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KING AND QUEEN AT
FAMOUS ASCOT RACES

ASCOT, England, June 16.—The elite of British and European society flocked to the royal race today for the opening of the Ascot race meeting, the most fashionable and aristocratic meeting of the English turf season. King George and Queen Mary, accompanied by Princess Mary, drove in state from Windsor Castle, riding in an open four-horse carriage, with postillions and outriders wearing the picturesque Ascot liveries.

Prancing on either side of the King's carriage rode Lieutenant-Colonel Sir Frederick Ponsonby and Major Olive Wigram, the royal equestrians, who were attired in the orthodox silk hats, morning coats and dark riding breeches and jack boots, while scarlet clad grooms escorted a dozen other carriages bearing members of the royal family and the principal court officials and guests from the castle.

For the mere male, a Prince Albert or morning coat, with a silk hat, is absolutely insisted upon for today and Thursday, the two state days. The women who thronged the reserved enclosures sported their newest and most expensive costumes.

For them racing is of minor importance compared with the necessity of out-dressing their rivals and friends. The royal enclosure contained everybody who is anybody, when the hostess of the royal standard indicated that the king and queen had taken their places, and gave the signal for the races to commence.

The utmost precautions had been taken to prevent the admission of "undesirables" to the royal enclosure, and every applicant had to personally satisfy the lord chamberlain as to his or her identity and eligibility.

A few years ago there was a big scandal over the sale of tickets by impecunious members of the aristocracy, and several unauthorized persons had their tickets confiscated. To prevent a recurrence of such a state of affairs, the lord chamberlain and a host of officials patrolled the enclosure and challenged everybody of whom they had no personal knowledge.

Although there was little chance of suffragettes gaining admission, there were a number of Scotland Yard men on duty round the royal box, and on the course the regular officials were reinforced by strong bodies of uniformed police and plain clothes detectives.

The racing is nominally controlled by the stewards of the Jockey Club, but as the health is royal property, and most of the prizes are given by the king, the monarch himself has the last word in everything.

He appoints his own stewards, handicappers and judges, and has his own private police court in which offenders are dealt with by Sir John Dickinson, chief magistrate from Bow street. Sir John was on duty for the first time today.

The takings from the stands are devoted to the upkeep of the course, and the provision of substantial prizes, but King George isn't greedy, and lets the public on the course free of charge.

Many important races will be decided during the four days, the principal events today being the gold vase, presented by King George, value \$1,000, with \$2,000 in specie added, distance two miles; the Ascot stakes, a two-mile handicap, value \$20,000, and the Coventry stakes, value \$5,000 for classic 2-year-olds, distance 5 1/2 furlongs. Tomorrow the chief event is the Royal Hunt cup. On Thursday the gold cup, one of the most coveted trophies in Europe, is run. The king has several entries, and will attend each day.

PORTLAND, June 20.—Society turned out en masse to attend the spring meet of the Portland Hunt Club here this afternoon. The best horses in the city were entered in the various events, which included a quarter-mile dash for polo ponies, two-mile relay race, a quarter-mile dash for ponies with juvenile riders and a hurdle race.

AMERICAN GOLD
GOING ABROAD
TO BE LOANED

NEW YORK, June 20.—The greatest gold movement in years has been going on in the export of the metal to Europe. Since January 1 approximately \$75,000,000 has been exported from America.

The last of an unprecedented government consignment of \$43,000,000 in gold was placed today in the sub-treasury, and bankers were notified that beginning Monday \$5,000,000 of this would be available daily.

The shipments abroad are in bars and bricks, and if made into dollars and placed three inches apart, the exported gold would reach from New York to San Francisco.

The Wall street men explain the shipments by saying that "money is cheap in America, and higher rates of interest are available abroad."

It is predicted that the lowering of the exchange rate abroad will cause much of this gold to return.

SPECIAL TRAIN
SCHEDULED OUT

After the train reaches here it will go direct to Kirk, to get the Chilquin, Fort Klamath and Kirk crowds. It will leave Kirk at 11:15, reaching here at 1 o'clock. From that time it will be used in transporting the crowds to and from the rodeo grounds.

WOOL GOES OUT
BY THE CARLOAD

The sheepmen are not near so worried now as they were before the Underwood tariff bill passed, for despite the dire predictions that were made about how the West would go to the bow-wows after wool was put on the free list, none of the sheepmen have received less than 16 cents a pound for their wool, and most of them above that figure.

The shipment of wool to market has started here, and every day there is at least a carload sent out. The clip of 50,000 sheep in Klamath, Lake and Northern California is being hauled to Klamath Falls and Midland for shipment. Among those shipping now are Dave Edler, Capt. I. D. Applegate, Connor & Murphy, Alex Fitzpatrick, Mulloy & Co. and Jack McCauliffe.

DORRIS NOW ON
LOCAL EXCHANGE

DORRIS, Calif., June 20.—The final twist and splice connecting the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company's lines with the Butte Valley lines was completed at 2:30 this afternoon. The first message over the newly connected wires went to the Herald office at Klamath Falls from L. R. Robertson, manager of the P. T. & T. Co.'s lines in this territory, who is in Dorris today.

This connection places Klamath county and the entire Butte Valley in close touch.

BERT WOODDEN
DIES SUDDENLY

The Herald has just received word of the death of Bert Woodden, which occurred early Thursday morning at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Woodden, in Dodd Hollow.

Mr. Woodden was apparently in his usual good health, but was attacked with a fit of coughing, which was followed by the hemorrhage, and his death resulted in a few moments.

The funeral took place Friday from his parent's home, the interment being in the Merrill cemetery.

Mr. Woodden was about 42 years of age, and was a man of excellent character, and highly esteemed by those who knew him.

FOURTH MAJOR LEAGUE
LATEST PROPOSITION

NEW YORK, June 20.—After today's session of the National Baseball Commission, it was announced that a fourth major league has been practically decided upon. This, it is understood, will be completely organized this fall and winter.

"It is practically certain that a new major league will be organized," said Ban Johnson, president of the American League. "The circuit, it is planned, will be made up of four teams from the International League and four teams from the American Association."

SAYS GERMANY IS
THRIFTY NATION

BERLIN, June 20.—"America can learn much from Europe, especially from Germany, in the matter of thrift and economy," said Simon W. Straus, the Chicago banker and president of the American Society for Thrift.

Mr. Straus has about completed a tour of France, Italy, Austria and Germany, during which he has made a thorough study of European thrift, and will make a report to his society and to the United States government of the results of his observations and investigations.

"My investigations in Germany have impressed me with the need for extending the activities of the American Society for Thrift, and making it international," said Mr. Straus to the United Press. "We have become prodigal in America, and I am here to learn ways of thrift, but I find that the German nation is more thrifty than the German individual."

"Thrift is an anomaly. In America we have taken up the systematic education of the people to greater individual thrift, knowing that without that our municipal, state and national affairs will not be run on thrift lines. "One of the purposes of our society was to learn from inquiry in foreign countries, and I have observed and learned much which I hope may be nationally useful in America."

"The physical condition of the men, the longer and more specialized school system and the co-operative buying and selling, are aspects of German thrift which will repay our study. A definite and systematic effort must be made in America to teach the benefits of our household garden, as well as how to make one, and in doing this learn handicraft which otherwise city boys do not learn."

"The urban population must get back to the land, and this is the best and quickest way to bring about the change."

VILLA CARRANZA
BREACH IS FAR
FROM HEALING

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., June 20.—The following statement was made today by a Mexican delegate:

"The Mexican consul at El Paso telegraphs that from private messages intercepted at Jaurez it is learned that there is no truth in the report that the Villa and Carranza factions have adjusted their trouble. Villa has issued a proclamation, addressed to the American people, in which he proclaims General Angeles as president of Mexico."

There is every prospect of a break

in all the conferences upon the failure of mediation. Some hope that Huerta will weaken at the last minute and tell his envoys to accept America's proposition.

TORREON, June 20.—Villa and his staff are still here. Washouts have delayed the departure, and extensive movements of troops are impossible. It was learned today that Villa is dissatisfied with the constitutional junta at Washington and the representatives at Niagara Falls, and intends to send his own delegates.

Among these is John W. Roberts, an American newspaper man to whom Villa has taken a fancy.

OF ANKENY CANAL

All phases of the Ankeny canal matter were discussed at last night's meeting at the Klamath Chamber of Commerce, when I. D. O'Donnell, of the reclamation service, was present. As a result, Mr. O'Donnell, who left this morning for Portland, promised to take the matter up with headquarters, and try to bring about the closing of the water way.

In addition, he discussed the twenty-year bill, the reclamation of swamp land and other important matters. Several local men also spoke on these matters.

Commercial Delegates in France

GREN BLE, France, June 20.—The large party of American delegates to the sixth international congress of Chambers of Commerce, which ended in Paris last week, before returning to the French capital will visit the Grande Chartreuse, Chambrey, Chamoni, Evian, Mont Blanc and Lake Geneva. They expect to reach Paris June 26th.

DENVER, June 20.—For the first time in four years the Colorado Derby, the principal stake event of all race meetings at Overland Park for years, will be run at Overland this afternoon. The management has offered a purse of \$2,000 for the event, the distance being one mile and a quarter. The record for this event is 1:51 2-5, made by Meadow in 1910, the last time the Derby was run.

The skyscraper limit has been raised at Portland from 160 feet to 200 feet.

The McKenzie River hatchery is to be increased in capacity to 2,000,000 fish annually.
