LIBRARY FUND IS BIG

The school districts of Klamath county have an opportunity this year to make a splendid start on a school library, as the money now on hand for school library purposes is the largest sum ever available for this purpose in Klamath county.

There is on hand for school library books, a total of \$2,541. This is divided among the districts according to the attendance, the rate being \$1 for each pupil enrolled.

With this sum, even the smallest districts will be able to procure a quantity of books.

County School Superintendent Fred Peterson is sending to the various districts, catalogues of books suitable for school libraries. By the schools ordering at the same time, a material reduction is thus secured.

ITALY DIVIDES ON
THE MARRIAGE FORM

CHICAGO, May 22.—A radical reorganization of the home missionary board of the Presbyterian General Assembly was the chief discussion among the 800 odd delegates who are in Chicago today from all sections of the United States and a number of foreign countries. The assembly will be in session for ten days.

Insurgents in the Presbyterian church are determined to reorganize the home missionary board so that it will be of more service, according to Oliver R. Williamson, in charge of the general arrangements for the assembly, which is being held at the Fourth Presbyterian Church, the pastorate of Rev. John Timothy Stone, the retiring moderator. The claim has been made, Williamson states, that the home missionary board has become so centralized, and so unconstitutionalized that the churches and home mission field has had no voice in the politics of the church. It is to correct this condition, that the progressive element in the assembly wishes to overhaul that body, he claimed.

At this session, the 126th annual meeting held by the Presbytery of this country, it is expected that the way will be paved for the Rev. E. P. Hill, of the McCormick Theological Seminary, Chicago, to succeed the veteran secretary of the home missionary board, the Rev. Charles L. Thompson, who, it is reported, will retire in June. Dr. Hill admitted today that he had been approached on the subject of filling Dr. Thompson's place, when the latter resigns.

There is widespread interest in the election of a moderator to succeed Rev. Dr. J. T. Stone. For many years various parties and groups have gone to the assembly with vigorous political campaigns for the election of particular candidates. But at last year's assembly at Atlanta, Georgia, a sudden reaction came from this political wire pulling, and since that rebuke was administered, delegates said today, there have been no open moves made by any groups to "put over" a certain candidate.

A letter from Manager R. A. Caven states they are willing to arrange a game for the Elks' celebration here, and bring over their band and the entire population of the town.

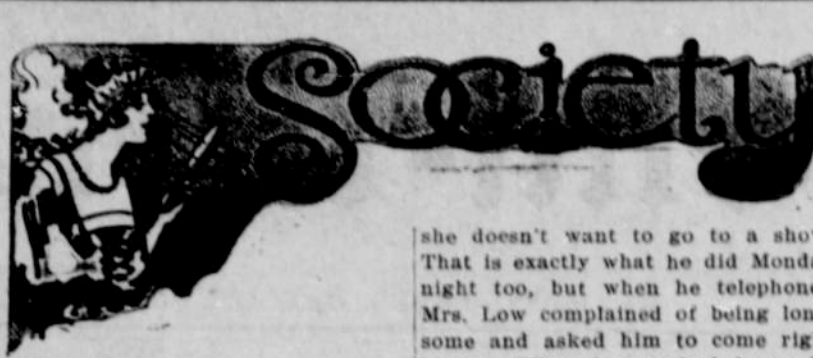
It is probable that a delegation of Elks and baseball Manager Warren Duhl will go to Weed the first of next week to make arrangements for such an excursion.

That the purpose for which said annual meeting is called is for the election of a board of five directors for the ensuing year and for the transaction of such other business as may regularly come before said meeting.

You are further notified that at said annual meeting the following amendments to the by-laws of the Klamath Water Users' Association will be submitted for your acceptance or rejection, to-wit:

That section one (1) of article four of the said by-laws as amended be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Revenues necessary for the accomplishment of the purposes of this association shall be raised by an assessment thereof from time to time as required upon and against the share holders. No assessment shall be declared by the board of directors to be delinquent within less than thirty days after the time for levying the assessment.

That section two (2) of article four (4) of said by-laws be amended to read as follows:

Section 2. No subscription of stock shall be accepted unless accompanied by the full payment of an amount in money equal to all assessments previously levied by this association on lands subscribed thereto, and the previous assessments herein referred to shall be determined by taking the aggregate of all assessments heretofore levied by this association. Assessments paid on shares of stock cancelled at the instance of the association within three years after April 1, 1905, for the reason that the land to which said shares are appurtenant is non-irrigable from the system owned or controlled or to be owned or controlled by the association shall be refunded to the holder at the time of cancellation; provided, however, that the association may execute releases upon the approval of the secretary of the interior for all lands heretofore subscribed to this association where such lands are not deemed irrigable from the irrigation works now constructed by the United States of America or their successors in interest upon payment of all assessments heretofore levied by this Association against said lands and against lands owned by the applicant for said release.

That section one (1) of article eight (8) of said by-laws be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. All certificates or other evidence of the ownership of shares of stock in this association shall have the seal of the association affixed; provided, however, that no certificate of stock or other evidence of ownership of stock in this association shall be issued until the full amount levied by the secretary of the interior under public notice upon and against the shares and lands represented thereby, and further, until the full amount of all assessments previously levied by this association upon and against the shares and lands represented thereby shall have been paid by the owner thereof.
