Candy Canes and Christmas


Stick candy has been eaten for centuries, but it wasn't until around 1900 that it was decorated with red stripes and bent into the shape of a cane. They were sometimes handed out during church services to keep the children quiet. One story – untrue but often told – about the origin of the candy cane is as follows:

In the late 1800s a candy maker wanted to express the meaning of Christmas through a symbol made of candy. He came up with the idea of bending one of his white candy sticks into the shape of a cane and incorporated symbols of Christ's love and sacrifice through the Candy Cane. First, he used a plain white peppermint stick. The color white to symbolize the purity and sinless nature of Jesus. Next, he added three small stripes to symbolize the pain inflicted upon Jesus before His death on the cross. There are three of them to represent the Holv Trinity. When looked at with the crook on top, it looks like a shepherd's staff. If you turn it upside down, it becomes the letter J. the first letter in Jesus' name. The candy canes were made for Christmas, so everyone would remember what Christmas is all about.
