and isolated, those recently released from a hospital or nursing home, those with long-term illnesses, and those needing someone to check in on their well-being. The purpose of the Senior Companion Program is to enable low-income persons, age 60 years and over, to remain physically and mentally active, and to enhance their self-esteem through continued participation in needed community services. Call my office if you know of someone in need of visits from a Senior Companion or someone who is interested in learning more about serving your community in this capacity.

The Foster Grandparent Program is also in need of volunteers in the area schools. If you are a senior 60 and over and meet the low income quidelines wishing to learn more about this program call my office as well. Volunteers in both of these programs receive a small non-taxable stipend. Call 429-9112.

Community Action Team Inc. (C.A.T.), a private non-profit corporation, administers programs that mobilize resources to help reduce the incidence of poverty and to provide services in a manner that will make families and individuals more selfreliant. These programs include: Emergency energy & housing services; Transitional housing assistance; Housing & Community development; Housing rehab & weatherization; Respite care resource and referral; Kid care; Head Start; Healthy Start; Veterans Services Representative. 
