Banks School Board hears music before discussing facilities

The Banks School District Board of Directors were entertained during their May 12 meeting by a group of third and fourth grade elementary students playing recorders. Music teacher Mark Anderson introduced the students and explained that they had learned to play the recorders through a recorder "karate" system where progressing in song difficulty results in a higher belt ranking. The students played three songs; one at the blue belt level, one at the brown belt level and one at the black belt level.

During a work session prior to the meeting, the board discussed the progress of the facilities planning committee. The group has made its recommendations to the board and supplied four possible bond scenarios. Currently, the district is having a survey done to help decide what level of bond is most appropriate. The dollar amount of the bond and general scope will be decided before the end of this school year.

The board, which is considering whether to hire someone to help with grant writing and other fund-raising elements, heard from Christine Fore, who explained how she could help the school district obtain monies for various purposes. She emphasized that there are

many sources of money available for different things, and that knowing how to piece different sources together to meet needs is very important. Fore said that, in the past, she has worked with many donors in fund-raising for child care and mental health facilities.

Superintendent Marv Ott outlined changes that had been made to two policies that had a first reading at the last meeting. He said that any mention of knife length had been eliminated from the weapon policy. He said also that state rules mandate that expulsion is the punishment for weapon violations, but that there is the possibility

of discretion by the superintendent. Additionally, there is always an avenue for appealing to the board as a whole. Ott said that the bus policy language had been clarified and that the policy now matched the current practice.

Both policies, along with others that had no discussion, had a second reading and were approved during the regular board meeting.

The board also approved the 2008-09 Sodexho-Marriott Food Service Contract and the adoption of new health text-books.
