NEW SUITS FOR
BALL TEAM HERE

The baseball suits for the Klamath
Falls team came Friday, and are
on display at the Hurn Hardware
store. The suits are white, with blue
stripes, with blue lettering on the
shirt and white cap, blue belts and
blue and white stockings.

The suits will receive their bap-
tism of fire at Yreka Sunday after-
noon, when acting Manager "Scoop"
Duhl and his cohorts will invade the
peaceful precincts of the Siskiyou
county seat, and endeavor to take a
game from that town's Northern Cal-
ifornia League aggregation.

The team will leave tomorrow.
Thus far the lineup has not been de-
finitely arranged.

ENGINEER PLANS WORK ON
CRATER LAKE PARK ROADS

Just as soon as the weather per-
mits and all the equipment is ready,
work on the roads being built by the
war department in Crater Lake Na-
tional Park will be resumed, accord-
ing to Geo. E. Goodwin, corps of
engineers, who arrived on Thursday
from Portland to take charge of the
work. He is accompanied by a staff
of engineering assistants and cler-
ical workers.

In addition to the steam shovel
now being taken from the station at
Kirk to the war department's camp
at Wild Cat, at the southern bound-
ary of the park, two more shovels
are to be used in road construction
in the park this year. One of these
will reach Kirk today.

"Just how much work we do this
year depends upon the extent of the
appropriation from the government,"
says Mr. Goodwin. "It is our inten-
tion to work on the Fort Klamath
road to the rim, completing it, as
well as completing the route close
to the rim, an extension from the
Sand Creek road, which will connect
it with the main Fort Klamath road,
and afford a different route for re-
turning to the fort."

CHAUFFEUR NEARLY RUNS
DOWN LOCAL YOUNG LADY

On a charge of exceeding the speed
limit, and making reckless turnings,
D. A. DeHay, an employee of the
White Pelican garage, was arrested
by Sheriff C. C. Low Friday, after
he narrowly missed running over
Miss Ada Farris.

The occurrence was at the corner
of Fourth and Main street. DeHay,
driving J. F. Goeller's big car, which
was undergoing repairs at the garage,
came down Main street at a fast rate
of speed.

Miss Farris was crossing the street,
and was about in the center, when,
without warning or slowing up, De-
Hay suddenly swung his car to the
right, making a quick turn into
Fourth street, just missing the girl,
and placing other pedestrians in mo-
mentary danger.

DeHay was released upon his own
recognizance by the sheriff.

HENSON WILL BE ON TICKET,
SAY LATE WIRERS

The nomination of Judge Henry L.
Benson for justice of the supreme
court is practically assured by the
latest returns of the vote in Multnomah
county. It is conceded that
Judge Benson ran strong in Eastern
and Western Oregon, outside of Port-
land, and with the announcement that
his vote is second highest in Multnomah
is assurance of his nomination.

The following was received Satur-
day afternoon by Judge H. S. Gale
from Judge Webster:

"Judge Benson second highest in
Multnomah county, with 10,500 votes.
McBride first, Cleeton third, McNary
fourth and Harris fifth."

DRIVER IS FINED
\$20 BY LEAVITT

Because of reckless driving of his
car on Main street, D. A. De Hay, an
employee of the White Pelican garage,
drew a \$20 fine or ten days in jail
from Police Judge Leavitt.

DeHay was arrested Friday by
Sheriff Low for reckless speeding,
and when he appeared in police court
at 9 o'clock Saturday he admit-
ted going at a 22-mile-an-hour pace
just before reaching the corner of
Fourth and Main.

DE LAP, LOW AND
HENRY ARE NAMED
FOR BIG CONTEST

The renominations of County Clerk
De Lap, Sheriff Low and Engineer
Henry, and the nomination of George
Haydon as county treasurer are as-
sured by the returns coming in from
over the county. There are yet a few
precincts from which complete re-
turns are to be received, and it may
be several days before these come in.

One of the features of the election
of local interest was the large number
of votes received by Hanks on the re-
publican ticket. One hundred and
sixty-six republicans wrote Hanks's
name on the ballot. The total vote
received by him on both tickets was
517, to 619 for Judge Worden, whom
he will oppose at the November elec-
tion.

The closest contest among the can-
didates for county office was for the
nominations for sheriff and commis-
sioner on the democratic ticket.

With the returns from eight of the
smaller precincts incomplete, Bishop,
for sheriff, has 259 votes to Hawx-
hurst 235. Some of these precincts
are claimed by Hawxhurst, and the
nomination will probably be in doubt
until the official count of the ballots.
Indications are that N. S. Merrill
has been defeated for commissioner
by Edward Freuer. Returns so far
received give Freuer 259 votes to 214
for Merrill.

The total incomplete vote for judge
on the democratic ticket gives Hanks
351 to Smith 134.

the national committeeman of the
progressive party, as he had no oppo-
sition.

"ROOSTER DAY"
IN KENTUCKY

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 16.—
The "Little Red Rooster" is persona
no grata with poultry experts of the
department of agriculture. And act-
ing on the suggestion of the depart-
ment of agriculture today was named
as "Rooster Day" throughout Ken-
tucky.

The program from today on and for
several months, during which season
the egg market is most plentiful, Ken-
tucky poultrymen have banded to-
gether and agreed to sell only roost-
ers for food, instead of hens and
chickens, so that the egg crop may
thereby remain unimpaired through-
out the summer of hens for food, as
heretofore.

NOT TO ENGAGE A SALARIED MAN

SECRETARY FAILS TO KEEP A
RECORD OF WEDNESDAY

NIGHT'S MEETING

Now That Directors Make It Plain
That They Oppose the Motion Pass-
ed at the Special Meeting, Harmony
Is Restored, and the Work of Get-
ting Subscribers and Boosting
Klamath Will Go on.

A special meeting of the directors
and officers of the Klamath Chamber
of Commerce was called at 1:30 this
afternoon for the purpose of prepar-
ing a definite statement to the public
as to the proposed use of the money
recently raised by subscription and to
officially assure the supporters of the
Chamber that no part of the revenue
was to be used for any additional ex-
pense other than paying off the old
indebtedness and for the actual run-
ning expenses of the Chamber.

The secretary had failed to keep
any intelligible record of the special
meeting held Wednesday evening,
May 13, at which time a motion was
passed authorizing the hiring of a
publicity manager at a salary of \$100
a month. Expressions were given by
all of the directors present today in
opposition to any such action.

As a result of the meeting this af-
ternoon there is a much better feeling
existing on all sides, and with the
prospects of the old debt being wiped
out there is assurance of a prosperous
year ahead for the Chamber of Com-
merce.

With all misunderstanding wiped
out and confidence restored, the of-
ficers expect to start in on a campaign
for new membership and support
which will place the Chamber on a
good, solid financial footing, and free
to carry on the much needed work of
promoting the development of the re-
sources of the great Klamath country.

The following statement has been
given the press for publication:

"Inasmuch as there has been con-
siderable criticism and discussion as
to the proposed use of the funds re-
cently raised by subscription, the
Chamber of Commerce desires to
make the following statement:

"The matter of engaging a pub-
licity manager for the Chamber at
a salary was discussed and acted on
at an informal meeting held Wed-
nesday evening, May 13, at which it
was the sense of the meeting that
such action be taken. How-
ever, as this was not a meeting of
the officers and directors, any ac-
tion could not be considered as
legal and binding.

"We would advise you that under
the constitution and by-laws there is
no authority for the hiring of a pub-
licity manager, and the directors have
no intention of taking any such ac-
tion.

"The directors have asked for a
fund of \$5,000, for use of the Cham-
ber for the year ending June 1, 1915,

and said money is to be used as fol-
lows:

Balance old indebtedness.....	\$2,244.53
Secretary's salary.....	1,200.00
Office rental and expenses.....	600.00
New literature.....	1,000.00

Total.....\$5,044.53

"We hope to be able to settle the
old debt at a discount.

"This board of directors pledges
itself not to authorize the expendi-
ture of any money by the Chamber of
Commerce beyond money actually
subscribed and in the treasury.

"We greatly appreciate the co-op-
eration of the citizens in our efforts
to finance the Chamber of Commerce.
We realize that the business we are
conducting is public business, and we
want the public to know what we are
doing at all times. We expect to do
our best to operate this institution on
business lines for the benefit of the
entire Klamath country, to the end
that we may do as much as possible
toward the development of the many
resources we have here.
