**BONANCA RESIDENTS OFFER REWARD FOR INCENDIARY**

If Bonanza's recent fires were the result of incendiarism, the residents of that town intend to find the party responsible, if possible, and see that justice is meted out.

Toward that end the following announcement is now being posted there:

"We, the undersigned property owners in the town of Bonanza, Klamath county, Oregon, believe that the three fires which have occurred in our town in the last four years are not entirely accidental in origin. We will give the sum of \$1,000 cash reward for evidence leading to the arrest and conviction of any party or parties responsible for the origin of these fires, or any one of them.

Within the last four years the town of Bonanza has been visited by three disastrous fires, which have in turn wiped out the larger part of the business section, the most recent one occurring but a few months ago.

On each occasion there has been strong talk of incendiarism, and several people have claimed to have knowledge of facts that would connect various persons with the crime. Nothing has ever been done in the matter, though, and the rumors have gradually died natural deaths.
