O. A. C. TO BE CANDIDATE

CORVALLIS, Feb. 27.—After sixteen years of continual service, Dr. James Withycombe has resigned his position as director of the Oregon Agricultural College experiment station. The resignation is to take effect as soon as acted upon by the board of regents. His reason for resigning is his wish to devote his time to promoting his campaign for nomination on the republican ticket as governor of Oregon.

This step has been contemplated for some time, and all of Dr. Withycombe's station work is in fine shape to be closed up at any time. In withdrawing from this field of agricultural activity, Dr. Withycombe says: "I desire to express my grateful appreciation of the loyal support given to me by myself, the college faculties and the experiment station staff. I bespeak for the experiment station this continuous support, and trust that the college will continue its phenomenal development and meet every requirement in its field of educational endeavor to prepare young men and young women for the higher duties of citizenship in the great commonwealth of Oregon."

During his service the college has grown from an enrollment of 338 to 1,568. The faculty and experiment staff has increased from 12 to 211. The Oregon station has not 37 specialists at the Corvallis station and 20 in the branch stations at Astoria, Burns, Hermiston, Hood River, Moro, Union and Talent.

The value of agricultural crops in the state has grown from \$39,083,329 to \$74,099,828 during his term of service as director of experimental agricultural. The most notable gains are in dairying, poultry and clover products.

UNEMPLOYED WORK AT LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 24.—The receding of the recent flood waters has put an end to the lack of employment here. More than ten thousand men are at work today, repairing the damages done.

Two-thirds of the men are being used in emergency gangs by the railroads.

The damage to the railway lines alone is estimated at \$3,000,000.

Throughout the world, one-fourth of all children die before six years of age, one-half before they are 16, and only one person in each one hundred lives to the age of 65.

Free dentistry for all railroad employees is contemplated by the railway ministry in Austria.

HEAVY DAMAGES ASKED FOR THE PEARSON DEATH

BIG BASIN IS SUED FOR \$40,000 BY WIDOW

In Complaint Filed This Morning, the Wife of Man Killed at Keno Says the Lumber Concern Failed to Provide Adequate Equipment for the Work, and That Agents Knew Pearson Was Inexperienced.

As an aftermath of the accident in the company's logging camp, February 4th, which fatally injured Harry Pearson, his widow, Maggie J. Pearson, has filed a suit for \$40,000 against the Big Basin Lumber company. The complaint was filed in the circuit court today by Attorney W. H. A. Renner.

Mrs. Pearson asks \$500 for medical expenses, \$300 for the burial costs, and \$39,200 damages.

The complaint alleges that Pearson's injury and resulting death was due to the fact that the agents of the company, knowing that Pearson was an inexperienced man, ordered him to unload logs from a wagon. It is also alleged that the company failed to provide suitable equipment for the unloading of the logs, and as a result, the logs rolling off unexpectedly, crushed Pearson.

Troops Withdrawn From Strike Zone

DENVER, Feb. 27.—Governor Ammon today ordered all troops withdrawn from the strike zone except the cavalry, which will be concentrated in the Trinidad district. The governor claims that there are no funds from which to pay the soldiers for further service.
