tend. Haynes also said that the board of AVHA would "like the to see the parks levy on the ballot at a future time." Mayor Bob Orlowski commented that the Parks Commission is not empowered to place a levy on the ballot.

In response to Haynes' question about the status of the police levy, Orlowksi explained that the council had reached a consensus in October to operate the police department with a limited budget out of the general fund in 2004-2005 and place the levy on the ballot at the general election in November 2004. Levys on the general election ballot do not require a double majority. Orlowski went on to say that he, personally, would like to see the police levy placed on the ballot earlier. This exchange sparked a general discussion by council about whether funds resulting from the passage of the levy would be available for fiscal 2004-2005 if the levy were approved at either the March or

May election. Council agreed to discuss the levy at a special council meeting to be held November 25th.

Director of Public Works Tim Grossnickle told council that, for the first time, the city was able to meet demand for water without running the pump. Since this is the largest single expense this will produce significant savings over time. He also said that he may, at some future date, use excess water available in the winter months to replenish the aquifer.

Orlowski told council that the police department had evidence of someone visiting the watershed and moving things around. No actual vandalism was reported, Orlowski said, but there was concern about trespassers in the water plant. Orlowski told council that he asked the police department to issue citations to anyone, other than city personnel, in the watershed.

Sheila Day and Norma Stewart appeared before coun-

cil to offer the services of Friends of Historic Banks as caretakers for the scout cabin. Day told council that the community had a valuable asset, particularly after the renovation. FHB uses the cabin at least twice a year to display some of the many historical artifacts they have in storage. Day said that the group has recently noticed evidence of minor vandalism and inadequate maintenance. Day and Stewart circulated photos of garbage left in the cabin, burn spots on the rug, and damage to the fireplace. Council will discuss the proposal at their next meeting.

Council discussed a memo asking approval for disposition of outdated library computer equipment. Councilor Teri Brandstitre, also a member of the library commission, said the request had not come to the commission. Council consensus was to send the request back to the library for additional information and action by the library commission.

During council round table. Brandstitre said that her husband has repaired damage to the Greenville Park gazebo several times. Council asked Orlowski to develop a cost estimate for installing lighting at the gazebo.

In other business council:

· Accepted quote from landscaping contractor for replacement of trees and shrubs in Greenville Park.

· Appointed Ryan Birr, Pete Edison and Tim Grossnickle to investigate the feasibility of hiring a city manager. Two additional members for the committee will be sought from the general public.

· Kirk Andrews will coordinate the annual holiday light contest.

· Unanimously passed ordinances to allow the water department to charge application and collection fees. Resolutions setting the fees will be presented next month.

· Approved the library services agreement.
