Klamath County Lands Just Restored to Entry by U. S.

Will Be Open to Filing January 29th--Settlement Before December 30th to Be Considered Trespassing

A complete list of the Oregon lands in the Klamath project restored to entry is given below. The following is a copy of the order just received by the land office at Lakeview:

You are hereby advised and instructed to appropriately note that on October 31, 1914, the first assistant secretary of the interior vacated former departmental orders of July 19, 1904, and January 28, 1905, in so far as they affect the withdrawals under the first and second forms under the act of June 17, 1902 (32 Stat. 388), for use in connection with the Klamath project, Oregon, of the hereinafter described lands, and by his authority such of said tracts as have not been formerly restored and are not otherwise withdrawn, reserved or appropriated, or covered by existing entry, will be subject to settlement under the public land laws of the United States on and after December 30, 1914, at 9 a. m., and will be subject to entry, filing, or selection January 29, 1915, at 9 a. m., at the United States land office at Lakeview, Ore.

Warning is hereby expressly given that all persons who go upon any of the lands to be restored hereunder and perform any act of settlement thereon prior to 9 o'clock a. m., standard time, December 30, 1914, or who are on or are occupying any part of said lands at such hour, except those having valid subsisting settlement rights initiated prior to withdrawal from settlement and since maintained, will be considered and dealt with as trespassers, and will gain no rights whatever under such unlawful settlement or occupancy; provided, however, that nothing herein contained shall prevent persons from going upon and over the lands to examine them with a view to thereafter going upon and making settlement thereon when the land shall become subject thereto, in accordance with this notice. Persons having prior settlement rights, as above defined, will be allowed to make entry in conformity

with existing law and regulations. Intending settlers are also warned to ascertain the status of the surveyed lands and get all information available as to the unsurveyed lands by inquiry at the local land office before making settlement thereon. These lands contain no power possibilities and are not subject to preference right of selection by the state under the act of August 18, 1914 (28 Stat. 3944).

LIBRARY CLUB GETS MORE AID FROM CITY

The question of so amending the city charter as to give the council the authority to enter into an agreement with the reclamation service for the taking over of the Ankeny canal, with obligations, etc., and to settle for these water rights in the way it seems most advisable, is to be put up to the people of Klamath Falls at an election to be held within sixty days' time. A resolution to this effect was passed at Monday night's meeting of council. This is in accordance with the conditions imposed by the government before entering into an agreement for the transfer of title to the troublesome ditch.

ANKENY CANAL MATTER COMING UP TO PEOPLE

Under the next year's administration of the city, the Women's Library Club is to receive a little more than \$50 a month for the maintenance of the library. Heretofore the city has been paying \$30 a month toward the maintenance of this great beneficial institution. Until a few weeks ago the library charged a small fee for the use of its books, although maintaining a free reading room. Since then, though, the books are furnished free to the public, and as this has brought about increased expense while cutting off the revenue derived from the rental of books, the library has been facing a deficit.

Last night a delegation from the club attended the council meeting. Mrs. Luella Stearns, president, and Mrs. Robert E. Vattenburg, secretary, told the council of the condition their library is in, and asked for an appropriation of \$50 a month hereafter, agreeing to turn the library over to the city, if that was desired. This phase of the question was not taken up by the council, but provision was made for the increased appropriation.

CITY TAX LEVY IS SET BY THE CITY COUNCIL

A levy of 8 1/2 mills is to be taxed in Klamath Falls for municipal purposes. This was decided at last night's council meeting, the appropriations for the different funds being as follows: General fund 3 mills Street fund 1/4 mill Interest sinking fund 2 1/2 mills Bond redemption fund 3/4 mill Light and water fund 1 1/2 mills Fire Department fund 1/4 mill

The motion for the adoption of this levy was passed by Hamilton, Owens and Lockwood, with Matthews and Rogers opposing. Rogers held for a lower levy, and he was supported by Matthews. A motion by these men to have the levy placed at 8 mills was lost, following the reading of a written protest from Mayor Nicholas, holding that the rate was too low for proper administration of the city's affairs.

PROJECT MANAGER SAYS RESTORED LAND IS DRY

In a recent issue of your paper I had a notice that the withdrawn lands around this project would soon be thrown open for settlement and entry. I wish to say very emphatically that this is a "dry farming" proposition; that anyone filing on these lands must not expect any irrigation from government aid.

Owing to the reduction of payments for the present project from 10 per cent per annum to 2 per cent per annum, there will be but little money available for new work, and the extensions of this project will be the taking in of the Tule Lake bed lands as they are uncovered. These lands are not open for filing at present. The lands which are offered for settlement are not a part of the plans for the enlargement of the project, if they were, they would not have been offered for settlement without the entrymen making an agreement with the reclamation service.

No one should let anyone persuade him that there is a chance that the government will put water onto these lands.

Experiences with forest fires on the national forests this year show that automobiles, where they can be used, furnish the quickest and cheapest transportation for crews of fire fighters. Motor teams are higher than those for teams for the actual time employed, but the total cost per distance traveled and in wages paid to men in getting to fires is much less. The time-saving is self-evident; trips which ordinarily require two days time have been made by automobile in a few hours.

FREEZING CAUSES ARTILLERY MOVES TO BE SWIFTER

PARIS, Nov. 24.--The sudden cold weather, freezing water, has facilitated the movement of the artillery of both sides.

The cold weather has resulted in the lifting of the fog and the ceasing of snow and rain. This enables the allied warships to aid the troops more regularly.

The Germans are vigorously attacking the allies along the Aisne, and in the Argonne region.

Besides this, they are rushing heavy reinforcements toward the Belgian coast. The equipment includes a number of heavy Krupp siege guns. This move indicates another desperate attempt to break through to the coast. Where it will strike is not known.

The armies between Neuport and Dix Mude are now practically caught under a thin mantle of ice. Quantities of German supplies, abandoned when that section was inundated, are now frozen in.

PASTOR ACCUSED OF TAKING TAINTED COIN

AKRON, Ohio, Nov. 24.--Rev. Jas. T. Lowe, former pastor of the First United Evangelical church here, will be tried today by a conference of churchmen on charges growing out of his acceptance of checks amounting to several hundred dollars from the Summit County Bottlers and Brewers Association.

Lowe has spent the past two weeks in preparing a statement of his case. "My defense will be a plain statement of the facts," said Lowe here today. "The money was used solely for church purposes, and there was never an attempt on my part to conceal the fact that it was given. Brewers' money pays debts as readily as any other money."

The official board, however, thought it unwise to acquaint the board with the source of the gift.

Two other Akron churches and the Akron Y. M. C. A. have also confessed to accepting money from the liquor men's association.
