

Southern Pacific Awards Contract for the Construction From Westwood to This City

SUBCONTRACTORS ARRIVING TO GET PORTION OF WORK

FERNLEY LINE IS NOW WITHIN 50 MILES OF KLAMATH

Contract Is Let to the Utah Construction Company to Construct Line From Westwood to Klamath Falls and It Is Expected Work Will Be Rushed to Completion—Track Laying Resumed West of Vale

OROVILLE, Calif., April 6.—The Southern Pacific company has let a contract to the Utah Construction company for the construction of fifty miles of line from Westwood, Lassen county, north to Klamath Falls, Ore., according to news that has just been made public. It is understood that it is the intention of the company to complete its line east of the Sierras from Los Angeles to Portland as soon as possible.

As additional evidence of this intention, it is said, track laying has been resumed on the extension from Juntura, fifty miles west of Vale, to Lakeview and Alturas.

The road at present is known as the Fernley and Lassen line. If the road is built as far as Lookout this year it will be an easy matter to have the entire line in operating order by the middle of 1915. Several sub-contractors have already arrived in Susanville and are preparing for their work.

WILSON LIKES RESERVE LIST

CHOICE OF THE COMMISSION WILL NOT BE IN ANY MANNER CHANGED

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 6.—President Wilson is unresponsive to the criticism over the makeup of the federal reserve districts. He stated that he believes these selections were honestly made, and were decided upon only after a complete investigation of actual trade conditions, capitalization and exchange methods of the banks in each district.

He indicated that he believes the selections will not be changed by the federal reserve board when it is named. Just when the board will be named he is unable to state.

Wilson indicated that he had no hand in the selection of the reserve cities.

WILL TURN IN WATER MAY 1st.

RECLAMATION SERVICE IS PREPARING WATERWAYS FOR THE IRRIGATION SEASON — CONTRACTORS FINISHING

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 6.—In order to make it possible to turn water into the main canal May 1st, the reclamation service has a force of men at work cleaning out canals, etc., and making necessary repairs.

All of the contractors on the Adams canal enlargement work will be completed before that time, so that all the acres under that ditch will this season be irrigable by a large supply of water.

ELY MAN RUNNING FOR DEMOCRATIC HONORS

Son of County Judge Who Built Present County Court House and the Link River Bridge Is Out for Nomination at Hands of Democrats—Local Business Man Is Also Mentioned as a Possibility.

A second entry for the democratic nomination as county judge was made this afternoon, when W. W. Smith, a well known Ely rancher, filed announcement of candidacy. Former County Judge Griffith filed his announcement last week.

Smith is a son of ex-County Judge Smith, who administered county affairs in the '80's. The elder Smith was judge when the present court house was built, and it was during his administration that the bridge over Link River was built. At that time he was criticised by some for his extravagance, as they believed too expensive a type of bridge was selected.

Just what his platform will be Smith is not ready to give out at present. However, he admits that he advocates the introduction of business methods into the county court's affairs, and a more economical administration.

With three candidates already in the race for county judge within the past week, it is understood that a fourth may soon be brought out, as friends are urging Marion Hanks to come out for judge. Upon this matter, though, Hanks remains non-committal, saying he does not care to discuss it at this time.

PORTLAND SEES QUICK SERVICE OVER NEW ROUTE

WOULD SHORTEN THE DISTANCE TO OGDEN

With Klamath-Natron Cutoff Finished and Connection Between Klamath Falls and Fernley Northwest Would Be Greatly Benefited—Says Contract for Building to Be Finished This Year.

PORTLAND, April 6.—New folders issued by the Southern Pacific company show in dotted line on the maps the projected extension of the Natron-Klamath Falls cutoff southeastward from Klamath Falls to Susanville, Calif., to connect with a branch line already in operation from Fernley, Nev.

News received here today that actual contracts had been let for a fifty-mile stretch of this road caused little surprise, though few railroad men expected actual construction would be commenced until the fate of the Southern Pacific's Central Pacific holdings was known.

The Utah Construction company is said to have been awarded this work, which is designed for completion this year. The remainder of the distance may be made up next year. The value of this line to Portland depends upon the completion of the Natron cutoff, it is agreed.

The Susanville-Fernley branch is 106 miles long. Fernley is 277 miles east of San Francisco. With the Natron line built to Klamath Falls and this second gap thence to Susanville, a new entrance to Portland would be accomplished, the line being considerably shorter than the Oregon Short Line-O. W. R. & N. from Ogden.

If the Central Pacific is retained by the Southern Pacific, railroad men say the proposed line would become at once a real asset to the Southern Pacific.
