50 Years Ago This Month

The December 11, 1958, issue of the Vernonia Eagle included the following news story on the front page:

Better sign marking for highway 47 was indicated last week by the Oregon state highway department men, Supervisor Shough and Lyle Pearson. Their trips here came about because of a letter written by the chamber of commerce seeking better designation signs in the area.

Shough agreed that there would be the addition of the name, Vernonia on the No. 202 junction near Astoria and an advance warning on highway 47 near Apiary junction to indicate the direction to Rainier.

He recommended writing the state-city relations committee of the highway department to ask that state maps show a blacktopped road between Apiary and Rainier instead of gravel.

Chamber President Guy Thomas told the board members at their meeting Monday of a letter received from Rino Koski of the fish and game commission which itemized plants of fish within a 10-mile radius of Vernonia. He listed: 315 nine-inch and 1885 ten-inch trout during May in Rock creek and 3002 nine-inch trout June 18 of this

Bill Wilson reported that the Vernonia advertising stamps were going over very well and reminded folks to use them on their Christmas cards and parcels going out of town. They are available at the various merchants and at the chamber office for 5¢ per sheet for 14 stamps.

Also in the December 11 issue, page 6, under the headline Legend Surrounds Christmas Trees was this article:

The trimmed Christmas tree, as we know it today, is little more than a century and a half old, yet

legends trace the origin of the tree back to earliest times.

One legend concerns an early Christmas missionary, St. Wilfred, who once came upon a band of Druids preparing to make a human sacrifice under a large oak.

According to the story, St. Wilfred had the tree cut down and almost immediately, a young fir tree sprang up in its place. The missionary seized the evidence and made the fir tree a symbol of new faith and thereafter the Druids set this symbol of immortality in the halls of their lodges at Christmas time, surrounding it with feasting and laughter and

There is also the story of the faithful pine which sheltered the holy family during the flight to Egypt. With Herod's soldiers in pursuit, it was still necessary that Mary rest awhile so they sought shelter in the low trunk of a huge fir tree. As the soldiers approached, the tree bent its branches to conceal the huddled little group. When the danger had passed the baby Jesus blessed the old tree. Today, if you cut a pine cone lengthwise at Christmas time, you can still see the imprint of His little hand.

Another legend holds that the first Christmas tree was really an apple tree. And, although the fir tree has long since replaced its predecessor for Christmas use, the tinsel baubles we used on the tree are said representative of the fruit which for the early Christmas symbolized the fall of man in the Garden of Eden and his reclamation by the birth of the Sav-
