SALEM, Aug. 24 .- Insurance Commissioner Ferguson has issued a quarterly report of his accounting department, showing the financial condition of the counties of Oregon at the close of business June 30, 1914, and from this it appears that 26 counties had surpluses ranging from \$2,706.06 in Clatsop, to \$1,050,736.23 in Multnomah, and that only eight counties showed deficits.
