1913 Balances Are Not Available for This Year

In Order to Do More Effective Work, a Reapportionment of the Money Is Recommended

The reclamation service has completed a table of the proposed revision of allotment for the Klamath project. This is made necessary because it was not understood that the balances allotted for work for the year 1913 were not available for expenditures in 1914 on the portions of work remaining unfinished in that year.

The following explanations are given by Project Manager Camp:

Reference is made to items by the marginal numbers in the table.

(3) Main canals. The amount recommended is to pay for excavation in the enlargement of the Adams canal, mainly done on small contracts, partly uncompleted December 31, 1913, estimated at 46,648 cubic yards, and 200 cubic yards of concrete in structures to be done by government forces.

(4) Distribution system. The amount recommended is for the extension of the Griffith lateral, first estimated to cost \$7,000, but now reduced to the figure given. This extension will irrigate 600 acres in addition to the 1,500 originally planned to be irrigated by this lateral. The people owning these lands have been waiting several years for water, and as much of the land is too sandy to dry farm, this extension is a very decided benefit.

(5) Tule Lake reclamation. The amount recommended is proposed to be expended in borings, to determine the condition of the strata underlying Tule Lake, the bed of which is in process of reclamation by shutting off the water flowing in from Lost River. This lake has no known outlet, but there is some seepage into the lava rock on the southern shore. The borings are to determine if this seepage can be materially increased, so as to hasten the reclamation of the lake bed and enlarge the area to be reclaimed.

(7) Drainage. It has been determined by a board of engineers not to expend so much on this figure during

1914 as was first allotted for that purpose, and the amount recommended for the revised allotment is correspondingly decreased, to bring the total allotment for the year within the original amount, \$78,038.88. The new excavator cost \$8,000, set up ready for work. The actual running expense of each excavator running two shifts is approximately \$1,600 per month, or about \$3,200. For twelve months the actual running expenses will be about \$40,000, if it is practicable to run double shift in the winter. The cost of structures to go in or over these drains is hard to estimate at the present time, but the monthly expense account will show what is being expended in this manner, and I will always be willing to confer with the directors about the advisability of any of these structures.

(8) Buildings. A cottage and barn for the use of the ditch rider on the irrigated area in the second unit has been found necessary. The lands under this unit have not heretofore been irrigated. The amount recommended is to cover this expense with the other necessary outbuildings and a well.

(9) Lands, rights and property. The amount now recommended is to cover the purchase of rights of way for the extension of the Griffith lateral and for various drains which it is proposed to construct, extend or enlarge.

(10) Telephone system. The sum recommended is to cover the cost of building four miles of double metallic telephone circuit, with the necessary instruments. Two miles of this line are to be built on the laterals of the first unit and two miles along the Griffith lateral in the second unit.

(11) Examination of the project as a whole. The amount recommended is to carry on the work of stream measurement, observation of evaporation, etc., which has been in effect for several years.

(12) Experimental farm. The expense proposed is for pumping water

for drainage and irrigation on the farm, which is located on the Lower Klamath marshes, and which is being operated as an experiment by the United States department of agriculture, continuing the experiments of several years to determine the value of the soil and if it will justify reclamation.

(15) Operation and maintenance under public notice. To provide for the purchase of a traction excavator, for use in drainage work, the purchase of which has been authorized since the original allotment was made, a reduction in the amount allotted to this account has been recommended, and the accounts numbered 16 and 17 increased correspondingly. The local office estimated the actual cost of operating the first unit as \$23,000 for the season of 1914.

(16) Equipment in use. The sum recommended to be allotted to this account is for the purchase of a Monaghan Type A traction excavator, estimated to cost \$9,600. The amount recommended allows for charge for depreciation. The capacity of this excavator is one cubic yard to the bucket. It is to be used in enlarging and deepening the main drain in the first unit, and later on the larger drains on the project and on construction if found necessary.

(17) Materials in store. The purchase of the dredge scheduled above made some additions to the stock of supplies and materials kept in the store house, and the amount recommended is to cover their purchase, less probably issues. It is proposed to carry a good stock of repair parts for both excavators, to save time in cases of breakage.

Attention is called to the fact that the present recommendations for allotment do not increase the total amount allotted to be expended during 1914, but asks transfers from one feature to the other within the sum allotted.
