homemakers keeps Sullivan busy staying up with current fashion and maintaining national brand children's knits and quality lingerie fabrics. The shop is adorned with bolts of fabric in many varieties, including camouflage silk and neon flannel. She also carries zippers, buttons, elastic and lace to match the fabrics on hand.

If a pattern is hard to find Sullivan can probably find it for you, even a pattern for booty pajamas in a man's size. The shop will offer some mending and hemming but Sullivan says she no longer wants to be a fulltime seamstress, as she was during the years she and her husband, Ray, reared their six children.

Dog license renewal time is here, owners may license for three years

All dogs with permanent canine teeth, or 6 months of age, must be licensed by March 4, 1995, in Columbia County.

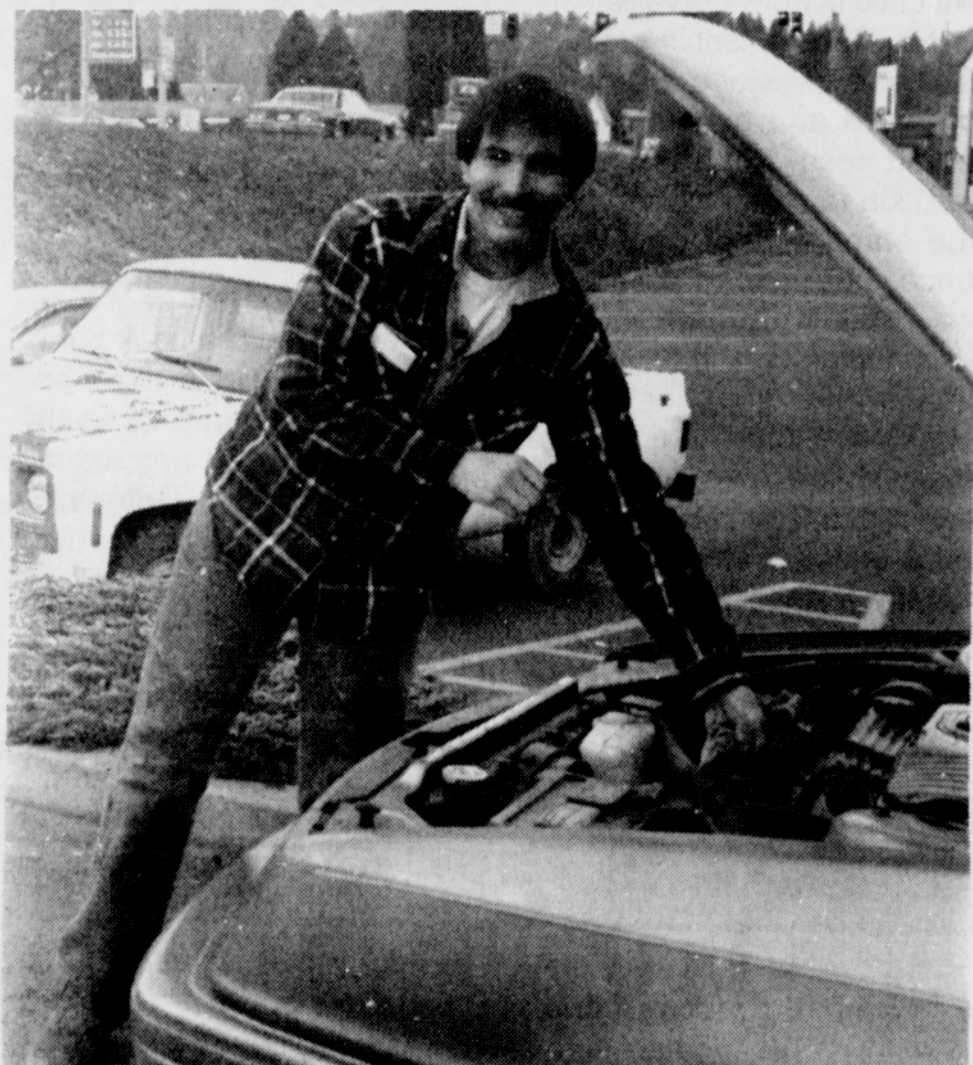
The license fee for a dog that has been spayed or neutered is \$6.00 per year, for unaltered dogs, the fee is \$24.00 per year. There is a discount for senior citizens who are dog owners. A valid rabies vaccination certificate is required for each dog.

A dog license application may be obtained by writing to County Clerk, Columbia County Courthouse, St. Helens, OR 97051, or by calling (503) 397-3796.

For the first time, Columbia County is offering the opportunity to license dogs for a three-year period. The cost will be triple the annual fee and each dog's rabies vaccination certificate must be valid for at least two years and ten months of the three-year period.

Owners of dogs not licensed by March 4, will be charged a \$10.00 penalty per dog until April 5. After that time, the penalty for failure to license a dog will be at least \$25.00 and could range upwards to \$250.00 per dog.

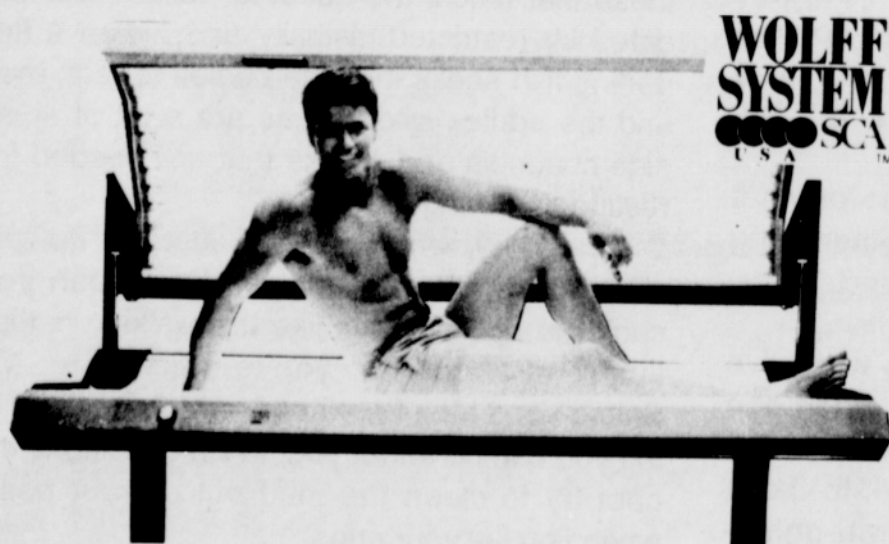

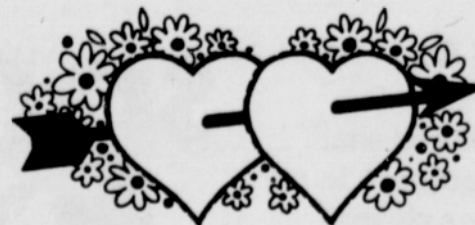
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
