

Janet Lee Parker

February 19, 1940 – February 23, 2015

Janet Lee Parker passed away at her home in Seaside February 23, 2015, four days after her 75th birthday.

She was born in Glasgow, Montana, the only child of Edgar A. and Helen E. Parker, grew up in Portland, and graduated from Jefferson High School in 1958. In 1961, she graduated with a degree in Dance and Drama from the University of Oregon, where she won the drama department's Outstanding Student Actress Award three consecutive years.

Janet Lee's father died in Normandy in World War II; her mother was killed in an auto accident in 1962. She was briefly married to Prof. Herbert Weinberg, currently of Colorado Springs, CO.

Janet Lee retired from Los Angeles to Seaside in 2001, believing that the climate would alleviate the symptoms of multiple sclerosis, from which she had suffered for decades. Few local people were aware of her previous history and many accomplishments.

Upon completing college, she played the supporting role of Sandra in the film "David and Lisa" and also appeared in the movie "Act One." In the mid-1960s, she toured internationally with Bob Hope, entertaining the military. She performed in numerous stage productions in New York, Boston and Los Angeles, and on national tours with several productions. Her favorite of these was "The Odd Couple" in which she played the roles of Cecily and Gwen with actors such as Tony Randall, Jack Klugman, Don Knotts, Art Carney, Gig Young and Orson Bean.

Television credits included the roles of Amy Marshall on "The Doctors" and Miss Jasperson on "As the World Turns" in NBC and ABC Specials, as well as in other dramatic roles and many commercials.

In the 1980s, Janet Lee worked in London and Rome as consultant/ writer for the British and Italian versions of "Sesame Street." She appeared on stage and television in 23 foreign countries and was fluent in Italian and German.

Her acting versatility ranged from Shakespeare to children's shows; her media from screen to stage to radio. She also recorded 107 LPs for the blind. She was a member of Screen Actors' Guild and Equity.

Janet Lee embodied the term "theatrical trouper." Despite her debilitating illness, she remained positive, fun loving and optimistic. A Celebration of Life will be held Sunday, May 3 from 2 to 4 p.m. at Seaside's Bob Chisholm Community Center. At her request, memorials may be made to multiple sclerosis research.

Nancy Lee Grimberg was born Sept. 22, 1928, in Portland, Ore., to Ole and Nettie (Lokan) Nelson. She spent her early years on a homestead in Birkenfeld, then Clatskanie, and moved to Astoria at the age of 10. Nancy resided in Astoria until the end of her life. She had so much love for this place.

She graduated from Astoria High School in 1946, attended Oregon State University for a year, and majored in fashion design.

In 1954, Nancy married Stanford Grimberg in Astoria. Five years later their only child was born, a daughter they named Ann. Stan and Nancy remained together until his death, caused by mesothelioma, in 1982

Nancy spent a total of 23 years working for The Daily Astorian in the advertising department. In 1976, she went to work with Stan at the new business he had established, Astoria Plumbing. Don was employed by The Daily Astorian and Ball Studio as a photographer until early 1960. Don then became Seaside Chamber manager until assuming the office of Seaside city auditor and treasurer.

In 1966, Don took a position as administrative and budget officer for the Clatsop County Board of Commissioners. He was then elected to the position of Clatsop County clerk in
