Long term care advocates sought

Volunteer advocates and investigators are needed to serve as ombudsmen for residents of nursing homes, residential care facilities, assisted living facilities and adult foster care homes. The Office of the Long Term Care Ombudsman will train the volunteers on the aging process, communication skills, problem-solving skills, investigation and other ombudsman skills. The certification training will begin on Thursday, November 18, in Portland.

As Certified Ombudsmen, volunteers work to improve the quality of residents' lives, by identifying and investigating complaints and concerns on behalf of the residents, then working with the facilities to make changes. The typical concerns ombudsmen address cover a broad range, and often include resident care; residents' rights, such as privacy, respect and dignity; and quality of life concerns such as appropriate activities and meals.

Free help is available for Oregon Medicare beneficiaries who have questions about the new drug discount cards being mailed out this month.

Beneficiaries who receive state help to pay Medicare premiums are receiving discount cards from the federal Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services. The state Senior Health Insurance Benefits Assistance (SHIBA) program has staff and volunteers available to help Oregon beneficiaries determine if the discount card they receive meets their needs or if

Approximately 70,000 lowincome Oregon beneficiaries may be eligible for \$1,200 each to help pay for their prescription drugs over the next 14 months. The can begin using the discount card immediately to get savings on prescription drugs. Along with the card, they also will receive instructions on how to activate the \$1,200 benefit if they qualify.

The cards were randomly assigned from several drug card sponsors. Beneficiaries

have the option of accepting the card they receive or choosing a different sponsor's card that may better match their prescription usage.

SHIBA, which is part of the Oregon Insurance Division, is strongly encouraging seniors to determine if the card they receive is the best card for them before activating it. Consumers who need assistance can call toll-free 1-800-722-4134 to receive help from trained volunteers with their Medicare and health insurance decisions.
