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HAYDON IS OUT FOR TREASURER

The latest local hat throwing stunt occurred Tuesday morning when Geo. A. Haydon entered the ring to scrap for the republican nomination as county treasurer. He has been deputy sheriff for the past two years, and was practically in charge of the tax collections while the sheriff's office collected these.

R. N. DAY LEAVES; RUMORS EXPLODED

R. N. Day, timber owner and plaintiff in a half dozen or more suits which have been filed in the local circuit court attacking Klamath county warrants, left Tuesday morning for Portland.

During his visit here it is known that there have been several conferences between Mr. Day and County Judge Worden, and it was reported that an effort was being made to settle these suits outside of court.

Several reports have been circulated in regard to the matter. One was to the effect that the timber representative offered to drop all the suits now pending, after the water had been squeezed out of a specified fee of the claims, if Judge Worden did not become a candidate for reelection. In view of the announcement of the Judge just previous to the departure of Mr. Day, it is evident that no settlement of the warrant fight was accomplished.

While in Klamath Falls, Mr. Day purchased a considerable amount of county warrants, paying face value for them. These, he used for the part payment of taxes.

GARRETT'S BID LOWEST ON 9th

The Eighth-Ninth street improvement is to be built by J. H. Garrett. His bid was the lowest of three submitted, \$25,261.33.

Shell & Shell of Medford and Albert Anderson of Grants Pass also bid on the improvement. Garrett's bond has been fixed at \$12,500.

The improvement is to affect Eighth street from Main to High; High street from Eighth to Ninth; Ninth from High to Prospect; Prospect from Ninth to Upham; Upham from Prospect to White, and White from Upham to Delta.

The street is to be paved 25 feet with oiled macadam, and the improvement includes curbing, storm sewer, etc.

HANLEY RUNS AS A BULL MOOSER

PORTLAND, March 31.—William Hanley of Burns, Ore., familiarly known as the cattle king of Harney county, has entered the race for the United States senate, having announced his candidacy for the progressive nomination. He is the third to announce himself for the position, the other two being George E. Chamberlain, democratic incumbent, and R. A. Booth of Eugene, republican candidate.

The announcement of Mr. Hanley is in response to requests from members of the progressive party, and is the direct result of a luncheon of the progressive party held last Thursday, when the hope of inducing him to declare his candidacy was expressed.

Leaders of the party have personally urged Mr. Hanley to enter the senatorial race, while others expressed their sentiment in the form of a petition, signed by a large number of the local progressives.

GOETHALS IS NOW THE CIVIL GOVERNOR OF CANAL ZONE

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 31.—The Panama canal enters upon another phase of progress tomorrow when civil government will be established on Uncle Sam's ten mile strip from ocean to ocean. Colonel George W. Goethals, who as chief engineer during construction of the big ditch, has been autocrat of its administration, is to be civil governor.

Ever since the United States undertook building of the zone, it has been technically under military rule. A commission form of government had actual administration authority, but practically all the commissioners were military officers. Colonel Goethals has been supreme in authority. During the building of the canal it has often been said that Goethals' administration was required if an employe wanted to requisition a pencil.

MEASURE PROVISION IS REPEALED

CONGRESSMEN WOULD HAVE THE BRITISH SHIPS ON EQUAL FOOTING

Sims Resolution, Providing for the Repeal of the Clause Eliminating American Coasters From Tolls in the Use of the Panama Canal, Was Introduced at the Special Request of President Wilson.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 31.—By a vote of 248 to 162, the house of representatives this afternoon adopted the Sims resolution, providing for the repealing of the clause in the Panama canal act, which permitted the use of the Panama canal free of tolls by Americans engaged in the coastwise trade.

It has yet to go before the senate. The measure was introduced at the request of the administration, upon the ground that such a provision was in direct violation of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty.

Not in many days has there been so much attention given to congressional affairs. Long before 8 o'clock this morning spectators began to arrive. Some of these brought their breakfasts and lunches with them, in order to insure their seats for the entire day's session.

All of the members of the house and a great number of senators were present to hear Speaker Clark's speech. At 3:51 the Missouriian surrendered the speaker's chair to Congressman Underwood, and took the floor for his speech.

Republicans, democrats and the spectators joined in an ovation that lasted several minutes.

"The repeal will undoubtedly carry by a majority of 75 or 100," said Congressman Adamson.

"The situation is full of possibilities," said Congressman Knowland. "But I believe the resolution will pass by a majority of 30 or 40."

EXTRACTS FROM CHAMP CLARK'S SPEECH TODAY

"There is no personal issue between the president and myself, nor has there ever been at any time, and I trust that there never will. I have at no time uttered a word of criticism of the president, and never, so far as I have been informed, or believe, has the president ever said a single word of criticism of me.

"I have never for a moment entertained any opinion that President Wilson is actuated other than by the highest patriotic motives. The president is too big a man not to desire that this question should be fought out on merits. He has too high an idea of the duties of a public servant to desire the members to do other than vote according to their conscientious scruples.

"The fact that I am making this fight for platform pledges of my party may end my public career. There are many things, though, that are worse than being defeated for congress, for the speakership or for the presidency, and one of them is to repudiate the platform whereon you are elected.

"If the constituents who have stood by me with unshaken fidelity should retire me to private life, I can still be happy in the love and affection of my wife and children and the society of my books."

Speaker Clark said the president's request to repeal the tolls clause was "amazing, and criticized him for not disclosing the reasons why he considered the repeal so necessary.

The speaker declared that he did not want war with any nation, but rather than surrender our right to complete sovereignty over every square foot of our globe-grinding domain, we would cheerfully and courageously face a world in arms. Speaker Clark suggested merely suspending the exemption from tolls for American vessels for a period of years, rather than a repeal of the clause.

JUSTICE COURT

RULING STANDS

Upon the ground that the Klamath Lumber company has not paid a license fee to the state within two years and did not properly dissolve, Circuit Judge Benson Tuesday abated the action brought by that company against Fred Bamber et al, for the recovery of money.

This action was appealed from the justice court, where Judge Gowen gave a decision for the defense.

MANUFACTURERS SEEK HOSE CART

The latest section of town to ask for a fire station is the manufacturing district on Sixth street, from the Savidge Brothers Lumber company, to Martin Brothers Milling company.

A petition, citing the payroll and investment affected was presented at Monday night's meeting of the council. The matter was referred to the fire committee to report upon Monday night.

The miners, on their part, dropped the increased wage demand.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC COMMENCES ACTION AGAINST SIEMENS

WOULD FORCE HIM TO TAKE WARRANTS

Through Stone & Gale, the Railroad Seeks to Mandamus County Treasurer—Last Day of Tax Payments Devoid of Interest, Is Keeping the Force Busy—Three Baskets of Checks Not Yet Given Credit.

Mandamus proceedings to compel County Treasurer J. W. Siemens to accept in part payment of taxes warrants for \$10,000, has been commenced by the Southern Pacific. A petition for a writ was filed on Tuesday by Stone & Gale, attorneys for the railroad.

The company's taxes this year amount to \$23,193.34. Monday a representative tendered two warrants for \$5,000 each, with interest on them amounting to \$400, and cash for the remainder.

These warrants Captain Siemens refused to accept, as they are among the warrants attacked in the repudiation suit before the federal court, and also in the suit brought by Henry Rabbes. Today is the final day for the payment of taxes in order to escape the 1 per cent a month interest. As a result the tax collecting force is kept busy, and the corridor of the office is crowded.

During the past few days the force of clerks has been working day and night in a vain effort to keep up with the work. Despite this, there are now on hand three baskets of letters with checks attached, sent in for the payment of taxes.

100 MASKED MEN

LYNCH NEGRESS

WAGONER, Okla., March 31.—A mob of 100 masked men this morning hanged Mary Scott, a negress, to a telephone pole.

The woman had assaulted a white man, Lemuel Peace, on the streets Sunday night, and stabbed him to death.

No cause was given for the murder, and the crime was laid to race hatred.

ONE HANGING A WEEK IS THE SAN QUENTIN APRIL PROGRAM

SAN QUENTIN, March 31.—Unless Governor Johnson should intertore there will be a hanging every Friday next month. Heretofore Governor Johnson has not been disposed to interfere with the law's course in capital punishment cases.

Thomas Green, a cowboy, is scheduled to die April 3. He shot the cashier of a Riverside county bank while he and another cowboy were holding it up.

The execution of Jerry Allen is set for April 10. He murdered his wife at Williams because she was an inmate of a questionable resort, and refused to leave the life.

Lee Nan Chin is to hang April 17. He quarreled with a fellow Chinese, ambushed and shot the latter dead in San Joaquin county.

Louis Bundy's death is fixed for April 24. Bundy is the youth who killed a boy employed as a drugstore messenger, to get money with which to buy his sweetheart a Christmas present.

That there is a very poor chance of this city of Klamath Falls donating money toward advertising this section was shown at Monday night's meeting when the council tabled the bill, then up for the third reading. This was done upon the motion of Savidge.

The only dissenting vote was that of Rogers. He expressed a desire to see it killed entirely.

The measure provides for a donation for publicity purposes be made, and the Klamath Chamber of Commerce named as an agent for its expenditure.

Wags to Be a Citizen.

Petition for naturalization has been filed by John Henry Angore, a native of Canada, who resides in Klamath Falls.

The New Jersey pavilion at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition at San Francisco will be in the shape of a letter "H," with a frontage of 215 feet and a width of 197 feet. The southern court will be decorated with a flower garden and a liberty pole. In the northern court will be a relief map, illustrating the canal system of New Jersey.

The erection of the New York state pavilion at the Panama-Pacific International Exposition grounds at San Francisco is progressing. It is expected that all of the carpenter work will be completed in two months.

The Isle of Wight is to be connected with the main land by a four mile subway containing an electric railroad.

The oldest ocean going vessel in the world, built in 1548, was broken up recently at the Canary Islands.

HORTON PROJECT LAND TO BE IRRIGATED IN SIXTY DAYS

The Early completion of the Horton project, which means the irrigating of 1,500 acres of land in Yonka Valley, is practically assured.

Don Jolly, who took over the Horton contracts last fall, is now figuring with contractors for the rushing of the work. Monday Mr. Jolly took Contractor W. H. Mason out to view the work to be done, going over the entire project and estimating the probable cost.

If the contractor's figures are satisfactory, work will commence at once, and the canals and laterals will be ready for turning in the water in about sixty days.

The dam and reservoir were finished some two years ago, but some complications over water contracts stopped the work of canal building.

Now that Mr. Jolly has smoothed out the kinks, there is every reason to believe that water will be supplied in time for this season's crop.

O. AND M. CHARGE TO BE SEVENTY-FIVE CENTS ACRE

Seventy-five cents an acre will be the operation and maintenance charge under the first unit of the Klamath project this year.

Advices to this effect were received today by the local headquarters of the reclamation service from the Washington office. This was a telegraph approval of the levy arranged by the local office.

The rate for the past few seasons has been unchanged. This does not include any provision for drainage cost, as this will be taken care of later.

In the second or Poe Valley unit, the water users will irrigate for the first time this year. They will be furnished water on a rental basis, the charge being fixed at \$1 per acre foot. The water users need only take as much as they want, and pay for that amount only.
