TOWNSEND SAYS WILSON UNSAFE WITH THEORIES

MICHIGAN SENATOR GRILLS THE PRESIDENT.

Tells Congress It is Time to Adjourn and Says the Anti-Trust Program is a Plan to Throttle Legitimate Industries—Says Democracy is Appealing to Prejudice Rather than to Reason in Matter.

United Press Service WASHINGTON, July 9.—Senator Charles Elroy Townsend of Michigan, on the floor of the Senate, today called President Wilson "A theorist, who without constructive business experience of his own, flies into the face of all experience and insists upon driving his docile Congressional adherents on dangerous and untenable grounds."

Townsend, who is a staunch Republican, urged upon the members that it is the duty of Congress to adjourn at once. He bitterly attacked the administration's anti-trust program during his speech. "Much legislation, already enacted into law, or now in the process of enactment, is an impairment of the intelligence and independence of Congress," he said. "It would not have been enacted if the members of Congress followed the dictates of their own judgment as to what was best and necessary for the good of the people."

SAYS HUERTA'S RULE TOTTERS

MAN CLOSE TO SEAT OF GOVERNMENT SAYS REVOLT OF THE ENTIRE ARMY IS PREVENTED BY TWO MEN'S EFFORTS.

COMPANY BOUGHT WAY BY PASSES

LOUISVILLE-NASHVILLE ASSOCIATED IS SEVERELY ARRIGNED BY COMMISSION IN MAKING REPORT TO SENATE.

United Press Service WASHINGTON, July 9.—Reporting to the Senate regarding the issuance of passes by the Louisville-Nashville Associated Railroads, the Interstate Commerce Commission arraigned the company's lavish distribution of passes.

"These carriers have dipped into practically every domain of public and private life through the instrumentality of free passes," said the report. "Scarcely a walk of life is not represented in this procession of recipients."

"The financial consideration involved is nothing, compared with the impairment of public and private morality."

Mrs. Wm. G. Sharp to Preside Over U.S. Embassy to France



Mrs. William G. Sharp will be the presiding genius over the American embassy to France for the remainder of the Wilson administration. She is the wife of the new ambassador nominated by the President and confirmed by the Senate. Mr. Sharp has been a member of Congress from Elyria, Ohio. He is a man of means and while he is able to spend much more than his salary in keeping up the embassy, which is one of the requirements of modern ministers to foreign countries. He will succeed another Ohio man, Myron T. Herrick, former governor of that state.

FORD AND WILSON IN A CONFERENCE

MAKER OF THE "MODEL T" DOES NOT MAKE ANY STATEMENT AFTERWARDS REGARDING THE CONVERSATION.

Washington, July 9.—Henry Ford, head of the Ford Motor Company, conferred with President Wilson for an hour this afternoon.

"I only care to say that I discussed business conditions with the President," said Ford afterwards.

It is understood that Wilson has agreed to meet the heads of the big business concerns more than half way in efforts to co-operate. The President has decided he has put through a constructive program that will require some time to work out.

PROPERTY WORTH \$30,000 PLACED IN ATTACHMENT

ECHO OF REIDY CASE REACHES KLAMATH.

Woman Who Caused the Arrest of Former Local Capitalist on Charge of Impersonating a Federal Officer as Part of a Big Swindle, Starts Action to Recover in the Local Circuit Court.

A new chapter was added to the P. M. Reidy affair this afternoon when Mary T. Eeles began a suit in the Circuit Court to recover \$20,970, which she claims that Reidy, acting as her agent, got from her last March.

Together with the complaint, the woman also attached property in Klamath Falls belonging to Reidy, worth over \$30,000. The Public Service block on Seventh near Klamath avenue, and Pine and Bush street properties are included.

Reidy resided in Klamath Falls for several years, and was vice-president of the First Trust and Savings bank until last winter, when he disposed of his interests in the bank to Will H. Bennett. From here he went to southern California.

Late this spring, Reidy was arrested in Baltimore by Federal officials, upon complaint of Mrs. Eeles, who resides in Los Angeles. It is charged that Reidy, with others, conspired in a fake clairvoyant stunt to defraud the woman, leading her to believe that a dead relative was advising her to invest her money through them. Reidy is also accused of impersonating a Federal officer.

The trial of the former Klamath man is scheduled for next January. Reidy is at liberty on \$25,000 bonds. The suit today was filed by Stone & Gale, as attorneys for Mrs. Eeles.

San Franciscan to Be Ambassador to Russia



President Wilson has sent to the Senate the name of George T. Marye as ambassador to Russia. He was originally considered for ambassador to France, but the President decided that the French place should go to Congressman William G. Sharp of Ohio.

Mr. Marye was born in Baltimore in 1856. For several seasons he has maintained a home in Washington. He is a retired stock broker, who at one time was president of the San Francisco Stock Exchange. His father took him west in the early days of the gold rush. Mr. Marye was educated in Cambridge, England; Paris, Berlin and Barcelona, with the original intention of practicing law, and was admitted to the bar. Although he abandoned his profession for business he retained his interest in scholarship, and for one term served as regent of the University of California.

SEPTIC MENINGITIS CLAIMS SIX-YEAR-OLD DAUGHTER OF POSTMASTER W. A. DELZELL—NO FUNERAL ARRANGEMENTS.

After suffering but a few days from septic meningitis, for which she underwent an operation, Georgia Delzell, six-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Delzell, passed away last night at the Blackburn hospital. The little girl showed signs of apparent improvement until toward evening yesterday, she sank rapidly, her death coming as a surprise. The funeral arrangements have not been made as yet, pending word from relatives on the way here from Oklahoma.

TWELVE DOLLAR BEEF PREDICTED

YESTERDAY BEEF ON THE HOOF SOLD FOR \$0.60—SCARCITY IS FELT IN ALL OF THE BIG MARKETS.

CHICAGO, July 9.—That beef will be selling at ten and twelve dollars next winter is the prediction made by livestock shippers here today.

Cattle prices are advancing rapidly in all of the primary shipping points of the west. Yesterday beef on the hoof reached \$9.60 at Kansas City.

The receipts here, at Kansas City and Omaha are very light. The packers blame the scarcity of cattle to the drought last year, when many western ranchers were compelled to rush their cattle to market, regardless of what prices they received.

AT LEAST A WEEK BEFORE ALL THE RECOUNTING IS COMPLETED.

Three Marion County Precincts Recounted, and Salem Man Gains One Vote—Race Has Been Seesawing for Nearly Two Months—Two More Counties Where Recounts Are to Be Made Under Stipulation.

United Press Service SALEM, July 9.—Circuit Judge Henry L. Benson of Klamath Falls lost one vote in the rechecking of the tally sheets in three Marion county precincts, completed last night.

Benson still leads by 15 votes. Whether Benson or McNary received the fourth nomination for justice of the Supreme Court at the hands of the Republican voters will not be known until the recounting of the votes in certain precincts in Multnomah and Harney counties are completed.

These recounts are being made in accordance with a stipulation made between the two candidates.

BENSON DENIES CRYSTAL MOTION

AFTER MOVE TO SET ASIDE INDICTMENT IS OVERRULED, ATTORNEY FOR SALOON MAN FILES A DEMURRER IN CASE.

The motion of W. H. A. Renner to set aside the indictment against Al Crystal, owing to errors in the signing of the document, was denied this morning by Circuit Judge Henry I. Benson. Crystal is indicted on charge of larceny by bailee.

After the motion was denied, Renner filed a demurrer, holding that the indictment does not conform to the law, that the facts stated do not constitute a crime and that the indictment fails to allege any wrongful act on the part of Crystal to convert the money to his own use.
