In concert with the U-Ride program, the Oregon Trail

Chapter of the American Red Cross provides service to elders and people with disabilities living in Washington County through their volunteer program. Washington County seniors and people with disabilities who cannot access TriMet service and live outside the Rural Western Washington U-Ride service area depend solely on the American Red Cross program.

All elders and people with disabilities in need of a ride may call the Ride Connection Service Center to register and make ride requests. Ride Connection accepts requests for U-Ride customers if their requests fit within the service outline parameters (as described above). Currently, an average of 10 trip requests per day cannot be accepted. These are the customers who depend solely on the American Red Cross volunteer program and its capacity.

PCC seeks 45 students for CAMP

Portland Community College's federally-funded College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP) is searching for 45 qualified college students for the 2007-08 school year.

The deadline to apply for the CAMP program is Wednesday, May 30. The program supports students from migrant and seasonal farm worker backgrounds during their first year of college. It provides students with both financial assistance and support services with the goal of preparing them to continue their education at a four-year college or university. The program's services include tuition and transportation assistance, CAMP courses, tutoring and mentoring, academic advising, personal and career counseling, book assistance, health resources and a monthly stipend.

In order to be eligible for services provided by the pro-

gram under the guidelines established by the U.S. Department of Education, a student, their parents or legal guardians must have worked at least 75 days within the last two years in agriculture as a migrant or seasonal farm worker. This includes any activity directly related to the production of crops, dairy products, poultry, live stock, cultivation or harvesting of trees, fishery, nursery, and forestry work.

Applicants must have employment verification as a migrant or seasonal farm worker; a high school diploma or GED; be eligible to apply for Federal Financial Aid (FAFSA); be a permanent resident or citizen of the U.S.; demonstrate financial need according to federal income guidelines; are in their first year of college studies; enrolled in at least 12 credit hours at Portland Community College; and eligible to participate in Chapter 1, Title 1 Migrant Education Program or the High School Equivalency Program.

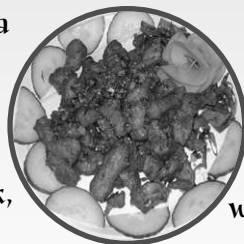
