"National suffrage and national prohibition are coming propositions before the country. There are some states where women are regarded as a sort of necessary evil. In these belated states women have no right to hold property in their own name. They are not permitted to have anything to do with business affairs. They have nothing to say about how property that belongs to them shall be taxed. They are as bad off legally as the slaves were before the civil

war. Even Kansas laws do not give women the same equality as is accorded the men, but in other respects Kansas is far ahead of many other states.

"If I am elected to Congress, I shall work for every progressive measure. I care not who nor what party is behind it. I shall work for the things that will make life happier and better and safer, especially to the toilers of the plains—my own people. I believe the fact that I am a wife, a mother, and a grandmother will aid me in representing the people of the sixth congressional district and to obtain, as a member of congress, more equitable laws for all people of our country."

Finally, when the progressives urged her to run for the nomination on their ticket, she decided to try it. Her husband will aid her in the campaign.

There were several men who wanted the nomination, but when they heard that Mrs. Murphy had proposed to try for the nomination they dropped out.

Several democrats and republicans are actively supporting Mrs. Murphy from the sixth district, but supporting candidates on their respective tickets in other sections of the state.

GOVERNOR WEST AFTER DOCTORS

PHYSICIANS WHO ARE TOO FREE IN PRESCRIBING LIQUOR IN DRY TERRITORY MAY LOSE LICENSES

SALEM, Ore., July 30.—Governor West today took under advisement a recommendation by the state board of health that he deprive of their licenses physicians who are too free in prescribing spirituous liquors for their practitioners who happen to live in dry districts of the state.

The recommendation is strongly backed by all the temperance and prohibition organizations of the state as well as by numerous medical associations.

U. S. TO FURNISH MONEY TO MOVE HUGE CROPS

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 29.—Preparations for the distribution of about \$34,000,000 of funds to be deposited in national banks throughout the country to facilitate the marketing of crops and for other "legitimate business purposes" in accordance with Secretary McAdoo's announcement, were being made today by treasury officials. While that sum has been decided upon, the secretary stated that he stood ready to increase the amount to any extent to meet the needs of the country.

Decision to distribute government funds again this fall was the result of replies from 5,000 national banks to a recent treasury department circular asking whether any unusual demand for money was expected this fall and for what purposes.

While the principal demand for funds has come from the South, certain sections of the Southwest and the West have requested deposits.

Secretary McAdoo announces that he is prepared to begin the distribution of funds as soon as the banks comply with the regulations and present the required security.

Federal, state and municipal bonds and prime commercial paper will pay 2 per cent interest. Last year the secretary required that 10 per cent of the deposits be secured by government bonds. That requirement, however, will be waived this year.

Prospects for unusually large crops and greatly improved business conditions throughout the country were indicated, R. M. McAdoo said, by the replies from the bankers' circular.

DEFECTIVES COMMIT 50 PER CENT OF CRIMES

CHICAGO, July 29.—"All great cities should segregate their defectives," says Dr. William J. Hickson, chief of the Chicago Psychopathic bureau.

"These subnormal persons should not be locked up in prisons or asylums, but should be placed on a farm, under the care of competent persons, where they might be as happy as possible, and still be no menace to the public at large."

"There are fully 54,000 defectives in Chicago. They do not number more than 2 1/2 per cent of the city's population, but 50 per cent of the crimes are the deeds of the defectives."

Dr. Hickson's statement was occasioned by the facts brought out in the revolting murder of four-year-old Hazel Weinstein by Roswell C. F. Smith, 27 years old, a mental defective who was considered "eccentric" but harmless by his friends.

There is a rule in the Chicago police department which provides that no member shall engage in any other business than upholding the dignity of the law and preserving neighborhood peace. This, of course, renders it impossible for a policeman to be a saloon keeper. But does it prevent him from being the principal stockholder in a saloon?

That is what Chief Gleason and members of the civil service commission are trying to find out. When Detective Jeremiah M. Collins was discharged from the force several years ago he went into the saloon business and soon owned three. Meanwhile he was suing the city for his old job. After five years he got it back. Then his lawyers incorporated the three saloons and made Collins the principal stockholder.

The Chicago Newsboys' and Bootblacks' Association has come into formal possession of its new \$100,000 home.

Francis A. Hardy, who donated the fund and a northside site, transferred the ground to the boys and building operations will begin at once.

The present home will be torn down and a new building, costing \$30,000, will be erected on the site. It will be used as a home for the older boys.

MAXIE DANCED BY THE OLD FOLKS

PARIS, July 29.—The old folks' banquet given this year by the town of Montlucon in accordance with its annual custom was the most successful ever held.

There were twenty-five couples whose combined ages totalled more than forty centuries.

After the dinner, which was presided over by Louis Coulon, aged 89, the oldest metal worker in France, all the fifty guests danced the "boursée," somewhat resembling the maxixe, until after midnight.

Few outside the circle of her closest friends knew that Miss McQueston, now Mrs. Mann, is the daughter of a member of the Kokrine tribe of Alaskan Indians who accompanied the late Leroy Napoleon McQueston back to civilization after he had spent years in the north and where he took a girl member of the tribe as his wife. Mrs. Mann will spend several months with her husband's tribe.

STUDY MADE ON

RACE SUICIDE

ROME, July 28.—The Vatican has just begun an extended investigation on what effect religion has on the present world-wide evil of race suicide.

Today statistics were made public on Holland, which since 1814 has had an ever increasing Catholic population. At the present time there are 926 Catholic schools in the kingdom with an attendance of 184,907, against 1,000 protestant schools with an attendance of 170,000 children.

These are in addition to the 593,047 children attending the public schools. The birthrate statistics show that for the Catholic population there are 287 children per thousand adults; protestant, 219, and Jewish, 157.

Word has been received from Mrs. F. R. Hamilton, who is in camp with Mr. Hamilton and a party from Klamath Falls, that the huckleberries at the big patch were all frosted in the bloom this year, and that the indications are that the crop will be a total failure.

Mrs. Hamilton has visited Huckleberry Mountain every year, this being her twenty-fourth. She says that from the number of deer tracks evident everywhere the frost did not seem to affect them, as it had the berries. Flies and mosquitoes are also very friendly at the present time.

Borman and William Haffelman have organized an amusement company and will go on the stage, presenting a daily battle for the heavy-weight title of the world.

Borman, 38, ex-real estate dealer, weighs 471 pounds. His most effective punch is a left hander, which extends eight inches beyond his stomach.
