enforcement advisory committee to help hire, deal with issues, prepare for community events and consider potential impacts.

The subject of police/community interaction received a

lot of attention, with suggestions ranging from more police involvement in community activities, to an occasional Open House at the police department, to organizing police boosters to help raise funds for the department.

By far the greatest concern, however, was the need to develop much better communications between the police department and the community, with the goal of increasing un-

derstanding in both directions.

Suggestions included a link to the police department from the city web site; a department contact for questions by e-mail; a regular column in *The INDEPENDENT* by either the chief or his designee; a bulletin board in City Hall; a way for citizens to ask questions (anonymously, when necessary) and get answers; a suggestion box at City Hall; a liaison to listen to complaints and refer them to

the appropriate resource; and monthly presentations by the police department in various venues.

Other suggestions included more walking patrols, more citizen involvement, clarification of ordinances/laws, development of a list of volunteers who will take people home from bars when necessary.

The meeting concluded at 10:30 p.m.

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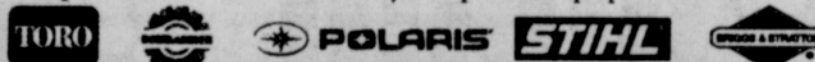
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
