"BIG JULY TIME" TO BE GREAT CARNIVAL EVENT AT FORT

When it comes to a matter of royalty, the Rose Festival at Portland will have nothing over the "Big July Time" at Fort Klamath, for a queen is to be elected, to rule supreme over the fun on the four days, beginning June 29th and ending July 2d. Frank Salcido, who is in from the Fort arranging some of the affairs for the big show, says that there is much rivalry among the admirers of the fair girls of Wood River Valley as to who will be queen. A spirited vote is expected.

The Fort Klamath celebration will be a hummer, and keep the crowds busy. A band has been engaged to furnish music, and in addition to the contests each day, there will be dancing in the evening, and three balloon ascensions and parachute drops by E. T. Sherman, who did such thrilling work during the last county fair. The Klamath Indians will also appear in tribal dances, etc.

Arrangements have just been made for a baseball tournament for the Southern Oregon championship, with a purse of \$150 for the winning team. There will also be a tug of war between mounted whites and mounted Indians, and for this there will be a prize of \$150.

Some of the other events and prizes follow:
Bucking contest, \$100; wild horse race, \$10 each day; best bucking horse, \$25; fancy roping, \$5 each day; bulldogging, \$10 each day; bull-riding, \$40; horse races, \$200; automobile barrel race, \$15 each day; automobile egg race, \$5 each day; three-mile automobile race, \$50; motorcycle race, \$10; Indian war dance, \$25, foot races, \$ to 20 years, \$40; greased pole, \$5 each day; greased pig, \$2.50 each day.

JURY IS EXCUSED BY JUDGE BENSON UNTIL NEXT MONTH

Because the farmers who are empaneled on the jury for the June term of the circuit court are sadly needed at home right now, and owing to illnesses, etc., the panel is small enough to justify drawing additional names from the jury list, Circuit Judge Benson on Tuesday excused all jurors until July 6th.

This was decided upon at a conference between the local attorneys and the judge this morning. All consented to this.

When the jurors are called again it is expected that the criminal docket will be pretty well completed, and that some of the criminal matters being considered by the grand jury will be ready for trial.

The jurors will be kept busy this term, for the law docket is unusually heavy. In addition to the criminal cases that are to come before this

term of court, there are twenty-five law cases awaiting attention.

Until the jury is called, July 6th, Judge Benson will devote his attention to the bulk of equity matters.

REBELS WITHOUT A NAVY; GUNBOAT GOES TO BOTTOM

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 17.—Admiral Howard today reported to the navy department that the federal gunboat Guerrero and the rebel gunboat Tampico engaged in battle yesterday, off Topolobampo. The Tampico was sunk.

This was the first decisive naval engagement of the revolution. The loss of the Tampico leaves the constitutional cause virtually without a navy.

There were ten killed and twenty wounded. The captain and chief engineer of the Tampico, when they saw the battle go against them, committed suicide.

The warship New Orleans and the torpedo boats Perry and Preble were near the scene of battle, and it was watched with interest by the American tars. The New Orleans and the Guerrero rescued the survivors from the Tampico, and surgeons from the American ships are on the Guerrero attending to the wounded.

RETURNS FOR VISIT AFTER MANY YEARS

Tuesday evening Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hoagland and little daughter arrived in this city, and made the first stop in a tour of Eastern Oregon. While here the Hoaglands are the guests of Mr. and Mrs. Nate Otterbein, Mrs. Otterbein being a sister-in-law of Mr. Hoagland.

Sixteen years ago "Joe" was a resident of the Bonanza country, and this is the first time he has visited his old stamping ground since taking up his residence in the valley of the Rogue, and the change in Klamath Falls and the country surrounding was quite a surprise.

"Of course I knew that the country had grown, and that Klamath Falls was coming to the front," said Mr. Hoagland last night, "but I didn't expect to find a city where I had left a stringtown."

Cotton Crop Is Poor

This season's cotton crop prospect is one of the poorest known for many years. On May 25th the official reports showed the condition of the crop to be estimated at 74.3 per cent of the normal, as compared with 79 per cent a year ago, and an average of 80 per cent of normal for the past ten years.

RUSSIAN CZAR JUST ESCAPES

ANARCHISTS BLOW UP TRAIN ON WHICH THE ROYAL FAMILY WAS RIDING—TWO DEAD AND MANY INJURED

BERLIN, June 18.—Dispatches from St. Petersburg which escaped the censor, tell of an attempt to assassinate the czar which barely failed yesterday.

Anarchists plotted to dynamite the special train of the czar between Kishineff and the capital, but succeeded only in seriously wounding several passengers on a train preceding the royal train.

The czar, czarina and family, with accompanying servants and government officials, left Kishineff in two special trains. From Kishineff an ordinary passenger train preceded the royal coaches, according to custom.

Near Tshudnow the explosion occurred, overturning the engine and derailing several coaches, killing two of the passengers and injuring twenty-eight.

The plotters doubtless hoped to slay the entire royal family.

SINNOTT BILL PASSES HOUSE

MEASURE INTRODUCED BY OREGON CONGRESSMAN PROVIDES FOR DIVIDING UP THE LEAVE OF ABSENCE

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 18.—The bill introduced by Congressman Sinnott, permitting homesteaders to divide their five months' leave of absence in two periods, has been passed by the house.

Mrs. Rose E. Keesse has been appointed guardian of the children of herself and the late Henry H. Keesse. An order to this effect has just been issued by the county court.
